GOP Legislative Leaders Attack Defense Budget

Washington — (UPI) — Republican legislative leaders charged today that the Kennedy administration is embarking on a "deficit decade" and "will not be bothered by making the books balance."

The GOP budget salvo was fired as both parties in Congress made it clear President Kennedy might not be able to carry out his deep cutback in the B70 super-bomber program, one "saving" in his \$43.8 billion defense budget. In a joint budget statement, Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen and House Speaker Charles A. Halleck said the administration began by claiming that underestimates by the Eisenhower administration turned a small surplus into an \$800 million deficit for fiscal 1961.

In addition, the Republicans said, the administration set up "two sets of books" — one for general spending, the other for defense — and proposed to hike defense spending by "another two-thirds of a billion for the year ending June 30, 1962, with a hint that it might be more."

"The net of all this is pretty plain," they concluded. "The new fiscal frontier balance sheet will be in the red on June 30; it will be a deeper red on June 30, 1962. The debt ceiling will have to be lifted. And the deficit decade will have a pretty good start."

Grants Pass Man Hurt in Accident

David Crawford, 51, of 1461 Rogue River highway, Grants Pass, was reported in fairly good condition today at Sacred Heart hospital after suffering injuries in a tractor accident about 3 p.m. Tuesday near Medford.

According to relatives, Crawford was helping a friend, Charles Swagerty, Grants Pass, with some construction work at the Swagerty ranch on Foothills rd. when the accident occurred. A crawler tractor, operated by Swagerty, became stuck in the mud, and Crawford was attempting to pull it out with a farm tractor when it overturned.

Swagerty, his son, Robert, and some California Oregon Power company men working nearby assisted in lifting the tractor off Crawford.

The injured man was taken to Sacred Heart hospital where he was reported suffering from broken ribs and a punctured lung. He is normally employed as a timber cutting foreman for the Grants Pass logging contractor of J. E. Bennett and Sons.

Sabotage Checked At Plane Wreck

Forchheim, Germany — (UPI) — Investigators searched the wreckage of a Soviet-built Czechoslovakian airplane early today for possible evidence of sabotage.

All 52 persons aboard died in the fiery crash Tuesday night.

"We cannot rule out the possibility of an explosion aboard the plane," State Police Inspector Paul Assman said.

The Ilushin-18 turbo-prop plane flying from Prague to Zurich, Switzerland, crashed in the desolate Bavarian countryside near the Czech border.

Police said they believed 11 children were among the mangled bodies taken from the burning wreckage.

Tipster's Family Wins \$30,000 Suit

New York — (UPI) — The parents of a man who was murdered after leading police to bank robber Willie (The Actor) Sutton nine years ago won a court judgment of \$30,000 late Tuesday night on the ground police failed to protect him from gangland vengeance.

The tipster, Arnold Schuster, 24, was shot down near his Brooklyn home less than three weeks after he told police where Sutton was hiding out. His murder has never been solved.

Schuster's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Max Schuster, charged police did not give him adequate protection, and sued the city for \$1,050,000. An all-male Supreme Court jury agreed with the negligence charge by a vote of 11-1 and set damages at \$30,000.

Weed Meeting Set In County Thursday

An all-day weed control meeting will be held in Big Ham hall at the Jackson county fairgrounds starting at 10 a.m. Thursday, March 30.

A representative of the county extension office will start the meeting with a review of local weed problems.

Participating in the meeting will be Ray Kelson, Salem, supervisor of herbicide control for the state department of agriculture; Reb Warren, Oregon State university extension service, Corvallis; W. H. Kosenan and J. F. Smith, state highway department, both of Salem.

Farmers are invited to join with highway weed crews and commercial applicators in the session, which will conclude with Kelson giving state applicators examinations to those who wish. All commercial ground and air herbicide (chemical weed control) applicators are required to have a state license.

Jobless Pay Extension Set

Salem — (UPI) — Extended unemployment benefit payments will start in Oregon about April 10, totaling some \$1 million in the first month of the program, Gov. Mark Hatfield announced today.

Hatfield said State Employment Commissioner David Cameron will sign an agreement with Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg during the week of April 3 to bring the extended jobless payments to Oregon.

President Kennedy's bill to extend unemployment compensation was signed into law last week. Hatfield said Oregon participation would help some 200 to 300 workers who are exhausting their benefits each week.

OTI Director's Pay Limit Repeal Signed

Salem — (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield Tuesday signed a bill repealing the statutory limits on the salary range for the director of Oregon Technical Institute. Under the old law, the range was \$8,000 to \$11,000 a year.

He also signed a bill whereby the Board of Higher Education will take over operation of the OTI-licensed FM station, KTEC.

More Than 3,500 Forced To Flee Flooding Waters

Flooding rivers kept more than 3,500 persons out of their homes in eastern Iowa and southwestern Wisconsin today, snow fell on Kansas and Colorado, and thunderstorms hit parts of southern states.

About 3,000 persons were driven from their homes in the Waterloo-Cedar Rapids-Evansdale area of Iowa by the Cedar river, which was on its worst rampage in history.

In the Charles City and Mason City areas of northern Iowa, where 500 fled their homes, and in southwestern Wisconsin, where the Kickapoo river drove 400 out of their homes, flood waters began to recede.

Damage Mounts
The floods drew National Guard troops and hundreds of volunteers to sandbag crews at Waterloo. Damage to farmlands mounted.

"We can't hold out much longer," Waterloo Street Commissioner Carl Fagerlind said. "We're hoping for a rapid drop. We've got to have it."

Snow fell in parts of Colorado and Kansas, eight inches of snow had fallen at Weskan in Western Kansas by mid-morning and snow still was falling.

A mixture of rain and snow fell in Arizona, New Mexico and Texas and thunderstorms soaked northeastern Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Missouri. Snow flurries were scattered in wintry air over the upper Mississippi Valley.

Mild weather covered the West Coast.

No Major Battle Reported in Laos

Washington — (UPI) — The State department reported today that no major fighting is going on in Laos and that the Communist side is not attempting a major push.

Officer Lincoln White refused to speculate whether this reduced military activity amounted to a cease-fire which President Kennedy and Great Britain have demanded as a prerequisite for talks on settling the Laotian crisis.

White said latest reports indicate fighting is limited to "slight patrol activities" on both sides.

He said the Soviet airlift to Laotian Communist rebels was still continuing at last reports. The Russians have been parachuting supplies from transport planes.

Red Bloc Talks Quiet on Laos

Moscow — (UPI) — Communist bloc leaders went into their second day of secret Warsaw pact meeting today without replying to a Western proposal for a cease-fire in Laos.

Except for occasional glimpses of a curtained black limousine carrying one of the participants to the Kremlin sessions, the Communist chiefs remained secluded from foreign newsmen.

The Soviet press ignored the talks with the exception of a brief announcement Tuesday night that they had commenced.

The only available information was that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev had made the opening speech covering, among other things, Laos, disarmament and divided Germany.
