Legal Rights of Oregon Women Is AAUW Topic

Women in Oregon enjoy legal rights at least equal to men and in some instances enjoy greater protection under the law, attorney Eugene Piazza told Medford branch of American Association of University Women last week.

Legal rights of women have varied from civilization to civilization and era to era, he said. Mr. Piazza explained that the American legal system derives from the English system developed following the Norman conquest. Sir William Blackstone's commentaries published in 1775 is the basis for much English law. It was interpreted as a very hard law for married women.

Three types of law form our legal structure. They are: common law, which is developed through judicial pronouncements; equity law, based on natural reason or ethical judgment; and statutory law, developed by legislation. **Vote To Women**

Oregon legislators were forward-looking, the speaker said, when they amended the constitution to allow women to vote in 1913, seven years before the 19th amendment to the Constitution of the United States. Oregon's amendment lifted restrictions against women holding political office.

According to Mr. Piazza, some Oregon laws are more lenient for women. He cited the lower legal marriage age, and the fact that a wife is subject to suit for payment of debts for family necessities for two years after contraction of the debt, but this is six years for a husband.

Though there is discrimination against women in labor fields, the intent of the law is to provide protection and safeguards for health, Mr. Piazza added. Women in Oregon may own or sell property, contract for anything a man is able to, and be sued the same as any man.

Dower Right
Mr. Piazza explained that the dower right assures the married woman the use of one-half of the property of her husband during her lifetime, and that the husband cannot destroy this right without her consent. The courtesy right is the same, but applies to the husband.

In response to a question, Mr. Piazza said that the community property law was in
