Honolulu - (UPI) - Dr. Syngman Rhee, former president of the Republic of Korea, was reported in fair condition Friday at Tripler Army Hospital where he was being observed for a suspected cardiovascular ailment.

Rhee, 83, was admitted to the hospital late Wednesday night. He suffered a "fainting spell" as he was being released Thursday after an overnight observation stay.

His physician said the former Korean president also would be treated in the light of "previous ailments and medical difficulties." Rhee has suffered double pneumonia three times.

Rhee came to Hawaii with his Austrian-born wife, Frances, last May "to relax in solitude" after being forced to resign as president a month earlier.
