Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Julie H.—My husband feels lost without his brother.
Milton H.—She's just trying to break us up.

Julie H.—I'm married four years, have a two-year-old baby, and now suddenly realize that my 30-year-old husband is the biggest baby I know. He can't make a move without consulting his older brother.

I knew they were very close and I admired their relationship as a fine, brotherly loyalty. From childhood up, they slept in the same room, went to the same school, and are now partners in business. But I had no idea that Milton, as an adult and a married man, was so dependent on his brother socially and emotionally. I feel I'm married to a hyphenated person named Milton-Alvin, even though it's only Milton who comes home each night.

My immediate problem is a social one. We spent a pleasant evening at the new home of a couple who happen to know Alvin and his wife, too. While there, Milton remarked that Alvin would feel bad over not being asked along, and that we had all better keep mum about the visit. The upshot? We must return next month with Alvin and wife, and pretend that it's our first visit, to spare Alvin's feelings!

How can a wife grow close to a husband who wants to be 99 per cent brother?

Milton H.—I can't understand what Julie has against Alvin. He's never said a word against her. In fact, he liked her from the minute I introduced her to him, and was glad I was marrying her.

I owe a great deal to Alvin and I don't think I can ever do enough for him. He took me into his business as an equal partner, even though I had nothing to offer but my two hands and feet. Our business is thriving. Both our wives get a good allowance, and Julie should be as grateful as I.

About this party coming up next month that has Julie all burned up, all I did was remind our host to do something he meant to do anyway. They really wanted Alvin and his wife along that first time, and it was an oversight. And since I can't bear to see Alvin hurt, we cooked up this little plan for us all to come over together, and play dumb.

If Julie's trying to make me choose between her and my brother, she's just being cruel.

The Council: We can sympathize with Julie in her marriage to the little man who isn't there, because he's mentally back in that childhood berth next to Big Brother. She's reminding him that he'd better take stock and discover where Alvin ends, and he—an entity called Milton—begins.

Under flowery protestations of "brother-love," Milton clings to an almost hysterical involvement with Alvin. Breaking loose seems impossible. And yet, for a successful marriage, it must be done. Julie sees that he can never be wholly hers, because he is not even wholly himself. To find himself, see himself, and stand alone as a whole man, he may need the detached aid of a guidance counselor. But he must be helped to see that his nervous solicitude for his older brother is the symptom of an unhealthy hunger. To satisfy it, he is sacrificing his marriage.

Julie has a hard row to hoe. On the surface one might suggest that she endeavor to feed her husband's ego so that he may find greater satisfaction in the husband-role, with less need to play the hovering brother. But it's harder to superimpose a new relationship on an old than to start from scratch. Milton came to Julie "with strings attached," tied to his brother. Evidently nobody has yet explained to him (or else, he can't accept) that marriage means "forsaking all others and cleaving only unto thee."

This does not mean abandoning Alvin. It merely calls for a re-alignment of loyalties, in the order of their claim upon his thoughts and actions. In our society, it's Wife and Child first.

Milton has two families, the one he was born into, and the one he was man enough to found himself. The second is his first responsibility. His brother isn't.
