Medford Man Cleared Of Driving Charge

Arthur H. S. Gilmore, South Keene Way, Medford, was cleared of a charge of reckless driving Tuesday, when District Judge Loren L. Sawyer approved a motion for acquittal.

The complaint arose out of an incident in Medford last Dec. 15, but testimony presented to the court indicated there were mitigating circumstances, and the case was dismissed.

Boating Clubs Oppose Plan for Administrator

Salem —The Oregon Federation of Boating Clubs Wednesday opposed Gov. Mark Hatfield's plan to reorganize the State Marine Board, replacing it with a small board and harbors division headed by an administrator.

Howard Walker of Coos Bay, federation president, said a five-man board was better than "one-man rule" of an administrator.

Walker said the plan would reduce effectiveness of the present operation. He appeared before the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee.

Others to oppose the plan were the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Association, Oregon Marine Trades Association and Marion County Sheriff Denver Young.

Young said it seems to him the bill might mean that enforcement of some boating regulations might be more difficult. He also expressed concern about the possibility of loss of funds to counties.

He said a number of other sheriffs agree with him, including those of Linn, Clackamas and Jackson counties.

The division would come under a new natural resources department.
