Mrs. William Seibert, Medford, council president, urges

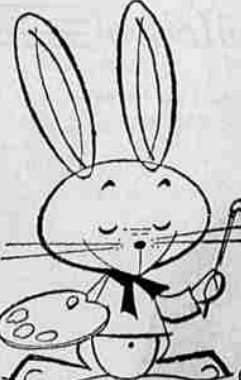
newly elected presidents of local units and those going to the convention for the first time to attend this clinic.
