Students Honored Guests At Sorority Annual Dinner

Epsilon chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma honored members of the Student Oregon Education association of Southern Oregon college and Future Teachers of America at a dinner held in Crater High cafeteria March 9.

"Future Teacher" chapters represented were Ashland, Phoenix, Medford, Crater, Eagle Point and Rogue River. Dinner was served at tables decorated with daffodils and forsythia.

Miss Gladys Owens, president, welcomed the guests and introduced chapter officers.

Mrs. Marie Bjorlie, Ashland, led the group in singing. Mrs. Maxine Smith, Medford, presented a map showing countries represented in the World Confederation of Organizations of the Teaching Profession, and called attention to the teaching material available from this organization.

During the dinner hour background music was furnished by Judy Bjorlie, Lee Bounds, and Danny Keeter, members of the Future Teachers ensemble, Ashland.

Following dinner Miss Dorothy Wilson introduced Don Kondo of Japan and Gillian Du Croz of England and Gillian Du Croz of England foreign exchange students and De Ann Taylor of Medford who spent the past summer in West Germany under the auspices of the American Field Service.

Don Kondo compared the schools of Japan with those of the United States saying that in the high schools of Japan there is no choice of subjects. Students take fourteen subjects, all academic. The daily schedule is different. Students stay in the room

and the teacher moves. Students wear uniforms.

The public schools are educational, but not the private schools, he said.

In speaking of the schools of England, Gillian Du Croz said they were more like those of Japan. Up to the tenth grade students take ten compulsory subjects. National examinations are given at the end of the twelfth year. This system makes it difficult for a student to change his major.

She compared the mothers in America with those of England, saying that in England mothers are busy with family duties and do not belong to clubs as do American mothers. She said that British people have wrong impressions of Americans. They get these impressions from the movies and American tourists.

Both students said they were impressed with the size of the United States, and would always remember how kind and helpful the people have been.

De Ann Taylor explained the American Field Service program. To participate a student must be a junior in good standing in his or her high school.

She attended school in West Berlin. The school day was from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. and she said the students in the family with which she lived spent about two hours a day on home work.

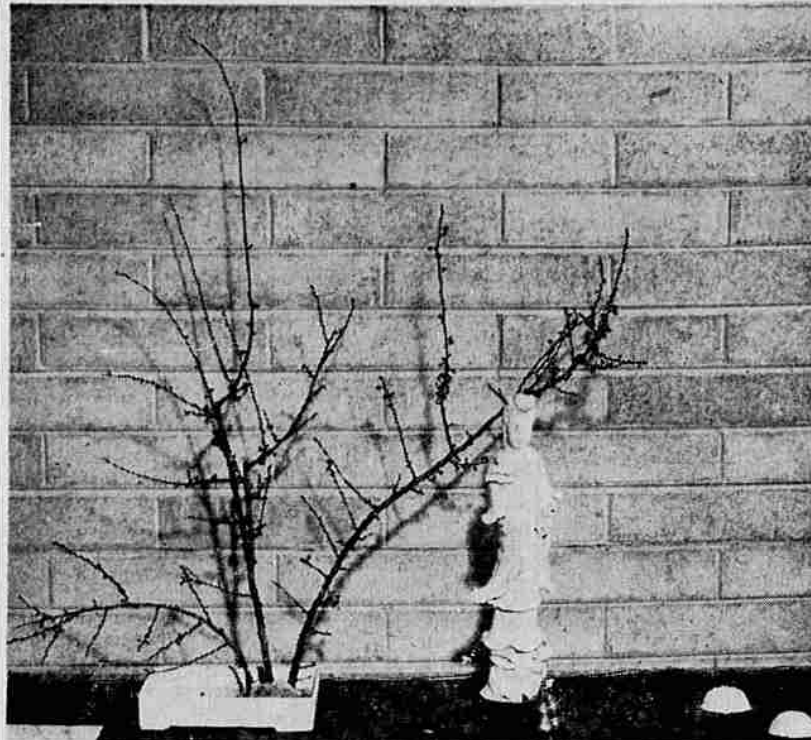

Red Cross, Salvation Army Cooperate, Captain Stresses

Salvation Army Captain William Ricken spoke for the Red Cross monthly board luncheon held at the Chapter house March 9. Dr. Elmo Stevenson, chapter chairman, presided.

Captain Ricken defined the policies of his agency and their interrelation with Red Cross. "Contrary to an erroneous impression of competition existing between the two agencies," Captain Ricken said, "there is little duplication of services." He pointed out that in all his 18 years of working with Salvation Army, there is more co-operation with Red Cross in this community than in any other.

After briefly summarizing the history of Salvation Army, Captain Ricken stated that "love of God and concern for human needs are expressed in the Salvation Army's work with those who are in need of spiritual and economic assistance." He noted that Salvation Army has 25,000 centers of operation all over the world. The Salvation Army disaster truck has first aid equipment and facilities for mass feeding. In aiding the victims of the Roseburg disaster the Salvation Army worked alongside the Red Cross, he recalled.

Dr. Stevenson welcomed Mr. and Mrs. Ray Lamborg, newcomers to Jackson county. Mrs. Lamborg worked with the Red Cross in England.

Girl Scout executive Miss Mary Aldrich and Miss Florence Medford, new district advisor, were also introduced by Dr. Stevenson.

Robert Heffernan, county fund chairman, introduced Mrs. Edgar Sawyer and Mrs. Otis Buck of the Applegate valley and thanked them for their efforts in producing the minstrel show given March 4 for the benefit of the Red Cross.

Mr. Heffernan also emphasized that the entire Red Cross budget was not included in the United Medford and Ashland-Talent funds, and that since Red Cross serves the entire county, people living outside of Medford in Jackson county will wish to participate in the March appeal. "Thousands of dollars are still needed," Mr. Heffernan stated.

Dr. Stevenson announced that Mrs. O. A. Eden is the newly appointed Red Cross representative to the United Medford crusade. He commended Mrs. Raymond Reter, outgoing representative, for her three years of "excellent work" in behalf of Red Cross and the United Medford crusade.

Reports were given by Mrs. Jennie Creager, chairman of Gray Ladies to the Veterans Administration domiciliary and by Mrs. A. Wattenburg, VAHR, on the VA council meeting February 27.

David Irving Jr. Red Cross board member, announced that Junior Red Cross students from McLoughlin Junior High school will give a talent show for the veterans at the VA domiciliary March 22. On March 25 the Junior Red Cross will give a luncheon at the Chapter house in honor of their teacher-sponsors. He also stated that music programs at the high school will be taped for children overseas, as part of the Junior Red Cross music program.

Mrs. John Winton of Eagle Point announced that a Red Cross benefit concert will be given Sunday afternoon, March 26, at 2:30 p.m. in the Eagle Point grade school gymnasium by the high school and grade school bands with special intermission entertainment.

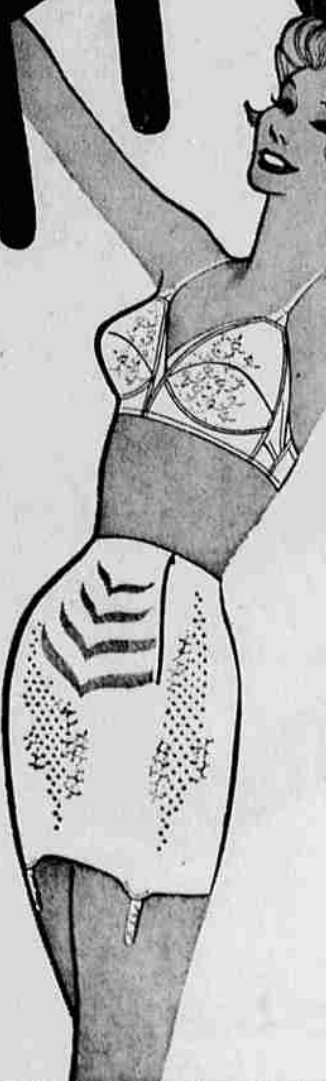
