A-2 Teams Paired For Hoop Playoff

Lakeview will engage Sutherlin high at 7 p.m. and Henley will take on Glendale about 8:30 p.m. Friday in the opening round of the playoff for the District 6 A-2 basketball championship at Southern Oregon college gym in Ashland.

Friday winners battle in the Saturday night finals after a prelin between the Friday losers.

Henley was champ in the Rogue league and Lakeview runnerup. Sutherlin and Glendale are co-titlists in the Umpqua Valley circuit. The Umpqua clubs drew for playoff foes.

The Hornets of Henley go to Ashland with a 17-3 season record and their first title in

basketball since they took the Klamath B loop crown in 1943. Their Rogue mantle is their first major one since becoming an A-2 school. Lakeview, in this district since the start of basketball season, has a 16-4 status for the 1960-1961 campaign.

Sutherlin and Glendale had 9-3 marks in their circuit. The Glendale Wildcats have another shortie team with their tallest man listed at 5-10.

Three meetings are scheduled for the college gym in the afternoon. Principals of the Rogue league schools convene at 1 p.m. At 2 p.m. they will meet with coaches of the circuit. A District 6 A-2 session is set for 4 p.m.

SO Loop Concludes Basketball Slate

With the championship and state tournament berths all settled, Ashland's last chance for victory in the 1960-1961 season will be the main issue at stake this week end as the Southern Oregon conference completes its basketball slate.

Ashland, winless in all its 21 games so far this season, entertains Crater high on Friday when also, Klamath Falls will be at Grants Pass. Saturday games, dropping the curtain on the season, will be Medford at Klamath Falls and Grants Pass against Crater at Central Point.

An Ashland Grizzly triumph over Crater would have double significance for it was Crater which last week end stunned the state by handing Klamath Falls, Oregon's No. 1 rated team, its second loss of the season and its only one to date in the league.

The Grizzlies enter the game on a string of 37 straight defeats. Their last win on the

hoop court was in December of 1959 against Douglas of Winston.

Klamath Falls has the SO title safely tucked away but it would be boost to both Grants Pass and Medford prestige to trip the Pelicans.

Grants Pass has its last opportunity and Medford's only chance would come should KF and the Black Tornado fight their respective ways into the finals of the Oregon Class A-1 basketball tourney. The two District 6 teams will be in opposite brackets in the meet.

Klamath has beaten Ashland four times. Crater has three victories over Ashland and GP three over Crater.

UPI Names Collegiate Hoop Stars

New York—(UPI)—Olympic star Jerry Lucas, who is leading Ohio State's quest for a second straight national championship, was a near-unanimous choice on the 1961 college All-America basketball team announced today by United Press International.

The 6-foot, 8-inch Lucas, who is only a junior, was picked on the first team by 302 of the 304 sports writers and broadcasters throughout the nation who cast ballots in the UPI poll. One voter placed Lucas on the second team and only one omitted his name entirely.

Ohio State, last year's NCAA champion and unbeaten this year, scored a unique feat in placing Lucas on the first team and teammates John Havlicek on the second team and Larry Siegfried on the third team.

Fred Taylor, coach of the unbeaten Buckeyes, expressed delight that three members of his squad were able to achieve All-America status although every opponent was gunning for Ohio State all season.

Tennessee A-1 Tops Final Poll

New York—(UPI)—The tall and talented Tennessee State Tigers were named the nation's No. 1 small college basketball team for the 1960-61 season today by the United Press International Board of Coaches.

It was the second time in three years that the Tigers walked off with the UPI Trophy. They also won in 1959 and finished second behind Evansville in the national race last season.

Evansville, ironically, didn't garner a single vote in the final weekly balloting of the season.

The Purple Aces were the No. 1 pre-season choice of the coaches but got off to a poor start and finished the campaign with a 10-15 record.

Prospect, Chiloquin Clash for B Mantle

Prospect—"Stop Crume and control the ball."

That will be the aim of the Prospect High school Cougars in their playoff with Chiloquin, starting tonight, for the District 5B basketball diadem.

The two-of-three series is set for Oregon Technical Institute, Klamath Falls. Second game will be Friday night and third, if need, on Saturday.

Coach Duane Payne said that the Cougars of Prospect hope to win against the Panthers, as they did against St. Mary's, with ball control.

They aim to play a deliberate game and hold the running down.

Chiloquin is led by Sylvan Crume, who has a 20-plus scoring average for over the season. Second high scorer is Ed Case. Those two and Frank Hedlund made the Klamath-Lake county tournament all-star team. The Panthers averaged around 62 points in their three Klamath tourney games. They have scored well all season.

The Chiloquin club is lightning fast and likes to run. It has good reserve strength. Its speed, good scoring and bench helped it to the Klamath County B league crown as well as to the tourney championship. Gordon Kuist is Chiloquin coach.

Prospect, Jackson County champ, which has a balanced scoring threat, although Craig Gardner has been chief pointmaker, will rely much on defense against the Panthers and Coach Payne has said that defense could make the difference.

Mark Could Be Beaten By Boston

Portland—(UPI)—World broad jump record holder Ralph Boston will lead a host of the nation's top track and field competitors in the Far West Indoor Classic here Friday night.

Boston, who holds the world outdoor mark with a leap of 26-feet-11 1/4, will be attempting to shatter the indoor mark for the fourth week in a row. The Tennessee A&I star went 26-feet-6 1/2 last week end at the national AAU indoor games at New York to set a new standard.

The 15-event program also includes such names as shot putter Parry O'Brien, Olympic 400-meter dash champion Otis Davis, sprinters Rogee Cook and Harry Jerome, miler Daryl Burleson, hurdler Jerry Tarr, quarter-miler Eddie Southern, pole vaulters Aubrey Dooley and Ron Morris, broad jumper Darrell Horn and high jumper Hank Wyborny.

Boston, the man who broke Jesse Owens' long-standing record, could go 27 feet in the meet, according to meet director Sam Bell, who is head track coach at Oregon State college.

They start the season all over again in the Atlantic Coast and Southern conferences today, but as far as nationally ranked St. Bonaventure is concerned its one campaign is proving long enough.

West Virginia is an overwhelming favorite to win its seventh Southern conference title at Richmond while a close dogfight is expected between Duke and Wake Forest to decide the Atlantic Coast kingpin at Raleigh, N.C. The winner of each three-day championship receives an automatic berth in the NCAA tournament.

St. Bonaventure already has received and accepted an NCAA spot but must regain its early season form if it is to have any chance in the national tourney. The second-ranked Bonnies, after winning 21 of their first 22 games, now have dropped two in a row, including a 79-74 overtime decision to Duquesne Wednesday night.

Duquesne, which was pinning its hopes for an invite to the National Invitation Tournament on Wednesday night's game, rallied in the closing seconds of regulation time and then went ahead for good early in the extra session.

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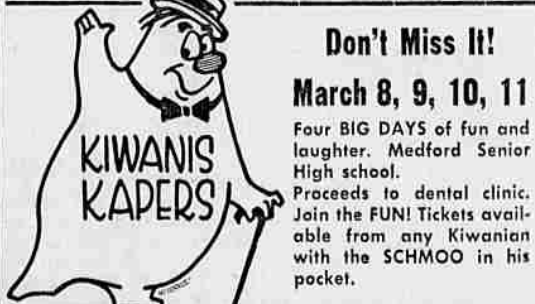
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
