Advances Made Understand Allergies in OSU's Research

Corvallis — Significant advances in the understanding of allergies and new techniques for study of the bothersome reactions that affect about one person out of 10 have been reported by Oregon State University scientists.

They have developed a new theory on the way that a person becomes allergic and have made volunteers allergic in the manner predicted by the theory. The task of finding the exact mechanism by which a person becomes allergic is a complex one, but the OSC studies are considered among the most promising in the nation.

Findings will be reported by Dr. Arthur Lietzke, head of the project in the OSU Science Research Institute, before the American Chemical Society March 27 in St. Louis.

The OSU workers believe they have proceeded far beyond other research groups in isolating in pure form the allergen compounds from grass pollen and house dust—two major allergy problems since it is almost impossible to avoid either. And almost unbelievably small amounts of the allergy compounds will bring reactions in some people, Dr. Lietzke pointed out.

Allergy reactions include hives or eczema on the skin, hay fever, or asthma.

Great Difficulties

One of the great difficulties in the study of allergies is that there is no supply of experimental animals with allergies—although occasionally one hears of an allergic animal, usually a household pet, Lietzke explained. The result is that all experiments have to be performed on humans, and many experiments which might cause permanent harm to the individuals are ruled out, he added.

Lietzke and other OSU scientists are now trying to make rabbits allergic to timothy pollen. If the experiments are successful, it will be possible to select allergic type rabbits for breeding and eventually to obtain a colony of highly allergic rabbits which could be used for new types of studies.

Tendency Is Hereditary

The tendency to show allergy symptoms is hereditary, findings of other research groups have shown, but the actual substances to which a person becomes allergic seem to be entirely a matter of chance. A father, for example, may be allergic to one food; his son to another.

Many people who get allergy symptoms after eating food are shown by skin tests not to be allergic to that food, it was noted. They apparently are allergic to the digestion products of the food and it is only after the food has been partially digested that symptoms occur.

The project at Oregon State was initiated by Dr. Charles E. Reed, Corvallis physician and staff member of the University of Oregon medical school and the OSU Science Research Institute. He is in charge of all tests involving human volunteers.

Oregon State has received grants of \$80,000 during the past four years for the allergy research.

Communications System for Home Introduced Here

A new home communications system that enables a person to answer the front door or mind the baby over the telephone has been introduced by Pacific Telephone Northwest in Medford, according to local manager J. H. Creager.

The new system, called Home Interphone, works entirely through telephones. Besides door-answering and electronic baby-sitting features, it provides a variety of services such as hands-free talking and broadcasting by voice throughout the house.

"The new Home Interphone is a real first—permitting a wide range of intercom services plus the handling of outside calls from every phone in the house," Creager said. "It has been designed to make life easier, safer and more enjoyable for the family."

The new system uses special extension telephones to perform the various telephone, broadcasting and intercommunication services. The equipment, consisting of a telephone and a small separate speaker, is available in a variety of colors. Door-answering is carried out through an outside microphone-speaker combination. The control unit and transformer which power the system are installed in the basement or other out-of-sight location.

"The system is particularly useful in emergencies, such as reporting a fire or accident, calling for help, or telling the family to vacate the house in the event of a serious fire," he pointed out.

Home Interphone has a lifetime guarantee, with repairs and maintenance provided by the telephone company at no cost to the customer, he said. There is an installation and a monthly charge for the new system.

A variety of telephones can make up Home Interphone, including desk phone and wall phone, as well as the new Princess phone.

Law Enforcement Officials Attend Training Class

Medford area law enforcement officers yesterday afternoon attended the fifth in a series of six advanced police training classes being held this spring. The session was held at Santo hall.

Problems faced by police officers in the proper handling of cases involving the mentally ill were discussed by Lt. Thomas W. Simmons, Portland bureau of police.

Lieutenant Simmons, a member of the Oregon state bar, is president of the Oregon State Mental Health association. He has served with the Portland police bureau for the past 22 years, and is presently assigned as coordinator of civil defense in the Portland area.

The final class in this year's series will be held Monday, March 27, when Sgt. Dale Allen of the Eugene police department will discuss interviews, confessions, and signed statements.

Sergeant Allen has completed courses in municipal police administration and supervisory methods sponsored by the International City Managers' association and the federal bureau of investigation, and for the past five years has participated in the annual advanced schools sponsored by the Oregon Association of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriffs association.

Upon completion of the six classes, certificates will be awarded to all law enforcement officers in the area who have participated in the required number of classes.
