Cancer Society's Film To Be Shown In Valley March 1

An estimated 1,000 Jackson county women are expected to attend various showing of the American Cancer Society's film, "Time and Two Women," which will be shown in four locations Wednesday, March 1.

The film will be shown at the Holly theater, Medford, at 10 a.m., at the Varsity theater in Ashland at 10 a.m., at the Bellview Grange hall, south of Ashland, at 2 p.m., and at the Rogue River Grange hall at 7:30 p.m.

"Time and Two Women" is part of an educational program of the American Cancer Society to alert all women to their personal responsibility in the problem of uterine cancer. It points out the urgency of early detection and explains the uterine cancer cell examination perfected by Dr. George N. Papanicolaou while studying on Society research grants totaling more than a half-million dollars.

The film is narrated by Dr. Joe V. Meigs of Boston.

The Week in California

Book Burning Brings Probe; Readers May Be Sent Overseas

Almost a million California textbooks will be saved from the torch and probably be shipped to Africa, the Philippines, Okinawa or some other needy country.

That seemed almost certain last week after the legislature, the governor and even the White House leaped into action at word the state department of education had burned 850,000 unused elementary textbooks in the last four years and had still another 870,000 surplus books stored in warehouses.

(At week's end the department said a review of its records showed that only 184,000 texts had been burned—all of them this year—and the remainder had actually gone for pulp.)

Gov. Edmund G. Brown said he telephoned the White House and found the federal government might be able to put them to "great use, particularly in Africa."

Would Evaluate Books

But he said the U. S. Information Agency would have to evaluate the new elementary school readers to decide whether they should be accepted.

The department said the books were burned when they became obsolete because they could not be sold and state law prevented making a gift of state property.

Disclosure of the burning immediately spurred the legislature to launch an investigation and demand that the department put a halt to it.

Assemblyman Glenn E. Coolidge, R-Fenton, author of the resolution calling for the investigation and chairman of the ways and means subcommittee which will conduct it, said the probe may take in all facets of the textbook program.

Cites Contracts

Indirectly involved was the state's system of providing textbooks for local districts by leasing the printing plates from private publishers and printing the books in the state printing plant. The education department said contracts for leasing the plates prohibited the state from selling surplus books outside California.

Assemblyman Gordon H. Winton, D-Merced, said a bill he introduced would direct the state to provide districts with a selection of texts, so that huge amounts of one unused text would not accumulate. At present, the state generally accepts only one text in a subject.

Elsewhere, there were these developments:

Shooting: A 15-year-old Lewiston, Calif., boy went into his parents' bedroom and killed both of them with a .22 rifle because, he said, he hated his father and didn't care much for his mother. Daryl Moss, an Explorer Scout, secretary of his troop and president of the sophomore class at Trinity County High school, was arrested about an hour later in Redding. At week's end, after a juvenile court hearing, he was taken in custody to Mendocino State hospital for a psychiatric examination.

Seaborg: Senate members of the Congressional Atomic Energy Committee gave unanimous approval to President

Kennedy's nomination of Nobel prize-winner Glenn T. Seaborg as a member of the Atomic Energy Commission.

The group acted immediately after Seaborg, former chancellor of the University of California, at Berkeley, testified at a hearing in Washington. His nomination went to the Senate for confirmation. President Kennedy has indicated that Seaborg will be named commission chairman.

Exhibit of Atomic Energy Is Slated

Students at six high schools in southern Oregon will have an opportunity to "get acquainted with the wonders of our present age" at special assembly programs scheduled next month.

Students at Rogue River High school will see the display March 15, Grants Pass High, March 20, Crater High school, March 21; Eagle Point High, March 22; Phoenix High, March 23; and Ashland, March 24.

The program is designed to meet the needs of principals, science teachers, and civic leaders in stimulating a deeper interest in the peacetime uses of atomic energy. Illustrative charts, panels, models and equipment play important roles in the demonstration of the fundamentals of atomic energy.
