Woman Explorer To Stay With Primitive Indians

New York—(UPI)—Curiosity about other peoples spurs Claudia Andujar into a life rare for a single woman of 29 years—living with primitive tribes of South America.

The Swiss-born brunette is en route to her third stay with the Carajas Indians who occupy an island in the interior of the Brazilian jungle.

To help her with the "photographic essays" she plans on the tribes, she took a filmmaking course at the City College of New York. Interviewed just before she ended her days as a coed, the girl explorer told why she chose the hardship of jungle living to the sophisticated life of New York or with her mother, now living in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

"I've always been interested in human behavior," she said. "In finding out about other peoples. It was while I was visiting mother that an anthropologist friend told me about the Carajas. . . I decided I'd try to study them."

Third Visit
This visit, scheduled for a few weeks after she arrives in Sao Paulo, will be her third with the Carajas in three consecutive years—first she went to win their friendship and confidence, and returned to photograph them at work and at play. A book on the Indians is scheduled for publication in the fall, she said.

"It is impossible to determine how ancient the tribe is," she said. "The Carajas can't write, so there are no records. They do believe that they were once fish. . . so all their ceremonial dances and festivities refer to this origin."
"They are a handsome, dark-haired people, about our height. The men wear only a loin cloth, and the older women do the same. But the younger women have heard they should cover the top, so what they've developed is pure chemise. . ."

Everybody Smokes
"The Carajas know little about the outside world," continued the photographer. "What they've learned of the Portuguese language—the language of Brazil, is from the river boat traders who supply sugar, salt, cloth and tobacco—everyone smokes, even the small children—in exchange for ceramics and featherwork."

It would be interesting to determine how many valley residents there are who have never seen a stage play, with "live" professional performers.

An article in a New York publication recently described a new program now being carried on by the Board of Education, the Lincoln Center for the Performing Art and various foundations to present dramatic, musical and operatic productions in schools of New York City and the immediate area. It was said that a survey showed that "80 per cent of the school audience at one performance had never before seen a live performance by professionals."

In view of the fact that New York City likes to consider itself the theatrical center of the nation, that it is filled with theaters, large and small, that it has several concert halls and boasts of the Metropolitan Opera company, this is astonishing.

Of course, it is no secret that many valley residents ignore the fine Shakespearean theater and company operating in their midst every summer.

Another interesting bit of information caught and held our attention this week. An article quoting the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization yearbook on food production, said Ireland topped the world's nations in 1958 on the basis of calories available per day.

If anyone had asked us what nation topped the list, we'd have said the United States, or maybe one of the Scandinavian countries, or Switzerland. As a matter of fact, several nations ranked higher than this one in 1958. (Figures for later years were not given). At any rate, the other nations were New Zealand, Denmark, Britain, Australia, Switzerland and Canada.

"The average Irish man had 3,500 calories at his beck and call per day in 1958 as compared to 3,100 calories for the average American," said the release. Hungriest country in the world that year was India, with 1,800 calories per day, the study showed.

This meager report gave no information as to how this study was made. Upon reflection, however, we decided that if the study was based on the ability of each person to buy adequate food, and if one considered the economic status of the Negroes, American Indians, those living in the slums of our big cities and those living in the chronically depressed areas, such as the coal regions, perhaps the figures could be true. Considering what has been said and published in recent years about food surpluses in this country, surely the study could not have been based on food production. But if we produce it, why can't it be made available to those who need it?

Following her graduation she spent two years in Philadelphia, where she studied with William Kincaid, first flutist with the Philadelphia Symphony orchestra and one of the country's foremost flute teachers.

While she was in Philadelphia Mrs. Rhee played first flute with the Wynnfield Symphony orchestra and the Germantown Symphony orchestra. She has also played solo recitals in Boise, Seattle, and Philadelphia and has appeared as soloist with the Boise Symphony orchestra.

In her appearance with the Little Symphony, Mrs. Rhee will play Telemann's "Suite in A Minor" for flute strings and Kent Kennan's "Night Soliloquy," also for flute and strings.
