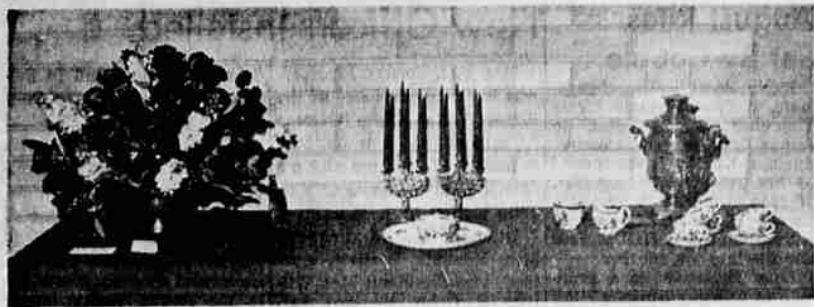

Mr. Berreman is a member of the commission on civil rights, Washington, D. C.

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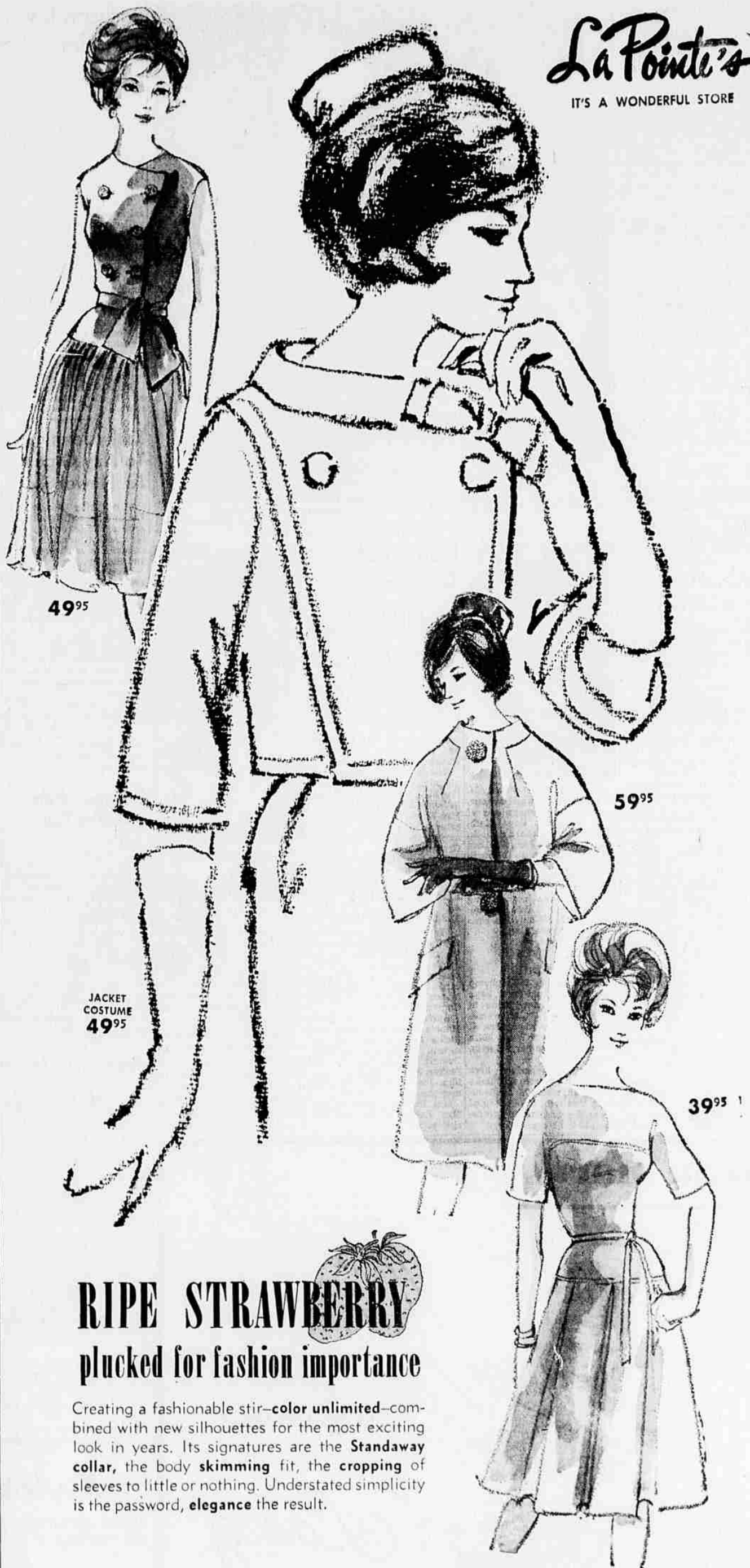
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
