Plentiful Food Supplies Reviewed by Government

(The following guide to the nation's plentiful food buys for this week-end was prepared by United Press International in cooperation with the U. S. Departments of Agriculture and Interior.)

Washington (UPI) — Lenten-time food shoppers will be able to find most of their favorite foods in plentiful supply as March begins. Still in good supply and bearing favorable price tags are beef in most of the popular cuts, pork, lamb, and poultry, particularly broiler-fryers and turkeys. Eggs and dairy products continue an excellent value, too.

At the vegetable bins, menu-planners will find good supplies of most of the old-time favorites. These include potatoes and sweet potatoes, tomatoes, lettuce, celery and carrots, cabbage, squash, broccoli, cauliflower, onions, radishes and green peppers.

Fruit counters still carry a fairly wide selection of items. These include oranges and grapefruit, lemons and limes, many popular varieties of apples, bananas and western pears. Avocados are fairly plentiful, too. Strawberries are arriving in increasing quantities, but prices, for the early season, are fairly high as yet.

In the fish line, for lenten fare, plentiful include both fresh and frozen shrimp and scallops, and fish sticks and portions.

Now, for a closer look at plentiful foods in this particular area:

West - Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming: Consumers, this week,

will find increased available supplies of eggs, and early vegetables, and ample supplies of beef and pork. With egg production increasing, prices on medium and small sizes are down 1 to 2 cents per dozen in the Seattle area and large sizes are unchanged to 4 cents lower with smalls down 2 cents in the San Francisco area. Ready-to-cook turkeys are in fairly good supply and slightly lower priced in California markets. Also, at unchanged to slightly weaker price levels in California are ready-to-cook fryer chickens. Beef prices are down 1 to 2 cents in the Northwest and slightly stronger in the Los Angeles area. Cured hams and bacon range 2 to 4 cents lower per pound in the San Francisco area and up about 1 cent in the Portland area. Lamb is in moderate supply but showing some increase in volume. Butter continues in moderate supply and unchanged in price. Fresh fruit and vegetables in plentiful supply are apples, grapefruit, oranges, lemons,

Teachers from various areas gave teaching demonstrations. Talks were given by educators and otologists and a panel discussion followed.

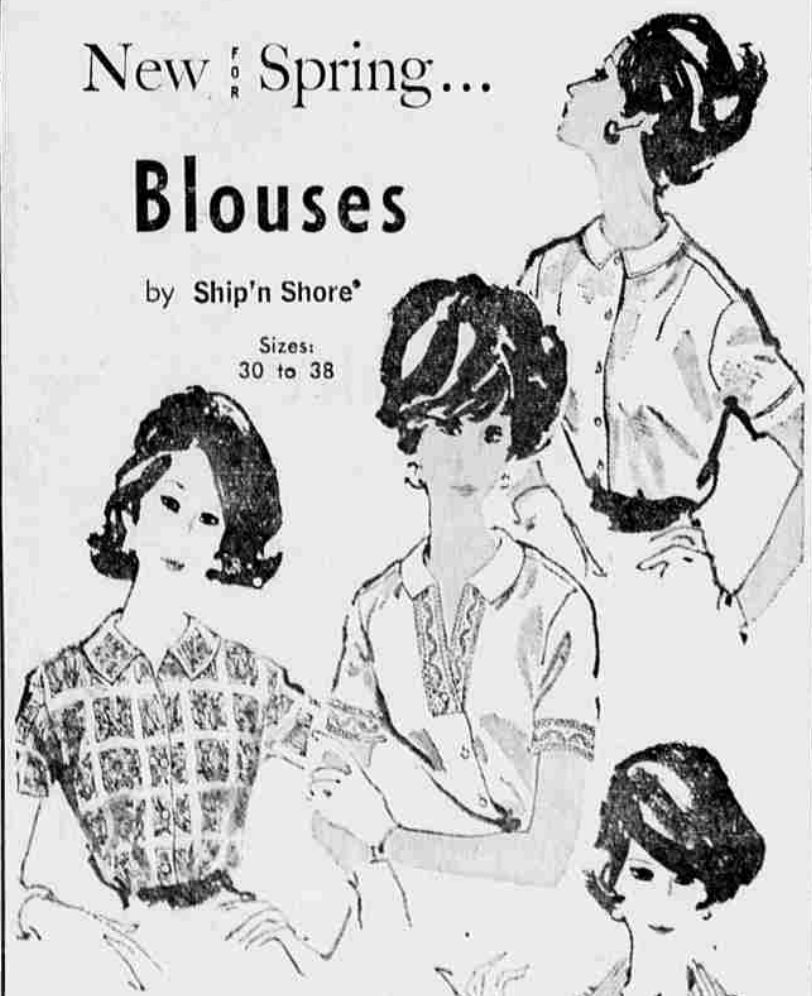
