Hints About Constipation

It is remarkable how few requests I get for information in regard to constipation. It certainly is a very common annoyance that bothers thousands of people. I imagine a high percentage of them take a laxative pill of some kind.

Many physicians object to this and speak of a harmful "laxative habit." I imagine the habit is common enough, but I do not see persons who, in my estimation, have been injured by it.

There is one hint which I think could help many people, and this is that after the bowel has been cleaned out well with a laxative, it takes three days for it to fill up again. Hence it is that one need not take a pill every night. A pill twice a week might work well enough. Also, if a pill is not taken every day the bowel is not likely to become so accustomed to the medicine that it no longer will respond well to it.

Many persons would not be so anxious about their bowels if they knew that no disaster would come to them if they did not get a movement every day. I know strong, healthy people who regularly go a week or 10 days without a movement. They, of course, are somewhat insensitive. A highly sensitive person may get abdominal discomfort, or even pain, with perhaps much burping and much gas within

six or seven hours after missing the usual morning movement. Such a person can get complete relief in 10 minutes by taking an enema of a bag full of warm water with a heaping tablespoonful of table salt in it. The salt makes a solution like the tears in the eyes which will not irritate the bowel. Many physicians order their patients never to take an enema, but I have never been able to learn why they do this. I have examined the colons of women who had taken at least one enema a day for 10 years or so, and I could not see that they had done themselves any harm. Many women tell me an enema does not work for them, but I know why. The moment it hurts, they let the water out—which means that they clean out only the rectum, and this usually is not enough. To get a good result from an enema one must stand the discomfort of running in one or two quarts, then one can let the water run out.

Many persons could relieve their constipation by taking each day some roughage-containing fruit, such as canned figs and canned plums. The secret of success is to take the figs for three or four days and then change to plums for three or four days. If one keeps taking the same type of roughage, the colon is likely soon to become insensitive to it.

Many old people seldom have a bowel movement because they eat but little food and that perhaps with so little roughage in it that they have almost nothing in them out of which to make a stool.

BROKEN CRYSTAL?

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Russian Trawler Shadows Atom Sub

Dunoon, Scotland—UPI—A Russian trawler shadowed the U.S.S. Proteus, coming within one-half mile of the Polish submarine tender off the Irish coast before hurrying off when a plane appeared, according to Capt. Richard Laning of the Proteus.

Laning shrugged off the incident as "amusing."

He said it "could be made to sound dramatic but it was not."

Laning said the Proteus was in the Atlantic ocean off Ireland Thursday en route to its new base in Scotland when "this little trawler came over the horizon and came slowly toward us."

"About half a mile from our starboard bow," he said, "she stopped, looked us around, then passed us on the opposite course, turned around our stern and came up from the port quarter."

Laning said the trawler "hailed out and headed north rather rapidly" when a British press plane appeared overhead.

Catholic Parents Cancel Protest

Charleston, S. C.—UPI—An organization of Roman Catholic parents, threatened with excommunications and charging unwelcome outside interference, Monday night called off a meeting to protest parochial school desegregation.

The newly formed "Organization of Catholic Parents" had scheduled a meeting in a civic auditorium to discuss ways of slowing integration of South Carolina parochial schools. An attempt to use church facilities for the meeting had been met with a flat refusal by the group's pastor.

The Most Rev. Paul H. Hallinan, bishop of the Charleston Diocese which takes in the entire state, had issued a pastoral letter Feb. 19 telling Roman Catholics to prepare for desegregation of parochial schools.

Persons arriving for the meeting Monday night found a cancellation notice at the entrance to the auditorium. A spokesman for the parents' organization told newsmen the meeting was called off because "we wanted to keep it in the family and newsmen wanted to attend."

Bishop Hallinan's earlier warnings possibly had affected the cancellation. The bishop had reminded the group that those who resisted the church edict "could not expect their status in the church to remain unchanged."
