Benton County To Be Quarantined

Corvallis—UPI—A dead rabid fox has been found in Benton county and County Health Officer Dr. P. H. Rozendal said the county will be quarantined.

It was the second rabid fox to be found in the Willamette Valley in recent weeks. A rabid fox was found in south Lane county recently and a quarantine was set up while efforts were made to trace and control the disease. A dead fox was discovered near Belfountain in Benton county Friday, Dr. Rozendal said plans were being made for the establishment of clinics around the county next week.

The fox was sent to the laboratories of the State Board of Health at Portland where a diagnosis was made.

The quarantine will mean all dogs in the county must be kept leashed and none can be taken from the county without being vaccinated. Rabies first came to light in Oregon in the fall of 1960 when a rabid bat attacked a woman in Southern Oregon. Since that time, several instances of rabid bats and other animals have been investigated.

Student Speech Tourney Slated In City This Week

High school speech students from six southern Oregon high schools are scheduled to meet here Friday and Saturday for the annual Southern Oregon district individual speech competition.

DeVere Taylor, tournament director, named Grants Pass, Crater, Ashland, Eagle Point, Phoenix and Medford as participating schools. Each is allowed to submit two contestants in each event.

Speaking events at the district meet include oratory, serious reading, poetry reading, after dinner speaking, extemporaneous, humorous reading, radio speaking, impromptu, and panel discussion.

Schedule Noted
According to Taylor, Sections 1 and 2 of oratory, serious and poetry readings, and after dinner speaking will begin at 8:30 and 9:45 a.m. Friday at the high school.

From 1 to 3:15 p.m., both sections of humorous reading, radio, extemp, and impromptu will be held. Panel discussion will start at 3:30 p.m.

Finals in most events will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday, and extend until about 3 o'clock. Oratory and after dinner finals will be held at 11 a.m. Friday, however.

The events will be held in rooms 13, 14, 59, 60, 61, and the auditorium at Medford High school.

Those students placing either first or second at the district meet will then be eligible to compete in the state-wide tourney scheduled April 14 and 15 at Oregon State university, Corvallis.

Third place winners will be named alternates, and are permitted to attend the state meet if a first or second place winner is unable to compete.

Judges Listed
Judges at the district conference will be faculty members of Southern Oregon college. Included are Dr. Marshall Woodell, Dr. Al Fellers, Dr. Dorothy Stolp, and Dr. Bill A. Sampson.

Speech coaches in the Southern Oregon district include Herb Lewis, Ashland; Bob Myrick, Phoenix; Don Lacy, Crater; Glen Foster, Eagle Point; Art Carpenter, Grants Pass; and Taylor, Medford.

Taylor has extended an invitation to the public to attend any or all of the individual speaking engagements Friday or Saturday.

Local Woman Hurt In Two-Car Crash

A 34-year-old Medford woman is reported in fair condition at Rogue Valley hospital today where she was taken following a two-car accident at the intersection of Stewart and Columbus aves. about 3:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Injured is Mrs. Margie Miss Riecke, 601 Park Place No. 5. Police said she suffered lacerations of the feet and ankles and possible head injuries, and was suffering from shock.

Mrs. Riecke was the operator of a vehicle that collided with a car operated by William Sherman Ferris, 51, of 1804 Peach st. Ferris told police he had started to pass the Riecke vehicle when the car started to make a left turn in front of him. The two vehicles collided, he said, and the Riecke vehicle rolled over once before coming to a stop. No citations were issued.

Oil Technicians Are Returned To Canary Islands

Las Palmas, Canary Islands (UPI)—Three American oilmen and eight fellow workers, kidnapped by Moroccan irregulars in the Spanish Sahara, and held prisoner for 11 days, arrived today by plane from Morocco.

One of the men disclosed Wednesday night they were held in a Moroccan army installation in Rabat for almost a week, even while diplomatic inquiries as to their whereabouts went unanswered.

The 11 men, members of a Union Oil Company prospecting team were seized in their desert camp March 11. They were freed Tuesday and left Rabat Wednesday arriving here aboard a Spanish air force plane.

The whereabouts of the technicians had been a mystery until they were released to the custody of their various embassies. In addition to the Americans, there were two Canadians, one Frenchman and five Spaniards.

Five of the men were permitted to speak to reporters for the first time Wednesday night. They disclosed that one of the Canadians suffered a superficial bullet wound and one of the Americans was cut in the face by flying glass when bullets struck the windshield of his truck the night of their capture.

The three Americans are Dale Miller, 26, Bakersfield, Calif.; James Gilbert, 25, Littlefield, Tex. and John Cosgriff, Big Timber, Mont. It was not disclosed which men were injured or which ones talked to newsmen.

One of the Spaniards told of their capture by the raiding band of Moroccan nomads. He said their command announced:

"We arrest you in the name of liberators of Mauritania—you are foreigners who have come to steal our black gold." Morocco claims the Spanish Sahara as part of its territory. The oil men said they were ordered to get aboard their vehicles and drive north into Morocco. After a few days a group of Moroccans met them in military trucks and the technicians were taken to Tantan and handed to Moroccan military authorities who took them to Rabat.

"We were placed in the sport center of the royal Moroccan army," he said. "We stayed for about a week, playing basketball and swimming in a magnificent swimming pool, and then we were released."
