

Stilt Gets 67 Tallies

When Wilt Chamberlain was told he needed 83 more points in his last three National Basketball association games to reach 3,000 for one season, he went right out and tried to collect them all in one contest.

Chamberlain almost succeeded as he scored 67 points for Philadelphia Thursday night in a 135-126 victory over New York. It was a personal NBA high for the Warriors' Big Dipper, but fell four points short of the record 71 set by Elgin Baylor of Los Angeles against these same Knicks earlier this season.

Boston took another nip out of Detroit's determined effort for a playoff berth in the Western division by edging the Pistons, 119-118. The loss dropped Detroit into a third-place tie with Cincinnati.

Dolph Schayes scored 30 points as Syracuse ended a six-game losing streak with a 129-119 victory over St. Louis. Cliff Hagen and Bob Pettit each had 34 points for the Hawks.

Medford's Quinney and Ragsdale on All-Star

KF Places Patzke, Brickner, Palmberg On All-Conference

Medford's Bob Quinney, the circuit's highest scorer, and Klamath Union High school's Bruce Brickner, the league's tallest man, led selections on the Medford Mail Tribune's 1961 All-Southern Oregon conference basketball squad.

They were the only two to receive all possible points in the balloting by coaches and players of the five member high schools. But, the other three choices, on a first team of three players from conference champion Klamath Falls and two from runner-up Medford, were not far behind in tabulations.

Rounding out the No. 1 quintet were Dick Ragsdale, Medford, and Gary Patzke and Wally Palmberg, Klamath Falls.

To name the all-stars, teams and coaches voted on an all-opponent basis. Two points were given for a first team vote and one point for a second team selection. Quinney and Brickner each received 16 points for all eight possible first team votes. Ragsdale and Patzke each tabulated 15 points. Fourteen went to Palmberg.

Sixth high in the voting and topping the second team was Loyal Higinbotham, Crater, second highest scorer in the league. He gained 12 points. Rounding out the No. 2 quintet were Clyde Murray, Grants Pass, Fred Biehn, Klamath Falls, Jim Barry, Medford, and Louis Alvarez, Crater.

Of the first team Ragsdale, 5-11, and Brickner, 6-7, were repeaters from the 1960 all-conference first team. Quinney, 6-4, and Patzke, 6-3, moved up from the second team picked a year ago. Patzke is the lone junior on the team. The others are seniors.

The five top team men had a combined total of 1,528 points scored in games this season, 1,111 of them in conference games. Quinney had 437 points for the season and 340 for the circuit. Palmberg, a 5-11 player, had 309 and 217 despite being sidelined three games by an appendectomy.

Brickner, out four games because of mumps, contributed 284 and 188 markers to the team's totals.

Juniors getting junior varsity awards were Bill Dones, Bill Hogue and Joe Keller. Sophomores were Max Christian, Jerry Pitts, Martin Sharp, Bob Mettenrich, Art Deckard, Dean Everham, Tom Metz and Larry McCamman.

Pelican cause, Patzke had 267 and 189 and Ragsdale 231 and 177.

Palmberg was third high, Brickner fourth, Patzke fifth and Ragsdale seventh in full season scoring among league players. For the loop Palmberg was third, Patzke fourth and Brickner fifth while Ragsdale ranked eighth.

The No. 1 crew represents a fine balance of height, scoring and playmaking.

Higinbotham had 354 and 269 totals for his second high in scoring among SO loop teams. Murray on the second team was the sixth ranking scorer on the full season basis (236) and the seventh in conference games (181). Barry (228) ran eighth for the full campaign and sixth (187) for the league.

Schmeling Comments About Odds

Palm Beach, Fla. (UPI) — Former world heavyweight champion Max Schmeling of Germany warned today that Ingemar Johansson should not be underestimated in Monday's title battle with Floyd Patterson.

"I am not picking either man," he emphasized, "but I have heard odds which make Patterson a 4-1 or 18-5 favorite. If one man is truly a 4-1 favorite, the two men do not belong in the same ring in a championship fight."

Closed circuit television showing of the Ingemar Johansson-Floyd Patterson heavyweight boxing bout will be presented Monday evening at the Craterian theatre here. The theatre yesterday afternoon was reported about 150 tickets of a sellout.

"I like punchers, and both these men can punch. But Johansson can punch better with his right than Patterson can. This doesn't mean I pick Johansson to win, but it does mean that this will be a very even fight — it is not any 4-1 affair."

Schmeling pointed out that both men are in fine physical condition, and that there is no psychological edge to either.

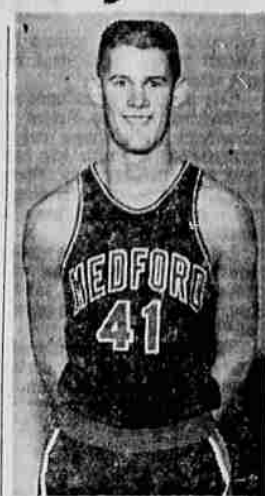
"Patterson underestimated Johansson in the first fight, Ingemar underestimated Floyd in the second," Max said. "Now each has proper respect for the other."

"Really, it is taking the easy way to just guess at a winner and a round. You must look carefully at both men and when you do that for this fight, you have to say that either man could win."

Woods, Water, Wildlife

There is some reason to believe that the issue of using water from the main stem of the Rogue river for industry has been settled for some time. Until the basin development plan is complete and there is a surplus of water in the river, we can rest awhile from the battle to save the Rogue. All we can hope for is a breather because there's always another fight in the making.

SENATE BILL 36
There is one hurdle that should be overcome before industry is allowed to use water from the main stem of the Rogue, and that is the problem of pollution.

Senate Bill No. 36, if passed as it now is amended, would dull the teeth of the state sanitary authority so that there never would be a guarantee against pollution. The common man can find his only real protection from industry in the law, and then only if it is enforced.

WHOSE WATER?

One problem that is plaguing many conservationists at the present time is the problem of water rights. Does the state have jurisdiction over that water entirely within its boundaries, or does the right of the federal government supersede that of the state? The Pelton decision gave a fairly conclusive answer to the question, and it can be expected that the Supreme Court will continue to decide in favor of the federal government. This makes every stream in the Northwest vulnerable to power development.

BUZZARD ROOST

Our own case in point is found in the proposed dam on the Illinois — Buzzard Roost. It would appear that there are two alternative plans of action that could change the present situation. There is some question as to which plan would be most effective.

One plan would be to have congress pass a law giving the state jurisdiction over those waters that originate, for the most part, within its boundaries. This would stop the Pelton-like decisions of the federal Supreme Court. A difficulty from the conservationist's point of view lies in the fact that some states still do not give any consideration to the use of water for fish or recreation. This would limit the effectiveness of this change.

The second plan would be to change, through congressional action, the laws empowering the federal power commission. The FPC makes its decisions on the basis of law, and if the law made fish and recreation values to be considered, one might expect decisions somewhat less harmful to the cause of conservation.

One thing is for sure — the cure for our ills lies in action on the federal level.

THE ANGLER'S LOG

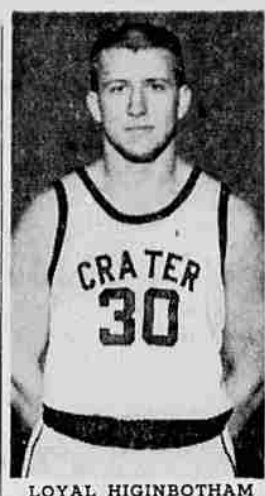

FISHERMEN

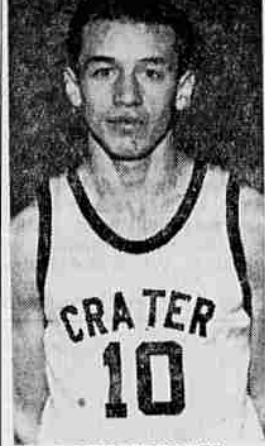
There were approximately 7,000 anglers days spent on the river by both shore anglers and boat fishermen. An angler day is one fisherman out to fish for any length of time. A breakdown of 49 interviews, a rather small sample for use, showed that the average fisherman spent 3.9 hours on the river. It was found that the distribution of fishermen was equal along the entire open area.

Challenger For Wilma Foreseen

Fresno, Calif. — UPI — McLane High School track coach Jack Wilcox thinks that a pretty senior may challenge Wilma Rudolph for the title of world's speediest female.

Seventeen-year-old Carol Smith was clocked in 6.2 seconds for the 50-yard dash during an interclass meet Thursday. She made the mark despite tripping slightly towards the end of the race.

Carol also ran the 75-yard distance in 8.7 seconds.

Wilcox, former Fresno State miler, said Carol ran an unofficial 5.9 seconds in practice last week. He said the five foot, 120 pound senior, who came to McLane this year, has been running in competition for more than three years in women's track meets throughout the state and winning most of the time.

Compare Favorably

Carol's times for the 50 compare favorably to those of Miss Rudolph, who won three gold medals in the 1960 Olympics. She has run the distance in six seconds flat indoors.

Coach Wilcox says of his prize protegee, "Carol is very fast out of the blocks and has a good lift. She also has good wind, which I guess she gets somewhat from playing bagpipes in the school's Highlander musical unit."

Carol, the daughter of a Fresno elementary school principal, plans to enter La Verne College, in Southern California this fall.

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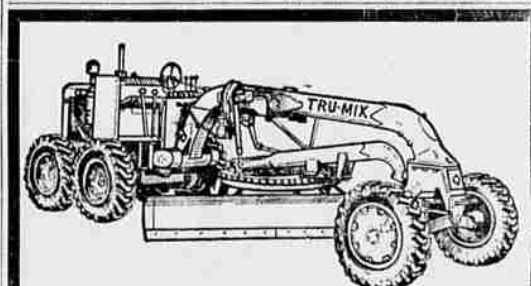


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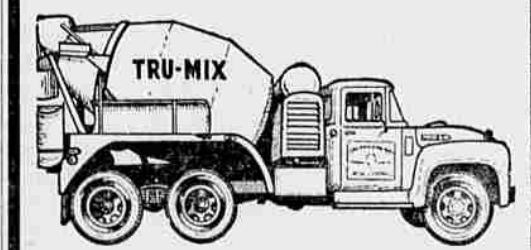
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
