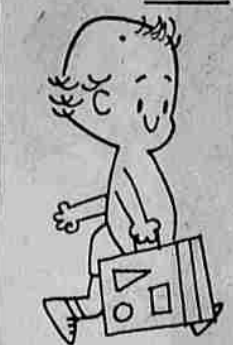
Engagement Told Of Miss Baker, Richard A. White
