

Deductions for Charity Restored To Tax Measure

Salem—The House Tax Committee, in the throes of seeking four more votes for its sweeping income tax reform bill, Wednesday announced the measure for the third time by restoring deductions for charitable contributions.

At the same time, the committee took up timber tax, and passed out a homestead tax deferral bill.

The committee heard generally favorable testimony for a severance, or harvest, tax only on trees in Eastern Oregon.

The committee also approved a bill granting property tax deferrals on the homes of elderly persons with limited incomes. The delayed taxes would be paid from the estate after death.

Bill Almost Died

The income tax bill, HB 1001, which would give a 10 per cent state income tax cut while taxing some low bracket earners for the first time almost died last week.

Lack of deductions for charity gifts was a major objection. The amendment would allow deductions for such gifts as long as they exceeded three per cent of the total income.

The deduction would be in the form of a credit against the final tax bill amounting to three per cent of the contributions.

Eastern Oregon timber operators said HB 1114, for a severance tax on Eastern Oregon trees in place of the present value tax, would encourage sound forest management.

After being collected on cut trees, the tax would be distributed to counties and taxing districts on the basis of the appraised timber valuation in each taxing district.

Quadruplets Born To 24-Year-Old Philadelphia

Philadelphia—The quadruplets were born to a former beauty contest winner Wednesday night just as the doctor predicted—but the father still can't believe it's true and the doctor himself said he was reported as "all shook up."

The eldest person in Delaware County Memorial Hospital in suburban Upper Darby was the mother, Mrs. Arlene Cutlar, 24, Malvern, Pa., who gave birth to the four girls within seven minutes.

The girls were temporarily named A, B, C, and D by hospital officials since the parents had been counting on having boys.

In Satisfactory Condition

The hospital said the four babies were in satisfactory condition and "their color good" nearly 12 hours after their premature birth.

The attending physician, Dr. J. Vernon Ellison, said the girls were the most critical in cases of premature births.

The girls were born six weeks premature and weighed from 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 pounds. They were "doing fine," Ellison said.

Like A Dream

The father, William Cutlar, 3rd, 28, who maintains a fleet of trucks for his father's mushroom transportation company, said the whole thing was "like a dream." "I still can't believe it," he said. "I don't feel like I'm in reality."

"We don't have names picked out for them," he added. "We thought we were going to have four boys."

The Cutlars had been told to expect quadruplets on the basis of x-ray examinations.

Said identical

Mrs. Cutlar's sister, Mrs. Albert McDowell, 29, said she understood the quads were identical and said her sister came through the ordeal very well.

Mrs. Cutlar, the former Arlene Cherrie, a 5-foot, 6-inch blue-eyed blonde, won the Miss Delaware county beauty title in 1955 and that year was voted "best looking girl" in the Upper Darby High school class.

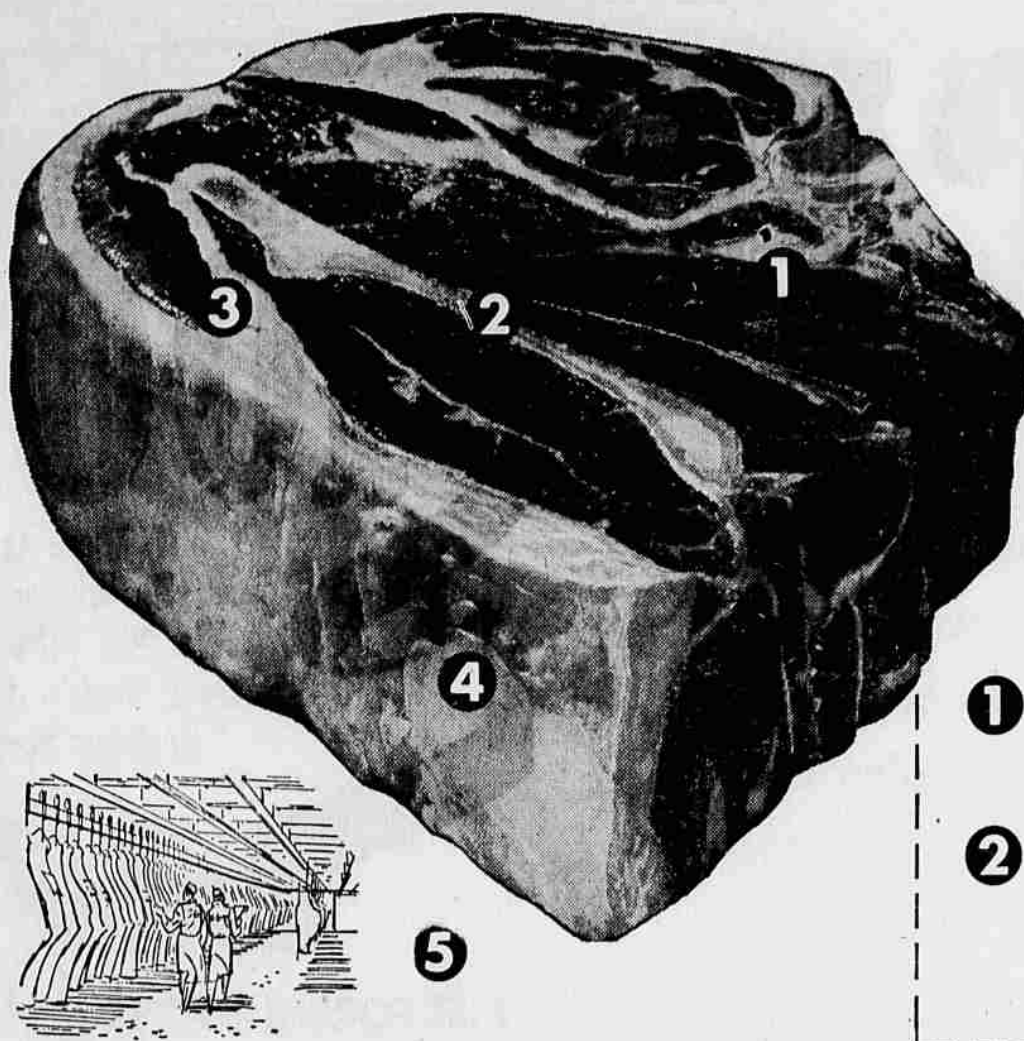
The Cutlars have two other children, five-year-old William 4th, and Sherree, 3.

Crew Taken Off Stranded Freighter

Long Beach, Calif.—The crew of the grounded 410-foot Greek freighter Dominator was removed today as heavy seas shifted the 10,000-ton vessel near a shore.

The men were removed in relays starting at dawn by a salvage vessel that transferred them to the Coast Guard cutter Heather as a helicopter hovered over the area in a precautionary measure.

Crew members of the distressed ship will be housed in federal facilities at Terminal Island in Los Angeles Harbor until disposition of the ship is determined.

Applying Attacks Social Phases of Reorganization

Salem—The Secretary of State Howell Applying Jr. continued his criticism of the social phases of Gov. Mark Hatfield's government reorganization plan Wednesday night.

Testifying at a House state and federal affairs committee, Applying said while he likes the idea of a mental health division, it should be under the board of control rather than Hatfield's proposed cabinet department of social services.

Applying's main beef with the governor's cabinet system proposal is abolition of the board of control—which administers the state institutions. Applying is convinced the institutions should remain under the board of control rather than be divided up under various new agencies.

The secretary said Hatfield's plan for community mental health clinics is not good. But he said he was "discouraged and disappointed" when Hatfield failed to include a request for funds in his budget to implement the program.

Applying again brought up the fact that the governor did not ask advice on reorganization from either Applying or State Treasurer Howard C. Belton, the other members of the board of control.

"He didn't ask our counsel and it was made clear to us that no counsel was invited," Applying said.

Applying said the basic purpose advanced in the two reorganization bills in question "can be accomplished in the present framework of state government" and is not contingent on passage of the measures.

Whereabouts of 11 Kidnaped Oil Men Unknown

Madrid—Spain has ordered oil companies in the Spanish Sahara to move south from their concessions near the Moroccan border until the mystery kidnap of 11 oil technicians is cleared up, informed sources said today.

No official or unofficial sources here could give any detail on the present whereabouts of the three Americans, two Canadians, one Frenchman, and the five Spaniards kidnaped over the week end and taken to Morocco.

Americans Identified

The Americans, employees of a California firm supplying oil equipment to the American-owned Union Oil Co., were identified by the U.S. Embassy as Dale Miller, 26, Bakersfield, Calif.; James Gilbert, 25, son of Mrs. Rudy Gilbert, Littlefield, Tex.; and John C. Cosgriff, 26, son of Morton Cosgriff, Big Timber, Mont.

Informed sources said Spanish authorities have ordered the companies with concessions in the northern part of the Sahara bordering Morocco to move south until the whole incident is clarified.

The source said that "some troops" were ordered to move into the oil concessions bordering Morocco as "a precautionary measure."

Reports Unconfirmed

Sources close to the oil companies concerned refused either to confirm or deny the reports. "It sounds advisable and logical," one said.

The Spanish Foreign Ministry and the American Embassy failed to supply any further information on the whereabouts of the 11 oil technicians.

To the Moroccan Embassy in Madrid, which two days ago issued a statement saying that the men had been found "safe and sound" by the Royal Moroccan Army, said today it had received no further information from Rabat.

Pendleton Selects Round-Up Queen

Pendleton—Mary Lou Lazinka, a 19-year-old, freshman at the University of Oregon, Wednesday was named as the queen of the 1981 Pendleton Round-Up Sept. 13-16. She is the last of four sisters to be picked to the Round-Up court.

Miss Lazinka's oldest sister, Katherine, was princess in 1949 and queen in 1950. Jean Lazinka was princess in 1952 and Judy was queen in 1958.
