

229 Million Board Feet of Timber Are In BLM Harvest Plan

Prospective purchasers discussed plans of the bureau of land management for harvesting timber in the Medford district during fiscal year 1982 at a meeting Tuesday, according to Ross A. Young, district manager.

Approximately 229 million board feet of BLM timber in 70 tracts are included in the tentative plan.

The timber sale plan is developed through the cooperation by professional foresters of such factors as timber maturity and condition, access and dispersal tracks, he said. The volume of timber to be harvested each year is governed by the sustained yield capacity of the lands.

Points of discussion, following description of the sale plan, included derivation of logging cost data used in establishing appraised prices.

Police Seek To Tie Dead Scoutmaster With Kidnap-Death

Belleville, Ont.—Police today sought to determine whether 10-year-old Tommy McNevin's scoutmaster kidnapped the boy and then let him die to a tree to die exposure.

Young Tommy was found by police Wednesday where his abductor had bound and abandoned him in a futile attempt to collect \$25,000 ransom.

The suspected scoutmaster, Warren Williamson, 41, cornered the boy and then let him die to a tree to die exposure.

"It was somebody he knew. I was sure he would have killed him to keep him quiet," Tommy's father, Donald McNevin, a well-to-do businessman, said today.

"I wish I were back making \$50 a week rather than having my own business," the distraught father said.

Tommy was kidnapped Monday after leaving home alone to play hockey with his friends. His father, a former police officer, said he was sure he would have killed him to keep him quiet.

Police refused to disclose the full contents of the suicide note but said it appeared that only "one person" was involved in the kidnapping.

Young Tommy was not found until nearly 24 hours after Williamson committed suicide. Two local policemen found the boy's body slumped against the ropes that bound it to a tree five miles northwest of here.

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Jury Deliberates Finch-Tregoff Case Third Time

Los Angeles—The fate of lovers Dr. R. Bernard Finch and Carol Tregoff was in the hands of a jury today for the third time.

Judge David Coleman gave the jury of 12 men and two women Wednesday after recommending that it deny a defense plea of double jeopardy—a situation in which a person is tried again on the same charge even though a verdict has been reached before.

Finch's attorney has contended the second trial jury reached a verdict on the auto-guns. But the judge in the second trial, Leroy Dawson, said no decision was made.

Coleman said in final instructions: "It is my opinion, both as a matter of law and fact, that no verdict or final decision was ever reached."

Only an opinion Coleman emphasized, however, that he was only offering an opinion and that the decision was entirely the jury's. Carol's attorney last week told the jury to disregard her part in the double jeopardy plea.

Finch, 43, and his red-haired receptionist, 24, are charged with the gunshots murder of the doctor's wife, Barbara Jean, 33, on the lawn of her West Covina, Calif., home on the night of July 18, 1979. Their first trial, which began in December 1979, and their second trial ended in no decision.

The makeup of the jury, previously nine men and three women, was altered Wednesday when a woman member, Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens, fainted in court and was replaced by a male alternate.

Coleman pointedly tossed up his right to comment on evidence and the credibility of witnesses—and stuck strictly to formal instructions. Has Three Choices

The jury was locked up at the downtown Alexandria hotel and started deliberations today. It has three possible verdicts:

—First degree murder. The sentence is death in the gas chamber or life in prison. This is also the sentence for a conspiracy conviction. Defendants are charged with murder and conspiracy to murder.

—Second degree murder. This carries an automatic sentence of five years to life.

—Acquittal.

New York —RFP—Hemphill Noyes & Co. says the persistent rise of the stock market in the past few days is a result of a "far from complete" recovery from the brokerage house's recent hesitation in the upward trend may only be setting the stage for a rapid move into high ground.

One should consider that even projected earnings do not justify present prices in many cases, Hemphill Noyes warns, "but as long as technical factors, a more reliable barometer since 1929, continue to be as strong as they are now, common stocks may still be purchased selectively."

After a study of the March 20 short interest figures, Joseph E. Granville of E. F. Hutton Co. says he expects renewed bullish attention to center on Certain-Tied, McCrory, Raiser Roll and White Motors.

Clark, Dodge & Co. says the most reasonably priced growth situations among the utilities at the present time are Fluor, Altria Power & Light, Houston Lighting & Power and Texas Electric.

Shields & Co. picks Ford from among the autos as its current favorite. Noting that the company has run up the industry's best record of reducing inventories and that its world-wide sales prospects are promising, the brokerage house says "We think the best is still ahead for this stock."
