

Valley Newcomers



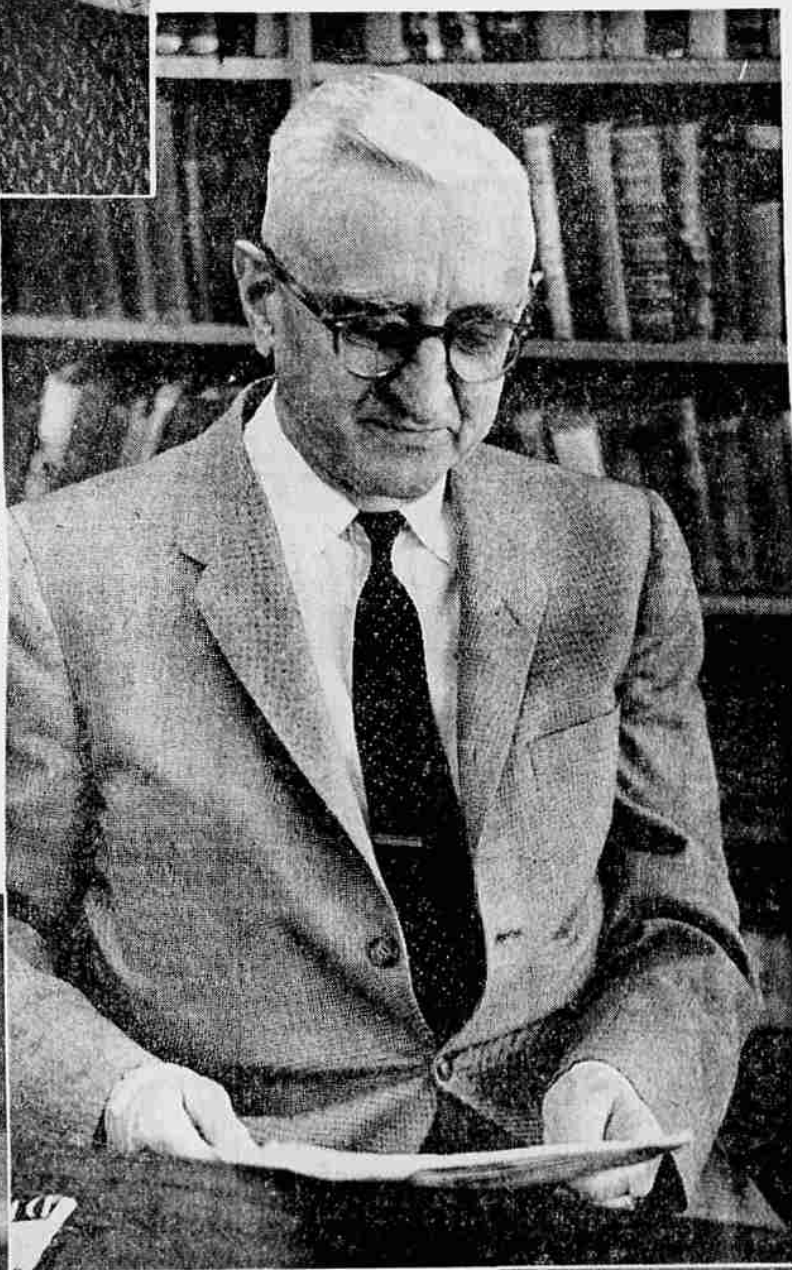
