

Pro-Amateur Golf Tourney Here This Monday, Tuesday

Oregon Professional Golfers association will have its largest entry in its spring tour of southern Oregon when the annual rivalry is staged Monday and Tuesday at Rogue Valley Country club here.

RVCC Pro Ron Caperna said that 33 professionals are signed for the event. Each pro is to have four amateur partners. This means a field of up to 165 entrants. Play will be in fivesomes.

Golfers will tee off starting at 7:50 a.m. each day. Pro slated to start the action both days is George Twitchell. His partners from the Medford links are Howard Cusic and Bill Jennings.

The tourney actually is a three day meet. It will get underway this morning at Roseburg Country club.

Touring pros are bringing two of their amateur partners with them. The other two will be from the Medford club. Pairings of the RVCC amateurs with the pros have been made. Names of all amateurs coming here are not available.

Bill Eggers, Rose City, Portland, three-day pro winner last year, will not be defending but Eddie Hogan, Riverside, Portland, victor in 1959, will participate if not kept in Portland by illness in the family.

The tourney will have some top notch performers from among both the pro and amateur ranks. A veteran of the national pro circuit is Bob Duden, Oswego, who was national open low qualifier one year. Duden has won the Oregon open three times and has copped both the Northwest and Washington opens.

Also among contenders is Bunny Mason, Columbia-Edgewater, Portland, reigning Oregon PGA champion, and Boots Porterfield, Grants Pass, former state OGA titlist. He was third low pro in the spring tour last year.

The Cowboys added nine points to their total to 72 and maintain their 21-point lead over defending champion and second place Oklahoma.

The Sooners also added nine points today.

It was the 22nd title for Oklahoma State and the 27th time an Oklahoma school had won the crown.

Cuban KO's Frenchman In Second

New York — (UPI)—Florentino Fernandez, Cuban knockout artist, earned a possible mid-

deweight title fight Saturday by flattening Marcel Pigou of France in the second round of a nationally televised bout at Madison Square Garden.

Fernandez, who weighed 158 pounds to Pigou's 159, dropped the Frenchman with a solid left hook. Pigou tried hard to get up but was counted out at 2:11 while crouched on his hands and knees.

The Frenchman had to be helped to his corner and it took several minutes for his handlers to bring him around.

Before the fight, Mary Jensen, manager of Gene Fullmer, who holds the NBA version of the world middleweight crown, indicated he would give the winner a shot at Fullmer.

It was the 24th kayo in 30 pro bouts for Fernandez, who graduated last year from the welterweight ranks. The Cuban has lost only two fights.

It was Pigou's fourth fight in the United States but his first in the Garden. The Frenchman, whose style is more American than European, mixed freely with Fernandez in the first round but did catch a few solid punches that raised welts on his body. Slipped to Canvas

Pigou slipped to the canvas early in the second round. When he arose, Fernandez caught him with a strong right to the face. The Cuban moved in quickly, and shook Marcel again with a barrage of punches, then unloaded his feared left hook that sent Pigou toppling to the canvas.

Before his electrifying knockout, Fernandez opened a slight cut alongside Pigou's left eye. The Cuban suffered a slight head cash, probably caused when he and Pigou butted heads early in the second round.

It was only the fourth defeat in 41 pro fights for Pigou, a native of Chartres, France. In his last American appearance, he outpointed ringwise Ralph (Tiger) Jones at Boston last November.

Three-Way Tie Set at Miami

Miami Beach — (UPI)—An unbroken run of sub par rounds by Julius Boros, Gay Brewer Jr. and Gary Player thrust them into a three-way first place tie Saturday in the \$25,000 Sunshine Open Golf tournament with 54 - hole totals of 204 each, 12 under par.

Jay Hebert, leader after each of the first two rounds by a single stroke, skidded to a three-over-par 75 today to drop five strokes off the pace at 209.

Player and Brewer played in the same threesome with Hebert Saturday. Brewer outplayed nine greens en route to a 69 and Player doled out only 29 putts as he put together the day's best round, a five-under-par 67.

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Ohio State, Cincinnati Reach Finals in NCAA Hoop Tourney

Kansas City, Mo. — (UPI)—John Egan and James Lynan combined to score 11 points in the fourth overtime period Saturday night to give St. Joseph's of Philadelphia, Pa., a 127-120 victory over Utah for third place in the NCAA championship basketball tournament.

Cincinnati met Ohio State in the second game for the title.

Three tournament records were set and one was tied in the St. Joseph's - Utah struggle. Both teams broke the single game scoring record of 108 points set by Utah against Seattle in 1955 and the 247 points were the most scored by two teams in a single game, the old record being 208.

Both teams broke the tournament record in N-C double A playoffs for a single season, Utah finishing with 368 points and St. Joseph's with 384. The record was held by Iowa's 1958 team which scored 340.

It was the second overtime game in the history of N-C-A-A tournament play. In 1956 Canisius defeated North Carolina State 79 to 78 in four extra periods.

Egan and Utah's Billy McGill staged a torrid scoring duel. Egan finishing with 42 points and McGill with 34. But the difference was sophomore guard Lynan who scored 31 points and turned in a tremendous floor game.

Kansas City, Mo. — (UPI)—Defending national champion Ohio State, riding the crest of a 32-game winning streak, and Cincinnati gained the Saturday night final in the 1961 NCAA basketball championship playoffs.

Ohio State advanced with a 95-69 win over St. Joseph's of Philadelphia, Pa., and Cincinnati wallowed Utah, 82-67, in Friday night's semifinals.

Ohio State Coach Fred Taylor attributed his team's latest victory to a fast break offense, a strong second half defense, and Jerry Lucas.

"Jerry had a wonderful night," Taylor said. "He seems

to be back in form as a foul shooter. He seemed to be under par last week. Statistics showed he made ten of 11 shots from the field which must be his best night of the season."

Lucas scored 29 points, but three Ohio State teammates joined him in double figures as the Big Ten conference champions sank 63.3 per cent from the field.

Larry Siegfried had 21 points, Melvyn Nowell 15, and John Havlicek 11 for the Buckeyes.

The best point producer for St. Joseph's and the only Pennsylvanian to hit with any consistency, was 6-8 center Vincent Kempton who had 18 points.

Moore Gets Easy Nod In Manila

Manila — (UPI)—Ageless Archie Moore battered Buddy Turman of Tyler, Tex., at will Saturday to win an easy unanimous decision in the Philippines' first heavyweight fight, a roundly-boiled 10-

rounder before 20,000 at Araneta Coliseum.

Moore, whose world light-heavyweight title was stripped from him by the National Boxing association but who is still recognized as champion in New York toyed with Turman throughout the fight and had his opponent bleeding from a cut below the left eye in the second round.

Hardly Touched

Moore was hardly touched by Turman, whose blows he either ignored or fended off. The crowd booed at the end of every round starting from the fourth after seeing that Turman could not land a solid punch.

At the end of the fight, Turman had a bashed nose, a closed and bleeding left eye and a swollen, half-closed right eye.

All score cards showed that Turman did not win a single round. Referee Felipe Cunanan had it 50-39; and Judge Wenceslao Trinidad 50-42 and R. M. Da Los Reyes 50-43. United Press International scored it 50-40.

It was Moore's second victory over Turman. He won a 10-round decision in Dallas, Tex., last November. Moore weighed 203, Turman 187½.

St. Joseph's started off fast, grabbing a 5-0 lead in the first three minutes and 46 seconds of play. But then Lucas went to work and scored five points in the next 72 seconds. Nowell hit a jump shot from the side, and Ohio State was sailing toward its 27th win of the season and its 32nd in a row — dating back through the 1959-60 campaign.

Cincinnati was behind twice in its game with Utah, 2-0 and 8-6, but caught up on two free throws by Bob Wiesenbahn and went ahead on a corner shot by Carl Bouldin with 15:35 remaining in the half. The Bearcats enjoyed a 35-20 advantage at the intermission, and the closest Utah came in the second half was ten points.

Cincinnati recorded its win despite a 25-point performance by Utah's Billy McGill.

But McGill did not get enough help from his mates — forward Rick Ruffell being the only other Redskin in double figures with 14 points.

Bouldin led Cincinnati with 21 points and Paul Hogue scored 18. Wiesenbahn tallied 14 and Tony Yates 13 for the Bearcats, who outshot Utah 50.8 per cent to 40.3 per cent.

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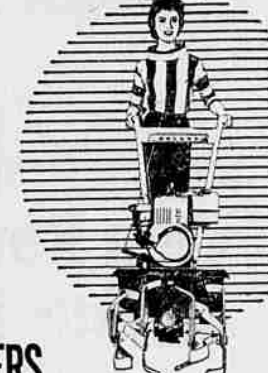
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
