

Club Topics Contrast Heritage of Americans

Ashland—Contrasting viewpoints of America's heritage from Backbay Boston to Oregon's Rogue River valley made for an interesting program Monday afternoon when members of Ashland Study Club met at the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Sommer.

Not only were the book review and the selected subject keyed to each other in general theme but the atmosphere of the venerable old home with its high-ceilinged spacious parlors gave nostalgic reminder of life lived within its walls for more than 80 years. The Oak street home, built by Mrs. Sommer's grandfather John McCall, is considered one of Ashland's oldest and most beautiful residences.

Mrs. Harry Skerry Jr. chose for her book review "The Silent Traveller in Boston" by Chiang Yee. Educated in Nanking as a chemist and later serving as provincial governor, Chiang went to England where for many years he studied and lectured on paintings and on peoples and places of particular significance. In America he has won widespread recognition for both his writing and his artistry. The book reviewed by Mrs. Skerry is illustrated by many of the author's paintings and black and white sketches.

"Chiang writes with a quiet charm," said the reviewer, "Seeking similarities rather than contrasts and seeing Boston and its historic environs through the rainbow of an Oriental artist's eyes, the grim spirit still lives."

Mrs. Sommer presented a resume of pioneer days when her two grandfathers, John McCall and Jacob Wagner, established their families and businesses in Ashland and Talent. Both men had mined gold in California before deciding to homestead in the southern Oregon valley. Excerpts from diaries and letters, clippings from yellowed pages of The Ashland Tidings, and accounts of family and community happenings as recorded in the old scrap-

book kept by her mother were the basis for Mrs. Sommer's talk which she entitled "The Founding Fathers of Ashland."

Development of farm land, building of a flour mill and a woolen mill, establishment of the first school, were among the highlights in the lives of the two early day settlers. Service to their country in time of war and to their neighbors in time of peace were interwoven with hardships and successes of life a century ago. An amusingly vivid account of President Rutherford B. Hayes visit to Ashland described the four little girls in frilly white dresses who presented baskets of fruits and flowers to the distinguished guest. Two of that quartette, Miss Lydia McCall and Mrs. Mabel Kinney, still live in Ashland.

During the concluding social hour when the hostess served tea, old pictures and documents furnished interesting conversation and endless questions.
