## State Police, PUC Move Into Building North of Medford

A new one-story green and orange building on Highway 99 north of Medford's city limits houses the southwest district headquarters of the Oregon state police, the Medford state police patrol center and the area office of the public utilities commissioner.

Later this year, the Oregon motor vehicle license department will move to the new structure.

The new building gives state police and the PUC considerable more space. State police moved to the new building next door to the old office Friday. The PUC moved Saturday from its building at 1133 South Riverside ave.

Half of the building is being used by the state police, given them about one-third more space than before. The interior is mainly painted light green and cream with acoustical tile ceilings.

The enlarged areas are mainly in the squad room which may be used for patrol meetings and a glass enclosed communications room for radio and teletype.

The state police section of the building also includes an interrogation room.

Other offices include district offices for the captain

hall from the state police sergeant, Robert Middleton, who heads the PUC office here, said that they hope to be settled in their new offices by the end of this week.

Part of this space, however, will not be filled until the motor vehicle license department moves into the building sometime during the next four months.

## Hardships Seen in Teacher Pay Bill

Salem—UPI—Members of the Oregon School Boards association testified Monday that a bill to raise minimum salaries of Oregon teachers would work hardships on school districts already hard-pressed by adverse economic conditions.

Ted Jacobs of Tillamook, V. E. Goin of Jefferson, and Eugene Fisher of the association opposed SB60 before the Senate State and Federal Affairs committee.

Fisher, from Douglas county, said 190 school districts would have to hike salaries to meet schedules spelled out in the bill.

The bill, sponsored by Sen. Al Flegel (D-Roseburg), would increase minimums for teachers without a bachelor's degree from \$3,400 a year to \$3,600; those with a BA from \$3,700 to \$4,000; and those with a master's degree from \$4,400 to \$4,800.

## Reception Planned For Nixons' Return

Los Angeles—UPI—Vice President Richard M. Nixon and his wife return to their hometown tonight for the first time since he lost the presidential campaign last November.

A public reception was planned for the Nixons on their arrival at International Airport from a vacation near Tucson, Ariz.

A spokesman for the Welcome Home, Dick and Pat committee headed by H. C. McClellan said every person who turns up at the airport reception personally would meet the former vice president.

The Greater Los Angeles Press Club also announced that its "welcome home" banquet Wednesday night for the Nixons is sold out. The affair will be held in the 1,600-seat International Ballroom of the Beverly Hilton hotel.

## Classes Resume in Grants Pass School

Grants Pass—Classes at Grants Pass High school resumed at 9 o'clock this morning. The building was damaged in a strong wind storm Friday afternoon.

City School Superintendent Ralph E. Jones said the three most badly damaged rooms are not ready for use, and classes normally held in those rooms will be conducted elsewhere.

## In the Day's News

From Salem—

A measure has been introduced in the house of representatives of the Oregon Legislature whose purpose is to permit counties, cities and OTHER POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS to decide whether they want to initiate daylight saving time in their own areas.

May heaven save us from that mess! We had enough with it a dozen years or so ago. In that never-to-be-forgotten period, practically every county, every city, every town and even every school district was apt to have its own time.

It was AWFUL!

BUT—It might be a good idea to permit Oregon counties bordering on state lines to name their own time. That would avoid a lot of confusion in trading areas divided by state boundaries. The Medford, Klamath Falls and Lakeview areas are good examples of the confusion that results when there is Standard time on one side of the line and Daylight time on the other.

Frank Tarr, of Weyerhaeuser's Klamath Falls plant, told the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce the other day that his firm loses about four hours out of each working day in dealings with firms in California because of differences in opening and closing times and lunch hours.

Presumably the trading areas along the Oregon-Washington boundary have the same trouble. It is a frightful nuisance. Down this way, we certainly hope the Oregon legislature can see its way clear to do something about it.

In 1958, when a nation-wide book-reading survey was made. Some of those who did read a book barely got under the wire with "Lolita" or Erle Stanley Gardner. One of every two Americans doesn't read a book a year."

DR. BAXTER warned his audience that "it is very doubtful if you, your children or your grandchildren will know peace, security or even predictability (meaning by that a fairly accurate estimate of what is going to happen next) in your day."

He then gave his hearers what he called "the best preparation for keeping on an even keel during these years to come." This is his recipe: "A full mind, a broad mind and a ready wit."

IT ISN'T a bad recipe. And READING BOOKS is its most important ingredient. About a half century ago, Andrew Lang, in his "Old Friends," put the same thought in these words: "When others fail him, the wise man looks 'To the sure companionship of books.'"

HMMMMMMMM. Do you reckon the situation is as dark as Dr. Baxter paints it?

It is probably true that modern Americans read fewer books than their ancestors did. But they read MORE magazines. And they read MORE newspapers. In the earlier days of our nation, magazine circulations were quite small. Now they are immense. And there are more magazines to read.

FROM Los Angeles: Dr. Frank C. Baxter, English professor at the University of Southern California, told the Los Angeles County Bar Association the other day that Americans seem to be becoming non-book readers. He added: "One out of every three American college graduates DIDN'T READ A BOOK."

## President Kennedy Likes Fish Chowder And Goopy Desserts

Washington—UPI—President Kennedy is a fish chowder man—and that's just an appetizer.

Actually, he is an adventurer in eating. And he goes in for goopy desserts with lots of whipped cream, according to the First Lady's press secretary, Pamela Turnure, who brought the word back from the White House kitchen.

Since he moved into the White House, 31-year-old Jacqueline Kennedy has passed on the President's favorite recipes to the chef in the executive mansion, whose name is kept secret.

Brought Cook Books Mrs. Kennedy, who takes personal charge of the menus for small family dinners, brought along the recipe card file and cookbooks she had in her Georgetown home kitchen.

The big formal dinners at the White House are planned by the First Lady and her social secretary, Letitia Baldridge, who puts heavy accents on French cuisine when official guests come to dine.

President Kennedy was on his biggest fish chowder kick during the campaign. He used to set out from his Georgetown house with a thermos jug of it. Mrs. Kennedy had it made up in batches and stored in a freezer for frequent occasions when her husband would come home with a crowd of unexpected guests.

Unlike some women, Mrs. Kennedy is not possessive of her prize recipes. Here's the recipe: Fish Chowder 2 lbs. haddock; 1 bay leaf, crumbled; 2 oz. diced salt pork; 1 quart milk; 2 onions sliced; 2 tablespoons butter; 4 large potatoes diced; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 cup chopped celery; freshly ground pepper.

Simmer haddock in 2 cups water for 15 minutes. Drain. Reserve broth. Remove bones from fish. Saute diced pork until crisp, remove and set aside. Saute onion in pork fat until golden brown. Add fish, potatoes, celery, bay leaf, salt and pepper. Pour in fish broth, plus enough boiling water to make three cups liquid. Simmer 30 minutes. Add milk and butter. Simmer five minutes. Serve sprinkled with diced pork. Serves six.

Another Kennedy family favorite true to their New England heritage is:

Baked Seafood Casserole

1 pound crab-meat and lobster meat combined; 1 pound cooked and deveined shrimp; 1 cup mayonnaise; 1/2 cup chopped green peppers; 1/2 cup minced onion; 1 1/2 cups finely chopped celery; 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce; 2 cups crushed potato chips; paprika.

Mix ingredients all together as though making a seafood salad. Fill baking pan and completely cover with crushed potato chips. Sprinkle with paprika and bake at 400 degrees from 20 to 25 minutes. Twelve servings.

Still another favorite is:

Hot Fruit Dessert

3 small cans apricots; 3 small cans pineapple pieces; 3 small cans peaches; 3 number two size pitted bright cherries; 3 oranges; 3 lemons; 1/2 cup light brown sugar.

Grate rind of oranges and lemons into sugar. Spread fruits layer by layer including oranges and lemons sliced very thin in baking dish, sprinkle each layer with sugar mixture and a sprinkling of nutmeg. Heat all until very hot and serve topped with some sour cream.

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
