Preceding the 2 o'clock program the hostess served desert refreshments. The short business meeting was conducted by the club president, Mrs. Herbert Lewis.

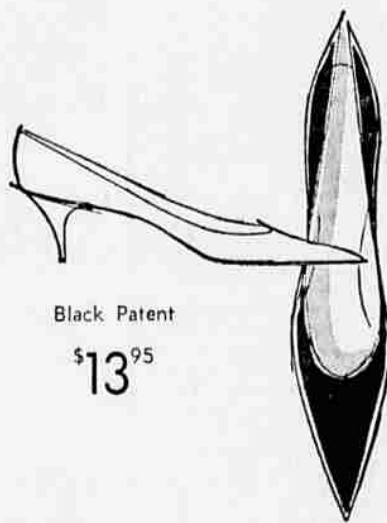
In Ashland

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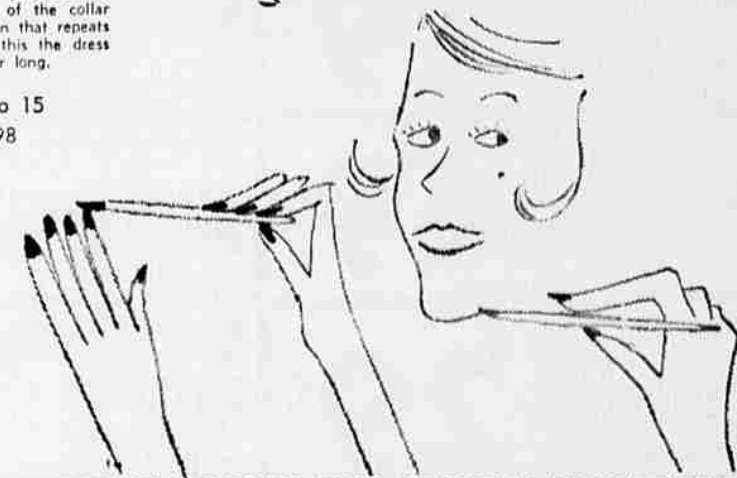
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
