Vern Moore paced the 16-yard shooters with 98 for Class B prize.

Some 40 shooters contended in wind and showers.

In Class A at 16 yards Martin and Frank Clogston each broke 97 birds and Martin gained top prize by coin flip. Pease with 95 was runnerup to Moore in Class B.

Tom Mehl, Glendale, won Class C with 93 and Bob McIntyre was next with 87. Class D winner was Davis Young with 94. Bert Peck was second in the division with 93.

Chuck Skeeters took 16-yard subjunior award for an 86 and Clint Gibson the junior prize with 79.

C. O. Dukes was right behind Pease in the handicap with a 90.

Gene Hunt with 43 followed Jackson in Class 2 doubles.

Marlowe Quick, Astoria, took over the two-day pro lead in the Oregon Professional Golfers association spring tour yesterday by firing an even par 72 at Rogue Valley Country club here.

Quick put his 72 with a 75, carded Sunday at Roseburg Country club, for a two-day 147.

Bob Duden, professional from Oswego, matched Quick's Monday 72. But, like on Sunday, it was an amateur who had the low score yesterday. Stewart Schroeder, Oregon State university golf ace and ex-Medford high, was two under standard with a 70.

The three-day tourney was to conclude today with single-day pro-amateur best ball and amateur net competition along with the gross rivalry for pros and amateurs and the overall tourney gross honors for the professionals.

Four pros were two strokes back of Quick with 149's for two days. They were Tom Marlowe, Estmoreland, Portland, 73-76, Al Mundle, Columbia-Edgewater, Portland, 74-75, and Harvey Hixson, Eugene, 74-75.

Rogue Valley's Ron Caperna was third low yesterday with a 73. Four with 74s were Boots Porterfield, Grants Pass, Jerry Cloniger, Prineville, Mundle and Mel Babica, Eureka, Calif.

In the Monday pro-amateur best ball Glen Spivey, Glendover, Portland, and Schroeder compiled a 65 to share low with Caperna and Dr. Bruce Stanley, Medford, Cloniger and Ron Mitchell, Chico, Calif., teamed for a 67 as did Babica and Ed Kovacovich, Eureka.

Bob Smith, Portland State college, who had the low card at Roseburg with a 72, fired the same score here yesterday and Mitchell also had a 72. Four other amateurs had 75s. They were Amel Pascuzzi, Royal Oaks, Vancouver, Wash., Jim Sheldon, Medford, Kovacovich and Tom Shaw, University of Oregon.

Jess Bradley was low net amateur with 80-11-69. Mitchell was second with 81-12-70.

Chicago - (UPI) - The largest fine in hockey history, \$2,000, rode on the shoulders of Montreal Canadiens Coach Toe Blake today heading into the fourth game of the Stanley Cup semifinal playoff series against the Chicago Black Hawks.

Welcome arrival on the Mail Tribune sports desk last week and was the Oregon Class A-1 high school basketball tournament report booklet, compiled by Art Litchman, University of Oregon Athletic news director, and his staff, who always do such a fine job for the press at the tournament in Eugene.

The booklet contains pictures of the Medford high and Klamath Falls teams and action shots of games in which the two clubs were involved, a tournament review, all-time summaries of 1961 tournament teams, tournament of defensive and team records for the 1961 tourney and over the years, statistics on each team's full participation in the tourney, box summaries of each of the 28 games, attendance summaries and a basket by basket account of the final game.

There was no information saying so long with the booklet but we are sure that Art has extra copies and that fans who want them can write to him at McArthur court at Eugene, enclosing 50c per copy, of course.

MEDFORD TOPS STATE

The tournament booklet shows that Medford, runner-up to Klamath Falls for the A-1 hoop diadem, was the top offensive and defensive team of the 1961 extravaganza.

Medford's Black Tornado scored 248 points and averaged 82 per game, both highs for the classic. Klamath Falls was right behind with 244 and 81. Grant of Portland was third high with 239 points and 59.8 per game.

The Tornado was the least scored upon team among those which went the full route of the tournament, allowing 179, and had the best game average of all participants, permitting rivals to put in only 44.8 counters per contest. But the best evidence of Medford's tremendous defensive prowess was a 51-21 victory in the field goal averages. Teams hit only .310 from the field against the Hurricane. Grant was next best field defender, yielding buckets at a .315 average. Teams fired .323 against David Douglas, third best.

TORNADO AVERAGES 402

Medford was one of three teams which averaged over 400 on shots from the field. 99 of 246 tries for 402. Grande connected at 439 in two losing causes and St. Helen's shot .410 in three games.

Klamath led in total field goals with 100 and David Douglas' 62 free shots were high.

Medford's .617 free toss average was only seventh on the list. Grant was tops with .718.

EATON HEADS SHOOTING

Scott Eaton was one of two Medford individual players with statistical bests in the tourney. His .882 on 15 of 22 was the top field goal accuracy mark. Bob Quinney's 89 points 22.3 average and 54 rebounds are performances which already have been publicized. Quinney's 37 field goals were the most.

REBOUND RECORDS

Medford did the only all-time tourney record breaking with its 77 rebounds in the Tillamook game and 213 retrieves for the tourney. Larry Enos, Corvallis tied one mark with his perfect 10 for 10 against Klamath Falls from the free toss line. Gary Patzke had the best field goal shooting percentage in a single 1961 tournament game, .615 on eight of 13. This was based apparently on a minimum of 10 tries a game. Eaton had seven of nine, .777, for Medford against Klamath in the titular finale. Bruce Brickner, Klamath Falls was top single game rebounder with 21.

.654 ALL-TIME MARK

Medford high, 23 times an entry in state tournament basketball, has a record of 51 wins and 27 losses over the tourney history. Its percentage of wins, .654, is best among the longtime tourney teams, and is second best only to the .714 of David Douglas, which has played in just two tournaments.

The Black Tornado has had 15 first team all-stars and 15 second team all-tourney players.

In the summary Medford is show with two past championships and six appearances in the finals of the cage meet. It actually has won three crowns and has been a finalist eight times.

SPRING DOPE WANTED

Lakers Near NBA Western Title

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## 70 Victories Goal Of Philadelphians In National Loop

(This is the sixth of 18 dispatches on the 1961 prospects of the major league teams.)

Clearwater, Fla. - (UPI) - Gene Mauch insists the Philadelphia Phillies will be an improved ball club this year because:

"I'll be a better manager. 'The kids we played last year are bound to improve.'"

So the youngest manager in the majors at 35 has set 70 victories as the goal for this season and he hopes that will be enough to enable the Phillies to climb out of the National League cellar.

He seems to be aiming mighty high, considering the talent he has available.

Mauch admits the Phillies definitely need a power hitter in order to take the pressure off such kids as John Callison and Tony Gonzalez, and a catcher who can work in 130 or 140 games. There are no candidates for either job in camp and the only way the Phillies can get them is through deals. They haven't much material which the other clubs want except relief pitcher Dick Farrell, and he isn't on the market.

Mauch claims his pitching will be okay.

It will be anchored by the veteran Robin Roberts, who appears to be nearing the end of one of the most brilliant pitching careers in the National League. Last year, Roberts won 12 while losing 16 as the Phillies finished in the cellar, 36 games behind the Pirates.

They won only 59 games, all of them under Mauch who took over for Eddie Sawyer last year after the Phillies lost their opening game of the season.

To Be Starters

To go along with Roberts as starters Mauch is counting on Frank Sullivan, 6-16 with the Red Sox last season; Art Mahaffey, who won seven and lost three after the Phillies recalled him from Buffalo where he had an 11-9 record; Jim Owens (4-14), John Buzhardt (6-16) and Chris Short (6-9).

Mahaffey is regarded as a coming star, Mauch thinks he can get Sullivan back on the winning track and that Buzhardt and Short have good potential. Owens is a question mark because he left camp after creating a disturbance in the Phillies spring training

hotel and hasn't been heard from since.

Farrell will be the relief ace with Jack Meyer, who was out most of last season with a bad back, a bullpen and starting possibility if he is sound again.

Other hurling possibilities are Ruben Gomez, 0-3 with the Phillies and 7-8 with Buffalo and Miami; Jack Baldschun, a 12-game winner at Columbia; Dallas Green, 3-6 with the Phillies and 3-4 with Buffalo.

Clay Dalrymple and Jib Coker, who hit .272 and .214 respectively last year in their first full season in the majors, will share the coming duties unless Mauch comes up with one in a trade. Clarence Coleman, drafted from Montreal where he hit .258, may be kept but the three of them put together do not measure up to a winning catching combination.

Two infield positions are set - the hard-hitting Pancho Herrera at first and Tony Taylor at second. Herrera, in his first full season last year, hit .289 with 17 homers and 71 runs batted in. Taylor, one of the better second basemen in the league, batted .284.

Joe Koppe, who held down the job last season until he was hurt, has the inside track for shortstop although he hit only .171. Ruben Amaro, who hit .231 when he took over for Koppe is another candidate. Bob Wine, a .269 hitter at Buffalo has an outside chance.

For third, Mauch is giving Jim Woods, although he hit only .260 at Indianapolis, a long look. Lee Walls, the former outfielder with a .233 mark last season, also is in the fight for the job. Ted Lepcio (.227) and Bob Malkmus (.211) are available for utility infield duty.

Six outfielders are in the running for regular jobs. Callison, who hit .260 last season, probably will win one of the jobs. The others are up for grabs with Tony Curry, a .261 hitter last year, the most impressive thus far. He reported to camp some 15 pounds overweight, drawing Mauch's wrath, but has been the leading hitter in exhibition games.

Bobby Del Greco (.237), Gonzalez (.274), B. G. Smith (.286) and Ken Walters (.239) are the other gardeners.

None of the six appears capable of generating the power the Phillies need to offset the lack of infield and catching punch.

## East-West Hoop Game Tonight

Kansas City, Mo. - (UPI) - The East's shooting will be pitted against the West's height tonight in the 10th annual Shrine East-West basketball game.

Nineteen of the nation's finest college basketball players will be assembled on the same floor. The East starting lineup will average 6 feet 4 inches, and the West 6 feet 6 inches.

West - Forwards, Cedric Price of Kansas State and Bill Bridges of Kansas; center, Walt Bellamy of Indiana; and guards, Gary Phillips of Houston and Tom Meschery of St. Mary's, Calif.

The East team will be coached by Eddie Donovan of St. Bonaventure, while Sharm Scheuerman of Iowa will tutor the West club.

Proceeds from the game go to the Shriners' crippled children's hospitals.

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
