Japan Is Topic For Meeting of Soroptimists

Ashland-Changing customs in Japan were described by Mrs. Richard Dol when she spoke for a noon luncheon meeting of Soroptimist club. Her embroidered apricot silk kimono and silver obi and sandals added a colorful touch to Mrs. Dol's interesting talk.

Traditions of centuries have given way to a new philosophy brought to the East during World War II and women are finding themselves faced with new freedoms as well as new problems, she said. The speaker demonstrated some of the time-honored Japanese usages and gestures as she explained their significance.

According to Mrs. Dol, academic standards for girls have been raised and since the six-year Allied occupation the equality of sexes has been generally accepted.

"Japan of today is a combination of old tradition and new ideas," declared the speaker. Mid-Lenten Supplies Are Listed

(The following guide to the nation's plentiful food buys for this week end was prepared for United Press International by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Interior.)

Washington—(UPI)—Mid-lenten food shoppers still will be able to find many excellent values in foods this week end. Among the protein foods, there are excellent choices in the various cuts of beef, as well as pork and lamb. Broiler-fryer chickens and turkeys wear favorable price tags, too, along with eggs and numerous dairy products.

Vegetable bins offer a wide variety, such as potatoes, sweet potatoes, cabbage, lettuce, celery and radishes. Corn is in good supply, as are onions, carrots, peppers and tomatoes.

Fruits such as oranges, grapefruit, lemons and limes are still plentiful, as are numerous varieties of apples. Anjou pears are in good supply, also bananas and pineapple. While strawberries are still fairly high, prices are lowering in certain areas, as supplies increase.

Lenten menu-planners will still find excellent supplies of both fresh and frozen shrimp and scallops on hand, as well as fish sticks and portions.

Western States

Here is a closer look at plentiful foods in this particular area:

West—Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming: Consumers will have to shop carefully to find the most attractive buys this week. Supplies of most major food items are moderate to ample, and prices are mostly unchanged from a week ago. There is only a limited selection of vegetables. The few price changes among red meats have been limited to a cent or so a pound. Beef supplies are ample in most markets, while calf and veal continue in rather light supply. Supplies of old crop lamb are ample, and some new crop spring lamb is beginning to appear in the markets. Pork supplies on the west coast range from light to plentiful. Eggs continue in moderate supply and are mostly unchanged in price this week. Ready-to-cook fryer chickens are down 1 cent a pound in some areas, but other poultry items are unchanged in price.

Fresh fruit and vegetable plentiful include apples, lemons, grapefruit, oranges, artichokes, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, lettuce, dry onions, bunched vegetables and spinach.

In good supply are avocados, asparagus, broccoli, potatoes, sweet potatoes and tomatoes.

In fish, the best buys include Dungeness crabs, halibut, rockfish, oysters and salmon.
