Painting 'The Crucifixion' Is Subject of Meeting

Yreka - Colored pictures of the painting of the crucifixion, by the artist, Jan Styka of Poland, were projected on a large screen by an opaque projection machine at the meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service Tuesday, March 7, at the First Methodist church. Mrs. Halbert Smith was narrator.

This painting, one of the largest in the world, is now installed in a building especially built for it at the Forest Lawn cemetery in Glendale, Calif. The painting is called "The Crucifixion" and is 195 feet long and 45 feet wide. The building is named the "Hall of Crucifixion" and there are special tours and meetings for the public. Those who have seen it claim it to be awe-inspiring.

The artist took years to assemble his materials and had a canvas especially woven. The actual painting time was about 12 to 14 years. It was brought to this country in 1900 by Dr. Hubert Eaton of Chicago. The Rev. Harold Coleman sang a solo, "Beneath the Cross of Jesus" at the close of the devotional period.
