

Fields, Shaw in Oregon A-1 Wrestling Tournament Finals

Corvallis - Two Medford High school entrants, Wayne Fields, 141, and Chuck Shaw, 191, reached the Saturday night finals in their respective weight classes in the Oregon Class A-1 wrestling tournament here.

Al Funston, 178, also of the Black Tornado, was in contention for third place after Saturday afternoon semifinals.

Three other Medford participants, Bill Owen, 130, Larry Gunn, 137, and Chuck Holt, 168, were out of the running, as were three grapplers from Crater High school, Butch Barber, 155, Dave White, 123, and Dennis Fisher, 136.

Klamath Falls had five men in the finals in top running for the title, and Grants Pass had Gary Stevens, 148.

Fields last night faced Ron Barrett, Centennial, 190 state runner-up at 136 pounds. On Friday he beat Al Mendel-

cow, Lebanon, third in state last year, 6-1, and Hank Thomas, Scappoose, 7-1. In yesterday's semifinal, Fields took a referee's decision after tying 1-1 with Gary Blakeley, Redmond, in overtime. The two were 3-3 after the regular three rounds, and Fields trailed 0-3 going into the third.

Shaw Met Hancock
In his three matches Shaw defeated Doug John, Roseburg, 7-1, Art Makinster, Tillamook, 5-0, and Wilson Allen, Corvallis, 6-1. In the finale he ran up against Gary Hancock, Klamath Falls.

Funston lost yesterday afternoon to Gerald Franzen, David Douglas, by a third round pin then won in consolation over Gary Tuinstra, North Eugene, 11-5. His foe last night was Tony Dressell, Newberg, the 1960 champ, whom Medford Coach Art Keith tutored as a sophomore at Newberg.

On Friday Funston defeated Jerry Wright, Oswego, 6-2 and lost to Duffy Brown, Wilson, 9-4. Wilson later lost, eliminating Fisher.

Chosen Doran Duncan, Sweet Home, 5-2, and Rick Jackson, Silverton, 9-7.

Owen was beaten in Saturday consolation 4-1, by George Myran, Lebanon. On Friday Owen defeated Bill Johns, Marshfield, 7-2, and lost to Ron Calhoun, Clackamas.

Gunn on Friday was pinned in the second round by Bob Davidson, David Douglas, and Holt was defeated by Charles Holliday, Prineville, 5-4. The Medford entrants lost out when Davidson and Holliday, 1960 third in state, were eliminated.

Crater's Barber won his first match 7-5 from Dennis Cornish, Reynolds, lost to Dick Berkland, North Bend, 2-2, and lost to Ron Hadda, Hillsboro, 2-0.

White won from G. W. Marcial, Roseburg, 6-2 and was beaten by Larry Christy, Cleveland, 8-2. Then, John Stopa, Newberg, beat the Comet grappler, 5-2. Christy was a tourney runner-up last year.

Fisher beat Jerry Wright, Oswego, 6-2 and lost to Duffy Brown, Wilson, 9-4. Wilson later lost, eliminating Fisher.

Cusic, Kline Take First In Holiday Golf Handicap

Howard Cusic and Dick Kline, competing against the largest field in the history of the tournament, won the holiday golf handicap at Rogue Valley Country club with a record score of 41 points.

The tournament ran from Dec. 1 to March 1 with 54 two-man teams taking part. A minimum of 12 matches were required to qualify for honors. Cusic and Kline got their 41 markers in 13 contests.

C. A. Holmes and Paul Hav-

land finished second in the tourney with 36 points for 20 matches and Bob Fasel and Leonard Schildt took third with 35 for 14 times on the course.

Dr. Ralph Odell and Dr. Dave Engleson attempted to close some of the distance early last week but managed only to break even with Jack Mitchell and Bob Van Duker. This left Odell and Engleson in fourth spot with 32.

Best Ball Record

Dick Travis and Bill Jennings had 26, Randall Gifford and Jack Six 24 and Tom Teuch and Ranny Smith 22.

Players played full 18-hole matches with their rivals and gained plus or minus points according to how many holes they were ahead or behind their adversaries after 18.

Karl Clinkenbeard and Paul Sparto set a tourney record with a 57 low net best ball score in one of their matches. They nipped Cusic and Kline who netted 58. Bob Morris and Ed Simmons combined for a 60 as did Travis and Jennings.

Matches in this tournament alone totaled 1,140.

Qualifying for the spring golf handicap is under way and will continue through Sunday, March 12.

Portland - Freshman Bob Petersen and sophomore Sam-

my Smith, members of the Oregon Collegiate conference championship basketball team from Oregon Tech, were unanimous choices of conference coaches for the 1961 All-Conference team.

Only one senior was named to the six-man first unit. He's Don Bridges of Portland State and a second team choice last year. Another sophomore and two juniors complete the first team. The second year man is PSC's 6-6 center Bill Turner. The juniors receiving the coaches nod for first team berths are Larry Applegate, the second best collegiate scorer in the Northwest this

season, and Oregon Tech guard Leon Wilson.

Six Selected
Since there was a three-way tie in the balloting for the final two first team berths, six players were named to the top unit. A similar situation resulted in the vote for second team berths and six also were named to the alternate unit.

Four seniors and a pair of juniors were second team choices. The seniors are Tom Neel of Eastern Oregon, Gordie Carrigan of Southern Oregon, Dennis Spencer of Oregon College and Pasco Arriola of Eastern Oregon. The juniors are John Payne of Southern Oregon and Ron Hunt of Eastern Oregon.

There were no repeaters on the first team from a year ago. Carrigan dropped to the second team along with EOC's Hunt and PSC's Don Powell rated only honorable mention this year, the same as Frank Chase of PSC who was a second team selection last winter. John Payne of SOC repeated as a second team choice.

His main appearance will be at American Legion junior baseball open house at Central Point on the evening of Monday, March 13. This event, sponsored by Bill Askeith, of the Cheney Studio, and Donald E. Faber, Central Point developer, will be at the Crater high cafeteria.

Mails will address the Medford Rotary club on Tuesday, March 14, and the Medford Kiwanis club on the following day. Radio interviews are planned.

Mails was a pitcher for the Cleveland Indians and St. Louis Cardinals in the majors, hurling for the world champion Indians of 1920. He also played in the Northwestern and Southern, Pacific Coast leagues and the American association.

Brumel Outjumps Thomas Third Time

New York - (UPI) - Valery Brumel of Russia, the world's undisputed high jump champion, had only one parting word of advice today for defeated John Thomas-practice.

The 18-year-old Russian completed an all-victorious United States tour by breaking the world indoor record with a jump of 7 feet, 3 1/2 inches Friday night in the Knights of Columbus track meet at Madison Square Garden.

The old record of 7-3 was set by Thomas last month at Boston and was equaled by Brumel in his U.S. debut two weeks ago in the New York

A.C. meet. However, Thomas again disappointed a crowd of 14,255 at the Garden Friday night when he failed to clear seven feet.

It was the third straight week Brumel had outclassed the Boston University student, who was celebrating his 20th birthday.

Asked what's wrong with Thomas, Brumel explained that he did not watch Long John jump because he always sits with his back to the pit when his rivals are competing.

"But I think all Thomas needs is more practice," said the Russian youth.

Boston Proves Hit Of Track Program

Portland - (UPI) - World broad jump champion Ralph Boston didn't set any records in the Far West track and field Classic Friday night but he was easily the hit of the show.

Boston, who had broken the indoor record in his specialty three times in the last three weeks, captured first place in the broad jump and the 60-yard high hurdles events and took a second in the high jump.

The Tennessee A & I star, who lengthened the indoor broad jump mark to 26 feet, 6 1/4 inches at New York last week end, won this time out, in 25-7 1/4.

His time in the hurdles was 7.1 seconds, only one-tenth of a second off the world indoor mark.

And in the high jump he went 6-foot-7. Hank Wyborne of Washington State won the event at 6-foot-9.

Cook Equals Record
Stubby Roscoe Cook of Oregon equaled the world record in the 60-yard dash in six seconds flat for the third time in his career and the second this year. Several others are co-holders of the mark.

Miler Dyrrol Burleson of Oregon and pole vaulter Ron Morris also turned in sparkling performances.

Morris, who collected a silver medal at last summer's Olympic Games at Rome won with a leap of 15 feet, 1 1/4 inches and Burleson, who said he was running to win and

not for a fast time, came out on top in a sizzling 4:03.8.

Parry O'Brien, two-time Olympic shot put champion, won with a heave of 62 feet, 6 1/4 inches and Jack Yerman, former California star quarter-miler, came in first in the 500-yard dash in 57.4.
