Rogue Gallery Announces Exhibits by Expatriates

An Expatriates show will open at Rogue gallery, 220 West Main street, Wednesday, March 15.

The show will be made up of a collection of arts and crafts produced by four former Medford residents, Gretchen McAllister, Arthur Carpenter, Norbert Miksche and Merlin Dow. All four earn a living and are nationally recognized in their particular field of endeavor.

The four were members of the same graduating class of Medford High school and were active in school affairs. Also a member of the class was Eugene Bennett, Medford artist who recently had a one man show at the gallery.

Mr. Carpenter, who whose works are labeled "Espanet," is now living in Bolinas, Calif. Included in his section of the show is an assortment of bowls, a music stand, a stool, a silver chest and several large platters. Mr. Carpenter, who states that his output is primarily furniture made with California walnut, has a shop and showroom in Bolinas.

Mr. Miksche, who uses his nickname, Mike, is a commercial artist now living in New York City. Known primarily for his advertising layouts, his work has appeared in such nationally known magazines as Newsweek. His displayed work will include some of these layouts, a collection of drawings, collages and a unique series of pictures done with hand stamps. His series of figures depicting Olympic sports, produced for Sports Illustrated, was recently purchased by the San Antonio museum for a permanent collection.

The artist has just completed a one-man show in Chicago.

Miss McAllister designs jewelry in silver, gold, platinum, precious and semi-precious stones. She has a shop in San Francisco located at the base of Telegraph hill and called Local Color, which has been in operation for 12 years. One of her gold and pearl rings won a purchase award at the San Francisco Art Festival three years ago.

Mr. Dow, now in Los Angeles, produces his own line of hand-printed wallpapers for the interior design trade. His shop is known as Wonderland Designs. He will be represented in the Rogue gallery show by three large wall-paper murals and eight repeat patterns; he will also display two watercolors and a small oil painting.

He has won national awards and his work has been shown in the Cleveland Art museum. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dean Dow, formerly lived in Medford.

Gallery hours are from 12 noon to 4 p.m. every day except Mondays. Sunday, March 19, a reception in connection with the new show will be held at the gallery from 8 to 10 p.m.

Adult winners in oil were: First, "Fog on the River," number 55, by Gail Caperna; second, "Before the Storm," number 101, by Harry Watson; third, "Evening Shower," number 82, by Victoria Stanley, Eagle Point.

Most popular watercolors by adults included: First, "Ben Hur," number 50, by Mrs. Blanche Johnson; second, "Evening Service," number 56, by Mrs. Caperna; third, number 62, by Marie B. Stark. The drift-wood sculpture, "Prophet," number 157, by Jack Teeters and the wood sculpture, "Implausibility of Death to Yoxocle," number 4, by T. C. Staley, earned first and second places respectively in adult sculpture.

Susan Caperna's oil painting, "Blue Girl from a Dream," number 53-S, earned more votes than any other entry in the show; and number 129-S, by Nancy Brown, placed second in oils in the student division.

The work numbered 114-S, by Carl Washburn, was most popular of the student watercolors.

Student sculptures placing were all in wood. They were: First, "The Chipmunk," number 1-S, by Tom Kerr; second, number 158-S, by Edmond Davis; third, "Native Boy," number 170-S, by Steve Siles. 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PEAS & SALMON BAKE (Serves 4)

- 1 #303 can Walla Walla Fancy Sweet Peas
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon instant minced onion

- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1/2 cup liquid drained from peas
- 1 1-pound can salmon
- 1 hard-cooked egg
- Fresh parsley

Drain peas saving 1/2 cup of liquid. In sauce pan melt butter, blend in flour and salt. Remove from heat. Slowly add lemon juice and onion, mixing well. Return to heat and slowly add milk and liquid from peas. Cook and stir until thickened. Remove from heat and add peas. Drain salmon. Carefully remove from can in one piece. Cut into four lengthwise steaks, removing bones. Place steaks into shallow buttered baking dish. Pour Walla Walla Peas in sauce over salmon steaks and bake in 400 degree oven for 20 minutes, or until salmon is heated through. Garnish with hard-cooked egg, parsley.
