More than 600 students from the 17 city schools are scheduled to participate in the annual affair at Hedrick Junior High school beginning at 8 p.m. Doors open at 7 p.m., and there will be no admission charge, according to Mirick.

The all-city elementary band will present "Skipper March" and "Haydn Surprise Symphony," directed by Mirick. Steve Whipple will direct the Hedrick junior varsity band in "Hall of Fame," a concert march by Olivadotti, and "Fortuna," an overture by McCaughy.

"Champions on Parade," a march by Hummel, and "Laurate Overture" by Olivadotti will be done by the McLoughlin junior varsity band. Ron Rice will direct the group.

Al Huntmann will lead the McLoughlin cadet band in "Sparrow Bush" by Klein, and also "Sweet Adeline" by Van-Auken. The Hedrick varsity band, directed by Ron Bartlett, will play "His Honor," a march by Fillmore, and "Egmont Overture" by Beethoven.

"Amparita Roca," a Spanish march by Texidor, and the "Legend of the Rockies," a symphonic poem by Johnson, will be presented by the McLoughlin varsity band, directed by Rice. Mirick will conduct the senior high varsity band in "Commandante" by Guentzel, and "Universal Judgment" by deNardi.

Persons 65 or Over Up 34.7 Per Cent
Washington—UPB—One out of every 11 Americans is 65 or older, according to the Census bureau.

The bureau said Monday the exact figure in the 1960 census was 16,559,850.

Compared to 1950, when there were 12.3 million persons 65 and older, last year's figure was an increase of 34.7 per cent. For the population as a whole, the increase during the decade was 18.5 per cent.

In Florida and Arizona, popular with older persons because of their climates, the number of persons 65 and older more than doubled. Florida gained 133 per cent, Arizona 104 per cent.

Numerically, however, California led the states with a gain of 481,199 older persons.
