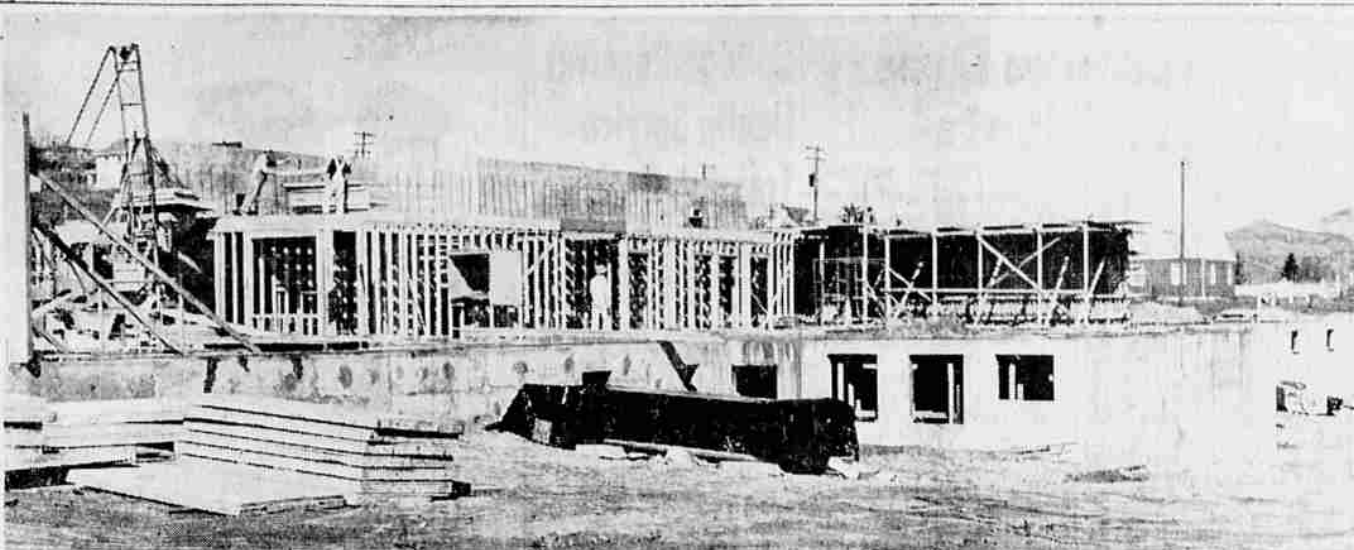
MRS. NORMA I. MARTIN

a \$10,000 gift from a private estate. The total cost includes a \$375,898 bid for construction and installation of some equipment. The hospital will have 125 rooms, 20,845 square feet of floor space and will operate with about 34 or 35 beds.

Floor Fight Looms On Jobless Benefits

Washington—(UPI)—Administration forces in the Senate decided today to wage a stiff floor fight in an attempt to delete drastic committee changes in President Kennedy's bill to extend unemployment benefits.

The decision came as the Senate prepared to open debate on the measure, approved Wednesday by the Senate Finance committee.

The committee tacked on an amendment proposed by Sen. Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) which would limit the scope of the program as already passed by the house. Under terms of the amendment, states would receive only the amount of unemployment benefit money that they collected in the form of higher payroll taxes.

REFUNDS MAILED

Washington—(UPI)—The Internal Revenue Service reported today that it had mailed \$1.3 billion of income tax refunds to 11.9 million taxpayers since the beginning of the year.

Scotsmen Intensify Search For Centuries-Old Murderer

Glasgow, Scotland—(UPI)—Scotsmen care only a wee bit about who slew Cock Robin. For them the question is who killed Red Fox?

Men, women and children of Clans Cameron, Campbell, and Stewart still point accusing fingers at each other although the deed was done 208 years ago.

Recent detective work by Lt. Gen. Sir William MacArthur began a new campaign to find out just what happened that fateful day in May, 1752, on the tree-lined shores of Loch Linnhe.

They called Colin Campbell the Red Fox because he had long red locks. He fought well, wore his tartan kilts

with style and was a greatly hated man.

Red Fox and his brethren of Clan Campbell joined victoriously with King George II against Scotland's Bonnie Prince Charlie who wanted the throne for himself. Clan Stewart lucklessly had sided with the bonnie prince and they paid the price.

Get Spoils
Red Fox and the other Campbells got the spoils of victory—including some castles and land lost by the Stewarts. The Stewarts and the Campbells became like Kentucky's Hatfields and McCoys.

No one was too surprised on May 14, 1712, when Red Fox fell from his horse while riding by Loch Linnhe and it was discovered that somebody had shot him twice in the back.

Red Fox died a few seconds later. But the mystery of who killed him did not.

Reapportionment Plan Said Illegal
Salem—(UPI)—Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton Wednesday ruled the Republican "preferred plan" for legislative reapportionment as unconstitutional.

The House Elections Committee, which had approved and voted out a similar bill Tuesday, quickly called it back to study the implications.

House Minority Leader F. F. Montgomery (R-Eugene) said he would "temporarily yield" to Thornton's opinion but added: "Some pretty eminent lawyers disagree."

Thornton said the plan is illegal because it doesn't give enough additional representation to Multnomah county.
