

Nation's High Point Dog In Retriever Trial Here

High point dog in the nation during 1960 will be among those entered in this week end's field trial of the Rogue Valley Retriever club.

The dog is Dairy Hill's Nightcap, owned by A. A. Jones, San Mateo, Calif. RVRC's 10th annual trial opens Friday at 8 a.m. and will continue through Sunday. It is licensed by American Kennel club, Rogue Valley Game Management area and Hoover lakes property will be used as trial grounds.

Nightcap took part in 14 open all-age stakes last year and collected a total of 32 1/2 points. The dog took five firsts, two seconds, one third, one fourth and one certificate of merit. It is an amateur field trial champion and a field trial champion. Nightcap was third in the open here last year and ran in the amateur national.

Winners Back
All of last year's stake winners in the local trial will contend. Shoremeado Tidewater, owned by C. R. Tobin, San Francisco will be defender in the open. Baron's Tulle Tiger, owned by Mrs. Walter S. Heller, San Rafael, Calif., will try for a second straight first in the derby. Jibodad

Velvet, owned by Dr. Charles Versteeg, Cave Junction, which won the amateur all-age last year and ran in the amateur national, will contend this time in the open as will Manzanet Flint, owned now by Bill Bryant, Ashland, which took the qualifying stake. Flint will be in the amateur.

Webb Holes, St. Cloud, Minn., former national president of the Field Trial Club of America, will run two dogs in the trial.

Labrador, golden and Chesapeake retrievers will be run in the trial which will begin with the amateur stake on Friday and continue with the derby, qualifying and open stakes in that order. Entries number 117. Series of tests on land and in water will be conducted for the dogs.

The public is invited to watch the dogs in action. Signs from the Y in North Medford will mark the way to the trial grounds. A snack wagon will be in operation.

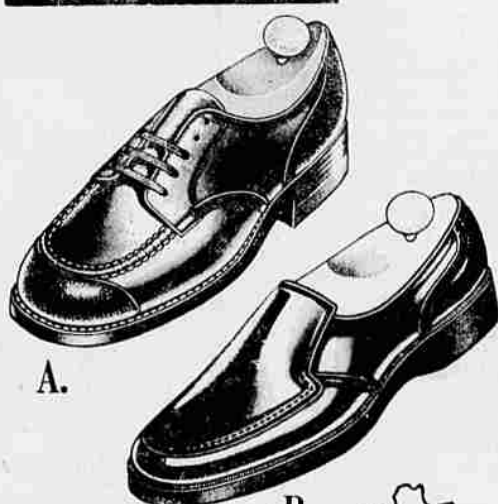
