Jacksonville—Miss Gail Winters, missionary in the Congo for 15 years, will be the speaker for a two week series of services at Jacksonville Assembly of God church.

Miss Winters will speak Sunday and start nightly services Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. She is currently visiting various churches of the Assemblies of God presenting the needs of the work in the Congo.

While in Africa Miss Winters taught at a Christian Day school and operated an orphanage which cared for orphans and children of leprosy patients. She also engaged in translation work.

The services will continue through April 2.

Parish Mission Set For Passion Week

The annual parish mission that Sacred Heart Catholic church has been scheduled to coincide with Passion week this year.

In Medford to conduct the special mission services will be the Rev. Gabriel Morris, OSB, of Mt. Angel Abbey at St. Benedict, Ore.

The mission will begin Sunday and continue through Friday. While the particular purpose of the six-day program is to afford the Catholic layman an opportunity to review the basic tenets of his faith and to renew his religious fervor, all interested persons are invited to attend.

Father Gabriel will be remembered by many parishioners from his several visits here a few years ago. He has conducted missions, student retreats and recollection days here, as well as in many other Oregon areas, during his years as a Benedictine priest.

Other duties as a missionary, Father Gabriel has been a mathematics instructor, principal of Mt. Angel Preparatory School for Boys, director of seminary dramatic productions and field representative for the Benedictine press publication, St. Joseph Magazine.

A number of changes have been made in the parish Lenten mass schedule for this week of mission. First mass on week days will be at 6:30 a.m., rather than at the usual hour of 6:40, and will be followed by about five minutes of religious instruction.

The school mass will be at the regular time, 8 a.m., each morning. However, the evening mass has been changed to 7:15 p.m., Sunday through Friday and it will be followed immediately by the mission services. These services include a period of instruction, benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and any additional devotions the mission-priest may determine. Time will be provided, also, for confessions and individual conferences with Father Gabriel.

Before leaving Medford, the visiting priest will conduct a day of recollection on Sunday, March 26, for young unmarried adults from Medford, Grants Pass and Ashland.
