

Helicopter Joins Search for Judge In Missing Plane

Salem—UPI—An Air Force jet-powered helicopter was to join the search today for missing Circuit Judge Richard Anderson, 38, whose light plane vanished last Sunday on a flight from Lebanon to the coast.

An aerial search and a ground search by mounted deputies produced no results Wednesday. The mounted group hunted the Taylor's little area near Cottage Grove.

State Aeronautics Director Earl Snyder said his "optimism has run its course."

He said that several leads ended in dead-ends Wednesday, including the wreckage of one old plane "that comes up periodically."

Last Day of Search

Snyder said today would be the last day of the aerial search unless new leads are found.

The jet helicopter was to be used in the Logsdan area northeast of Newport. Snyder said the area had possibilities because many residents reported hearing a plane there last Sunday.

Ground parties from the Lincoln County Sheriff's office were to conduct a ground search beneath the helicopter.

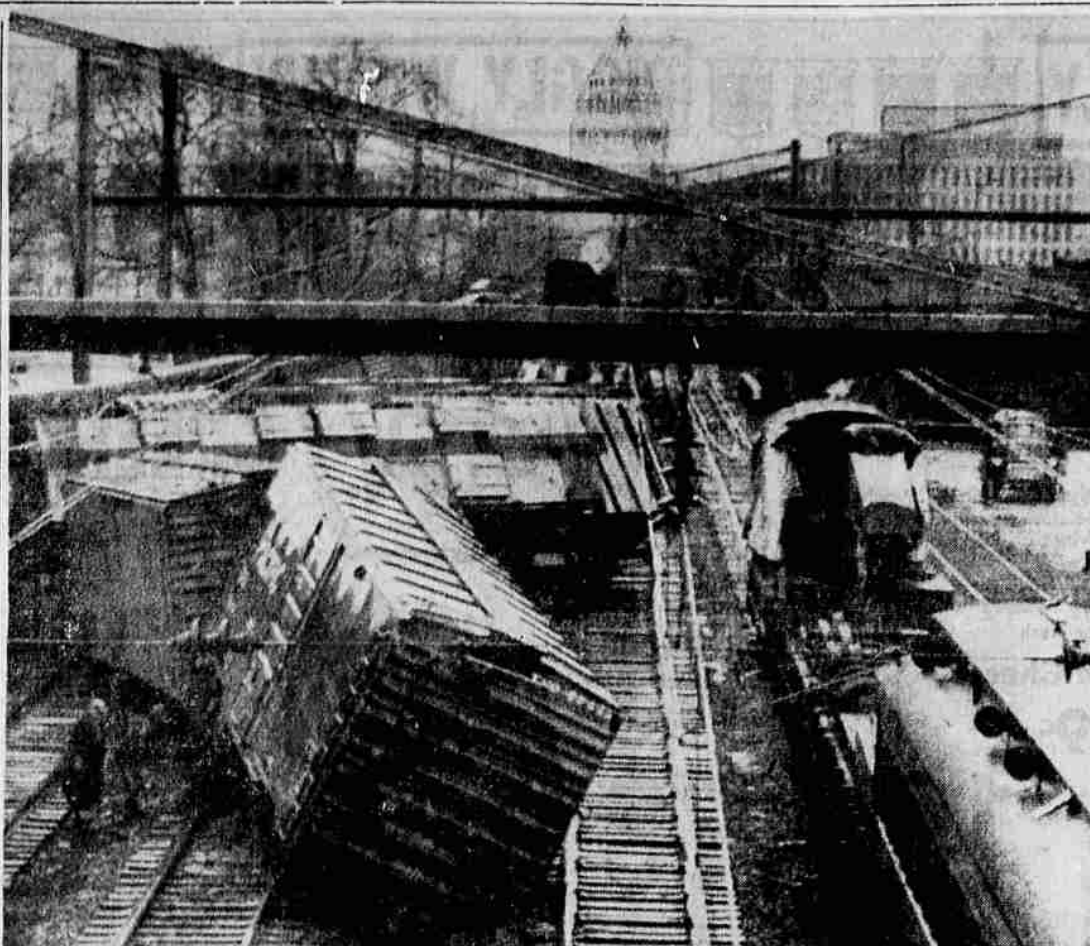
Snyder said there was a possibility the red and cream Piper Tri-Pacer could have gone down at sea but it was more likely it went down in an inland area.

Telephone Company Asks To Sell Stock

Salem—UPI—Sunnyside Telephone Co. has filed an application for authority to sell 87,664 shares of one dollar par value common stock to the June S. Jones Co. in Portland.

Sunnyside said the funds derived from the sale would be used to finance a portion of its 1961-62 construction program.

The company serves about 1,500 subscribers in the Sunnyside-Damascus areas in Clackamas county and the Yamhill-Lafayette area in Yamhill county.

Business Bureaus Issue Warning Of Gypsters on the Home Front

New York—UPI—Are you an economic ignoramus where home improvements are concerned?

Thousands of trusting home owners are. Last year, gypsters feeding on the trust and ignorance collected more than \$500 million in payments for work that wasn't completed, or, in some cases, never started.

In lots of ways, the swindlers have found the innocent home owner fair game in their gentle art of getting something — your money — for

practically nothing. Home improvement gripes last year headed the list of complaints registered with the Better Business Bureaus across the nation.

Wailing Walls
In most cases, the bureaus could only act as a kind of wailing wall for the homeowners who had been taken on a fast ride to economic loss.

"There's not much we can do in most cases," Thomas C. Roberts of the Association of Better Business Bureaus said in an interview. "Our warn-

ings about 'investigate before you sign' fall on too many deaf ears."

"The home improvement swindlers come out like flies in spring, baiting the homeowners with impossible deals, ads that don't mean what they say, and sweet-sounding sales pitches."

"Once you've signed on the dotted line, he's got you," Roberts said. "And this is when most homeowners make their initial costly mistake."

Sometimes, for example, the papers to be signed include a "completion certificate." Once you've put your name on it, you have certified that the work has been completed.

One of the sweetest deals — to sour your bank balance — is the model home scheme. The salesman usually says it won't cost much to patch up your house, making it look like something out of a builder's magazine.

He offers to do it and will give you a hefty discount if he can use your home as a model when trying to land other contracts in the neighborhood. What's more, he'll give you a commission on every other contract he completes after other customers have seen your "model home."

Cheap Job
J. R. Hoffman, head of the real estate division at the National Better Business Bureau, said the "model pitch" is almost epidemic in proportion. The Bureau has just sent out an alert on the racket to chambers of commerce nationwide.

From the sound of the "model deal," there's a chance you might even get your home

fixed up for nothing. "Usually, you get a cheap repair job — and pay through the nose," Hoffman warned.

Then there are the scare artists. They knock on the door and tell you the chimney is falling down or your house is a fire trap. For the minimum, the salesman will have the trouble fixed. Usually, the minor job becomes major and you pay the maximum.

Underquoting and overpricing are other tricks in the swindler's bag. They say they'll do the work for less than a reputable contractor. They do poor work, charge more and you're the loser.

Typical Ad
Typical of the home improvement ads was one investigated by the Long Island Better Business Bureau recently. The firm offered aluminum siding for \$295. The aluminum siding was a paint, or as a salesman for the firm put it — a "coating pigmented with aluminum."

What can you do to keep your home from becoming a paradise for the gyp artists? The Better Business Bureau suggests:

—Find out about the contractor before going ahead. Check on work that he has done. Once you've established his reliability, you can proceed with reasonable confidence.

—Read and understand everything before you sign it. If you don't understand, see your lawyer.

—When you have reservations about the reliability of a firm, check with the Better Business Bureau. There's no charge for the service.

—Never sign a completion certificate for the job before it is properly completed.

—Beware if the salesman or company tries to high-pressure you into signing a contract.

—Before falling for the security in a long-time guarantee, establish the fact that the company probably will be in existence or financially able to fulfill the guarantee — 10, 15 or 20 years later, if that's how long the guarantee runs.

About 200 Are Served By Travelling Clinic

Portland—Nearly 200 persons in eight Oregon counties have been served by the mobile physical therapy clinic of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults since the clinic was inaugurated by the society in November, 1959, according to William R. Wells, Portland, society president.

Purpose of the traveling clinic is to provide physical therapy in areas of the state where it is not available, Wells said, explaining that service is based on referral and prescription of local physicians.

The clinic is financed through the society's annual sale of Easter Seals, plus fees from those who are able to pay.

Miss Marcelle Montgomery, registered physical therapist who operates the mobile clinic, traveled 62,017 miles of Oregon highway from November, 1959, to March 31, 1961, giving 854 treatments to the 186 patients visited, Wells' report stated. She travels in a station wagon and carries portable equipment.

In addition to giving therapy treatments, Miss Montgomery instructs members of the family or friends on giving specified therapy during her absence.

Patients treated included accident victims and persons suffering from arthritis, cerebral palsy, strokes, frozen shoulders, bursitis, Bell's palsy, congenital heart conditions, Parkinson's disease, and polio.

Miami, Fla.—UPI—Miami ranks second only to New York in its need for Christ, evangelist Billy Graham said Wednesday night.

"There was a greater hunger here . . . a desperation to find Christ . . . than any city since New York," Graham said. "A city like this attracts the spiritually homeless, the misfits."

"The ministers here felt referred and prescribed treatments."

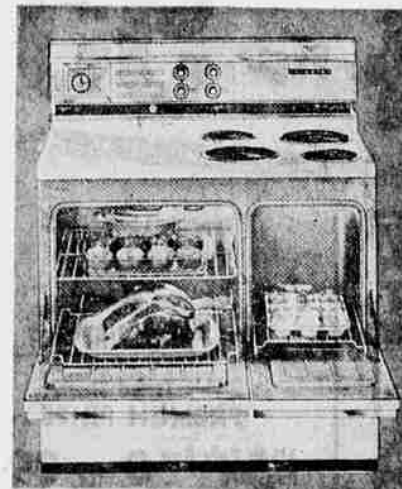
