He presented the club with a new 50 star flag to replace the obsolete one they were using.

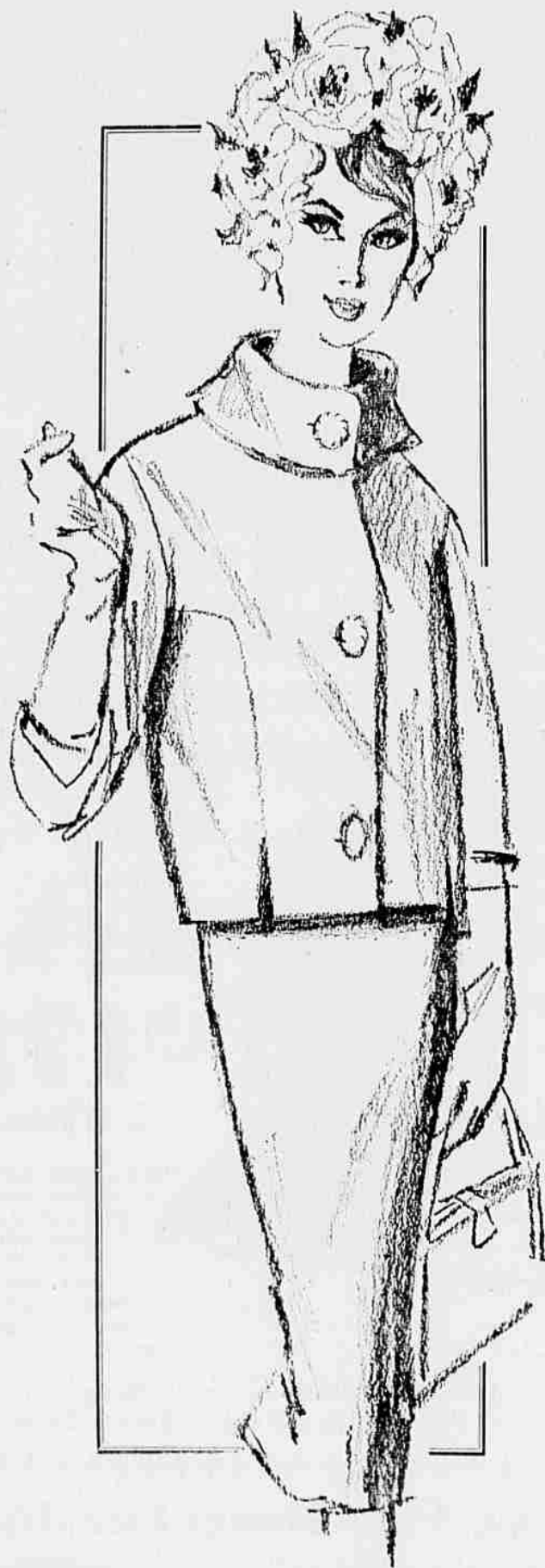
Redfords Return
