Feeding the Family

Plentiful Lamb in Easy-to-do Curry

The family will thoroughly enjoy this easily and quickly made curry using plentiful flavorful lamb for a pleasant menu change. You'll need two pounds of boned and cubed lamb for six servings. Steam an extra supply of rice for savoring this distinctive sauce.

2 tablespoons salad oil
2 pounds boned lamb, cubed
Salt and pepper
2 large onions, thinly sliced
2 cups bouillon, canned or using cubes
2 teaspoons curry powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons flour

Heat salad oil; add lamb; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cook until lightly browned on all sides. Add onions, thinly sliced. Cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add bouillon, curry powder, salt and pepper; mix well. Cover and cook over low heat, 1 1/2 hours. Blend flour with a little of the hot mixture. If more curry is liked by the family, add it to the flour before blending. Add to remaining hot mixture and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened slightly.

Several Ways

1 can (1 pound) fruit cocktail or 1 can (1 pound) whole cranberry sauce
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/2 cup sugar
4 thin lemon slices
1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts or other nuts
1 package spice OR yellow cake mix
Whipping cream, optional

Drain fruit cocktail, then combine fruit with one-third cup of the cocktail syrup in nine-inch skillet or other pan with oven-proof handle; add butter, sugar and lemon slices. Cook over low heat until lemon is slightly tender, stirring occasionally. Add nuts and mix.

Prepare cake mix batter following directions on package. Carefully pour two cups batter over fruit cocktail mixture. Bake remaining batter as cupcakes. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, about 35 minutes or until done. Let stand on wire rack five minutes to cool slightly. Loosen cake around edges and turn out upside-down on serving plate. Serve topped with whipped cream or pass whipped cream.

If it's a cranberry cake you're making just use whole cranberry sauce instead of fruit cocktail and proceed as above.

Cottage Cheese Salad Combo

Tender curds of milk seasoned with cream; that's what creamed cottage cheese is made of. It is high in protein, low in calories, easy to serve, a bargain to buy.

Heap cottage cheese on crisp greens, surround with any of these: spiced beef, tiny carrot sticks, bright red apple slices, pitted prunes, orange sections, canned pear or peach halves. Serve with any favored French dressing.

Combine cottage cheese with any of these, using 1 1/2 cups (12 ounces) cheese to one-half cup of: diced cucumber, celery or green pepper; drained, crushed pineapple; silvered toasted almonds or pecans; grated carrot plus one-fourth cup chopped peanuts and/or raisins.

Fruit-Nut Upside-down Cake is Downright Good

Here is a two-in-one special. Recipe for Fruit and Nut Upside-down Cake makes dessert for tonight and cupcakes for tomorrow. Furthermore you can make fruit and nut upside-down cake using canned fruit cocktail or you can make a cranberry nut upside-down cake. Not only that, you can use a packaged cake mix or a yellow cake mix. Obey that impulse and try it!

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Proposals Heard On Overlapping of Farms and Suburbs

Salem — (UPI) — The Senate Local Government Committee sought ways Thursday to protect farmers and cities in agricultural lands and suburbs which are beginning to overlap.

The committee considered two proposals.

One, sought particularly by Lane county, would give zoning boards the same control over farm lands which they now have over other areas.

The other, urged by farmers, would give relief to farm lands used exclusively for farming, even if the lands had a higher value because of nearby subdivisions or industry.

Control Said Nullified

Howard Buford, director of the Central Lane County Planning Commission, said a recent Circuit Court ruling had nullified the commission's control over lands used partially for agriculture.

This meant, he said, that a farmer could convert part of his land to heavy industrial use as long as he continued to use the rest of the land for farming.

He asked the committee to permit zoning of farm lands for "exclusive" farm use, in order to prevent multiple use without zoning board control.

Would Defer Taxes

Rep. Joe Rogers (R-Ind.) said farmers who want to continue farming on lands adjacent to cities must have tax relief through farm use zoning. He said many farmers were being forced off their lands because taxes increased as adjacent subdivisions made the property more valuable.

A bill before the House Tax Committee would defer taxes on farm land as long as it was used exclusively for farming. If a farmer decided to sell the land, he would have to pay up the back taxes.

Sen. Robert Straub (D-Eugene) said he felt if land were zoned exclusively for farming, that would automatically prevent assessment of the land on value for housing or industry. Sen. Lyndel Newberry (R-Talent) said he feared exclusive zoning of farm land would make farmers feel more "restricted." He said he doubted Jackson county voters "would ever adopt a zoning ordinance" if this provision were included.

Dr. Mulling Talks At Coos Meeting

Ashland — Dr. Leon C. Mulling, director of the speech and hearing center at Southern Oregon college, spoke before the Coos Bay Education association recently on "You and Your Place in Speech Correction."

Dr. Mulling stressed the importance of a teacher in assuming an active role in the correction and improvement of a child's speech and not leaving all responsibility to a speech therapist.

He said that in schools in which no therapist exists, the classroom teacher can help the child with a speech defect by building his confidence, not calling attention to the problem, setting up enjoyable group speech lessons which strongly emphasize phonics, and seeing that the child is referred to correct sources such as doctors and guidance clinics.

Following the speech, teachers examined a display of materials which would be of help in the classroom.
