

'Get Tough' With Children Professor Tells PTA Unit

Dr. Arthur Kreisman, director of general studies at Southern Oregon college, spoke to the Washington Parent-Teacher association meeting recently.

Dr. Kreisman told parents that there was not enough pressure on children within the home and too many social pressures in our society away from home. The school's position is to educate to adult standards for our schools reflect what a community is. The schools need the help of the community, he explained.

In order to raise standards, he suggested that the workload of the children be raised, forget short cuts as there are no short cuts or easy answers to adequate learning, quit making everything fun for children, stop giving approval to shoddy work, and insisting on exactness, concentrating on the real job. In conclusion, Dr. Kreisman said that we need to "get tough" with our children.
