

Trail Woman Honored On Ninetieth Birthday

Trail-Mrs. Eda Richardson, who was one from Gov. Mark O. Hatfield.

Mrs. Richardson, who has made her home with the Rodgers family for the past several years, is a sister and the only living relative of the Ulric Ellerhusen, sculptor. Among his works which are exhibited throughout the United States, is the Pioneer on top of the Oregon state capital building in Salem, Mr. Ellerhusen was named sculptor of the year in 1933 and 1955. Among Mrs. Richardson's possessions is a reel of film showing Mr. Ellerhusen working on the Pioneer which was sent her by Dick Steeves, Hood River, son of Mrs. Rodgers.

Mrs. Richardson was born Eda Ellerhusen to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ellerhusen on March 7, 1871 in Malchow, Germany, one of five children. Her grandfather Kuapp fought with the Napoleonic army in 1812 and her grandmother Kuapp served as a lady-in-waiting to the Grand Duchess of Poland.

In 1896 she came to the United States, first living in Chicago. In 1907 she married Charles Richardson, a teacher who was employed by the government. In 1911 the couple went to Alaska where he taught the Eskimos. After living there for six years they returned to the United States and later went to Manila, Philippines. He resumed his teaching in San Francisco and in 1939 moved to Oregon where they built a home at Gold Beach. He died in 1949 and Mrs. Richardson spent six years in Medford before moving to Trail.

She has been a member of the Order of the Eastern Star for the past 39 years, is a member of the White Shrine of San Francisco and the Medford First Presbyterian church.

Mrs. Richardson keeps herself informed on the events of the day and is apt to be found at the Shady Cove library.

California's resources include the 58 different kinds of minerals, water power, oil, lumbering and many others. The film on "A Tree was Born" was about the work being accomplished in experimenting with the pollen from the pine trees, trying to raise a hybrid that will have the finest characteristics of the parent trees. Following the showing of the film Mr. Savage answered questions.

Plans were discussed for the coming Arts and Flowers Society. Receives Red Cross Plaque

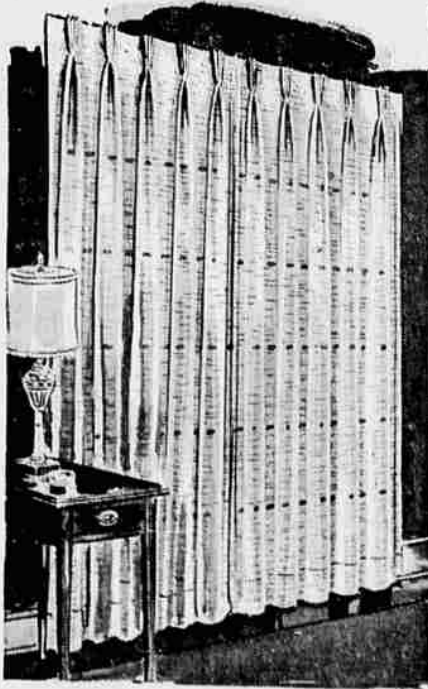
Yreka—Members of the Baptist missionary society, Yreka, have received a plaque from the Red Cross for their service in the Red Cross drive.

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Old-Fashioned Ticking Appears on Fashion Scene

Dallas, Tex.—Old-fashioned ticking is clicking in sportswear from Southwestern manufacturers.

The old-fashioned fabric with its sturdy weave comes in several modern guises in spring and summer collections including shorts, skirt-length culottes and sunback dresses.

Ticking is one of several "country" fabrics starring in active sportswear and patio clothes. The others are denim, sack cloth, calico and bandana prints, prints with country garden motifs of flowers and

vegetables, and gingham. Old-fashioned ticking appears in new machine-made edgings on dresses and active sports clothes.

Woven seersucker also reappears and it is a rare firm in these parts which does not feature synthetics which simulate voile and batiste.

The annual style shows held for visiting reporters by the Dallas Fashion Manufacturers Center, represented 22 firms or the bulk of the sportswear industry here.

Slender Silhouette
The silhouette shapes up as one of slenderness generally, and even when the skirts are full, the waistline is cinched

in. There were more of the slim tubes and sheath type dresses than any other—this is the silhouette favored by Mrs. John F. Kennedy.

But the Dallas manufacturers decided more against than for Mrs. Kennedy's sleeveless dress look. Sleeves to the elbow or longer showed on most street dresses.

The waistline generally is placed at the normal position, although in some junior styles, it is a couple of inches higher. All manufacturers included some middy and other over-blouse silhouettes in their collections.

Hot Weather Colors
Necklines usually were collarless and cool looking. Sundresses came with halter neck-

lines riding high in front, cut to a deep U or V in the back, or strapped across the shoulders with narrow bands of spaghetti strings of fabric.

Colors were those traditionally favored in hot weather—white, beige, sand, the pastel pinks, blues and yellows, plus the sea and coral tones.

Pants—and they're plentiful in this sportswear market—seem to be growing longer. The new shorts length is to the knee and new play clothes pants reach to the calf. One manufacturer launched pants in adjustable lengths, controlled by means of a button-tab at the inside of the cuff.

And, bloomers returned for tot and teenager play the beach fashions.

Book on Seward Topic for Group

"The Governor and His Lady," was reviewed by Mrs. E. W. Jernmark of Ashland, at a recent Wednesday Study club meeting. The author, Earl Conrad, gives a vivid portrait of the man usually regarded as one of the greatest to have served as secretary of state.

William Henry Seward, and his wife, Frances Adeline Seward. Seward was elected governor of New York in 1838 and in 1849 became United States senator. He now headed the Republican party, and having been an unsuccessful candidate for the presidential nomination, became secretary of state under Abraham Lincoln in 1861.

The author describes the brutal attack on President Lincoln, Seward and members of his family, by their enemies.

Alaska, the biggest of United States possessions, was called "Seward's Folly" in 1867 when Seward, as secretary of state, arranged for its purchase from Russia for \$7,200,000. Seward lived 1801 to 1872.

Mrs. L. V. Watkins presented a biographical sketch of the poet James Whitcomb Riley and gave some of his poems. Riley, a native of Indiana and known as the Hoosier poet, lived 1839 to 1916.

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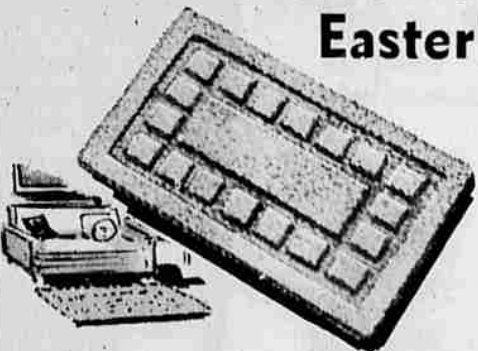


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
