

Smith Tops Spring Golfing Tour; Marlowe Leads Pros

Amateur Bob Smith, Portland State collegian, recorded the low gross aggregate in the three-day spring golf tour staged by the Oregon Professional Golfers association.

His 217 was two strokes better than the 219 fired by Tom Marlowe, Eastmoreland, Portland, who gained professional first place prize money.

The tour, which opened Sunday at Roseburg Country Club, concluded yesterday after two days of play at Rogue Valley Country club here.

Smith stroked a one-over par 73 yesterday to go with 72 on the two previous days. Marlowe's 70 Tuesday tied for low for the day and was put with a 73 and a 76 for pro aggregate laurels.

Mitchell Third Low

Ron Mitchell, Chico, Calif., had third low card and second low gross for amateurs with 73-72-75-220.

There was a three-way tie for second pro aggregate. Knottling were Marlowe Quick, Astoria, 75-72-74-221; Bob Duden, Oswego, 79-72-70-221 and Al Mundle, Columbia-Edgewater, Portland, 75-74-72-221. Duden's 70 knotted with Tom Marlowe for Tuesday low.

Amateur Tom Shaw, University of Oregon, matched the 221 with daily counts of 73-73-73. Jim Sheldon, Medford, was fourth low amateur with 78-75-73-226.

Marvin Clark, Grants Pass, was amateur net winner for the three days with 66-73-73-212 and Ed Kovacovich, Eureka, Calif., was next with 71-72-70-213. Jess Bradley, Grants Pass, followed with 77-69-70-216 and Joe Player, Fortuna, Calif., had 74-72-74-220.

Mitchell and Smith had 214 nets but were eligible for only one prize and got better one for their gross counts. The same was true for Kovacovich, who had a 222 gross but whose net score was counted for prize.

Mundle Profits

Mundle profited most from the Tuesday pro-amateur best ball play. He combined with Bud Spezz of his home club for a 66 and with John Humphrey, Medford, for the same total. Mundle also combined with another amateur partner, Lloyd Mason, Salem, for one of six 67s which were tabulated.

Low pro scores yesterday also included a 71 by Jerry Cloniger, Prineville, a 72 by Mundle and 74s by Quick and Glen Spivey, Glendoever, Portland.

Smith, Kovacovich, Sheldon and Shaw were amateurs with 73s. Those with 75s were Mitchell, Joe Hallmark, University of Oregon, Al Holmes and Ed Simmons, Medford, and Bob McKown, Portland.

Bob Morris, Medford, had Tuesday amateur low net with 79-10-69. Bradley carded 81-11-70. Those with 71s yesterday were Walt Cline, Salem, and Larry Butler, Medford, each 76-5 and Don Devereaux, Eugene, 83-12-71.

There were 138 prose and amateurs on the course yesterday.

The National Basketball committee of the United States and Canada voted Tuesday to change the existing rule. The new rule will give the fouled team the ball out of bounds.

Two other rule changes went into effect at the annual meeting of the committee. They are:

Stop the clock after every violation so the coach will have greater opportunity to get substitutions into the game.

Buffer Zone

Create a neutral or buffer zone across the free throw lane to separate the first and second players by a foot when lining up for free throws.

Coaches may now signal players to call time out or to communicate other information without being in violation of the rules.

Officials were instructed to penalize coaches or players on the bench who persist in stomping, throwing towels or committing other acts considered unsportsmanlike.

Tie-games in high school will be decided by three-minute overtime sessions or as many short periods as are needed, eliminating sudden-death playoffs.

Bellamy, picked by the NBA's west entry, Chicago, led the West to a record-shattering 103-100 victory which gave the winners a 6-4 edge in the series.

Redskin Owner Given Warning

Washington - UPB - Interior Secretary Stewart Udall has given the Washington Redskins until next autumn to prove they do not discriminate against hiring Negro players.

Udall warned Redskins' owner George Preston Marshall last week that he might not be able to play his National Football league team in the new Washington stadium if he practices discrimination. The stadium was built with federal funds.

Open His Mind

At a news conference Tuesday, the secretary noted that Marshall's contract with the government to use the new stadium did not begin until next October.

"He can't break the contract until October," Udall said. "All we want to do is to open his mind a bit."

The Redskins, who finished at the bottom of their division of the National Football league last season, have never hired Negro players. Marshall has said the team gets most of its men from southern colleges which don't have Negroes.

Ahlqvist said the bout would draw a capacity crowd of 55,000 at Göteborg's new Ullevi soccer stadium, with Liston's purse probably amounting to \$240,000.

Barone's head was turned by a new offer from another source. He said he had received a telegram from a Los Angeles group offering "huge guarantees" for a Liston-Johansson bout. Barone said he wired the Californians to be "more specific."
