WCLA Delegates Discuss Problems At Convention

Portland—The West Coast Lumberman's Association delegates here for their 50th annual convention Tuesday discussed holding the line on rail freight rates, simplification of lumber grades and stepping up outlays for promotion and advertising.

A. E. Wall, traffic committee chairman, said Western lumbermen face a possible immediate battle to protect present rail rates to all points east of the Rocky Mountains. Wall said Southern interests have asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to upset the entire rate structure on lumber shipped from the West Coast.

The WCLA dispatched an answering brief Tuesday to the ICC asking that the federal agency hold the status quo on Western rates.

Grade Progress Told

Theo Deal, Longview, executive committee chairman for the West Coast Lumber Inspection Bureau, said lumber producers of Douglas fir, western pine and southern pine regions are making progress in the national effort toward reducing the number of grades in common usage.

Ben H. Gardiner, Seattle, chairman of the advertising and promotion committee, said a new assessment of six cents per 1,000 board feet of production at member mills should increase by at least one-third the amount WCLA will have available for national promotion.

The lumbermen were to elect officers today.

Three Appear in Circuit Court

Daisy Ruth Lapini, 455 North Sixth st., Central Point, was given a suspended imposition of sentence for three years by Circuit Judge Edward C. Kelly Monday on charges of forgery.

She was ordered to make restitution for bad checks issued within 10 months.

Circuit Judge James M. Main set April 10 as trial date for George M. Dumais, Phoenix, who is charged with issuing a check without sufficient funds.

Wendell Floyd Long, 23, Klamath Falls, withdrew his plea of guilty to charges of burglary not in a dwelling when he appeared in circuit court, and pleaded innocent. Trial date has not been set.

Long was charged with burglarizing a Medford sporting goods store.

Irish Playwright Held for Assault

Toronto—An Irish playwright Brendan Behan was arrested early today on charges of assaulting a hotel detective and a Toronto city policeman after an all-night drinking spree.

Deputy Police Chief George Elliott said Behan still was sleeping it off in a police cell at 9:15 a.m. and "probably would be in no condition to appear in court today."

The cantankerous Irishman, here for a stage appearance, was charged with assault and battery on Royal York Hotel house detective John Matthews, with assaulting police Detective Edward Trevelyan, and with disturbing the peace.

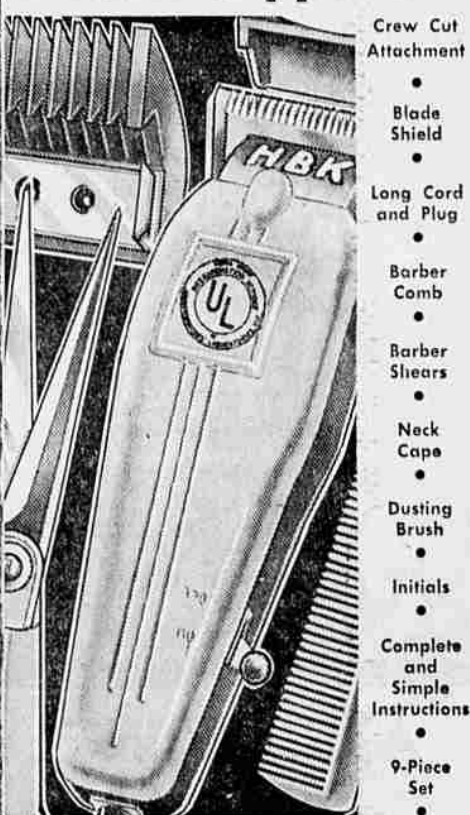
DECHIES IGNORANCE
