

Present State Compensation System Said To Be Faulty

Salem —UPI— Oregon's present workmen's compensation system is faulty in the areas of safety, claims, hearings and appeals, rating, and out-of-state injury protection. It also fosters poor employer-employee relations. Thus did supporters of the so-called three-way work-

men's compensation bill sum up their case Thursday afternoon before the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee.

The bill would correct these defects, they said.

The arguments for and against SB334 are so weighty that the committee scheduled a fourth session for 1 p.m. next Thursday.

The bill would give private insurance companies more of a crack at underwriting workmen's compensation which one opposing witness described as a "highly lucrative" business in California, which has three-way.

Higher Education Pay Boosts Urged

Salem —UPI— Higher Education Board Chairman Henry Cabell joined with representatives of Oregon colleges and universities Thursday night in urging the legislature to keep faculty salaries at a competitive level by granting a 19 per cent increase over two years.

That is about 3 per cent more than Gov. Mark Hatfield has proposed.

The testimony was delivered before a session of the Joint Ways and Means Committee, which is considering the proposed salary hikes.

The increases they seek would cost some \$7 million over the next biennium.

Air Stewardesses Want Own Line

Miami Beach —UPI— Another airline argument, this one involving stewardesses and pilots, was hanging fire today at the AFL-CIO Executive Council meeting.

The council has promised to rule on a request by the stewardesses for a charter to set up their own union apart from the pilots.

The stewardesses contend that they have no common grounds with the pilots from the standpoint of work requirements or a pay scale and that they need an entirely separate union program.

a near monopoly in this field. William J. Moshofsky, Portland attorney for Associated Oregon Industries, completed testimony for backers of the bill and said the crux of the argument is allowing competition.

Among the opponents was former Gov. Charles A. Sprague who defended Oregon's present program.

Sprague said he was speaking as a private employer — as president of the Statesman-Journal Publishing Co., which owns the afternoon Capital Journal and morning Oregon Statesman newspapers.

Could Be Amended

He said Oregon's system works in a fair way for most employers but could be amended to improve it for both employers and employees.

Big companies might benefit under the bill but he said he doubted if small firms would, adding that three-way is a "misnomer" because Oregon employers actually have three choices now.

Labor contends that since private insurance firms have to make a profit, workmen's compensation costs would go up and benefits would shrink. The bulk of labor's testimony will come next week.

Queen Elizabeth To Visit Pope John At Vatican May 5

Vatican City —UPI— Vatican officials said today Queen Elizabeth's planned visit to Pope John XXIII is certain to further improve relations between the Roman Catholic and Anglican churches.

A high Vatican source, noting that the climate for such a visit was unusually favorable, said the British monarch and her husband, Prince Philip, would be welcomed with all the pomp and pageantry of the Pope's court when they arrive May 5.

Buckingham Palace announced in London Thursday that the royal couple would pay a courtesy call on Pope John at the end of a trip to Italy. The queen is the head of the Protestant Church of England which broke away from the Roman Catholic Church in the 16th Century.

Appoints Liaison Officer

The Church of England also announced it had appointed a liaison officer to the Vatican, Canon Bernard Pawley. This was believed a direct result of the meeting last December between the Pope and Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, retiring primate of the Church of England.

Vatican circles expressed

hope that the queen's visit would not cause undue criticism from British Protestants who have objected to similar meetings in the past.

"It is only a courtesy call but it is certain to strengthen good relations," a Vatican spokesman said.

The Vatican visit will be the first by a British monarch since the late King George V called on Pope Pius XI in 1923. His predecessor, King Edward VII, also visited the Vatican.

Makes Previous Visit

The queen and her husband visited the Vatican once before—in 1951 when she still was a princess. They called on Pope Pius XII.

As head of the British Commonwealth, Queen Elizabeth has many millions of Roman Catholics among her subjects. The queen believes it would be unthinkable to slight their spiritual leader, despite the Protestant criticism the visit was expected to provoke in Britain.

The National Union of Protestants and the Free Church of Scotland openly objected to Elizabeth's Vatican visit in 1951 and also that of Dr. Fisher, the Archbishop of Canterbury, last year.

Quality groups showed little inclination to participate in the hesitant advance. The big oils, tobaccos and rails were narrowly mixed. Autos ranged from a 1/4 lower in Chrysler to 3/4 higher in Ford while steels hedged between Bethlehem which has unchanged and U.S. Steel which tacked on 3/8.

Douglas topped the aircrafts with a rise of 1 1/2. Johns-Manville, selling ex-dividend, scored a gain of 1 1/2, in building shares and both GE and Westinghouse inched ahead in the electrical equipments.

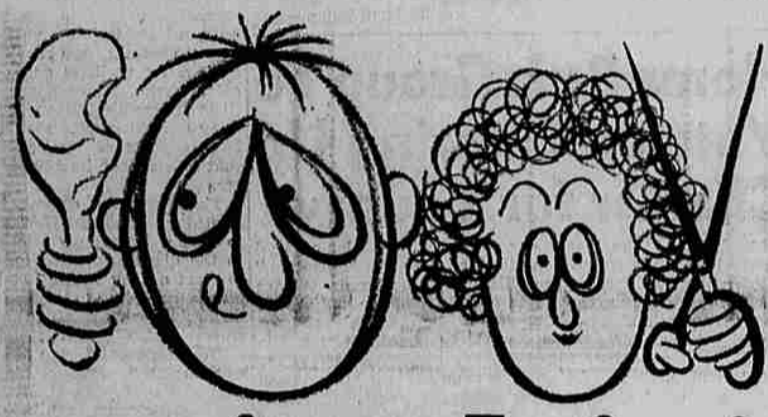
