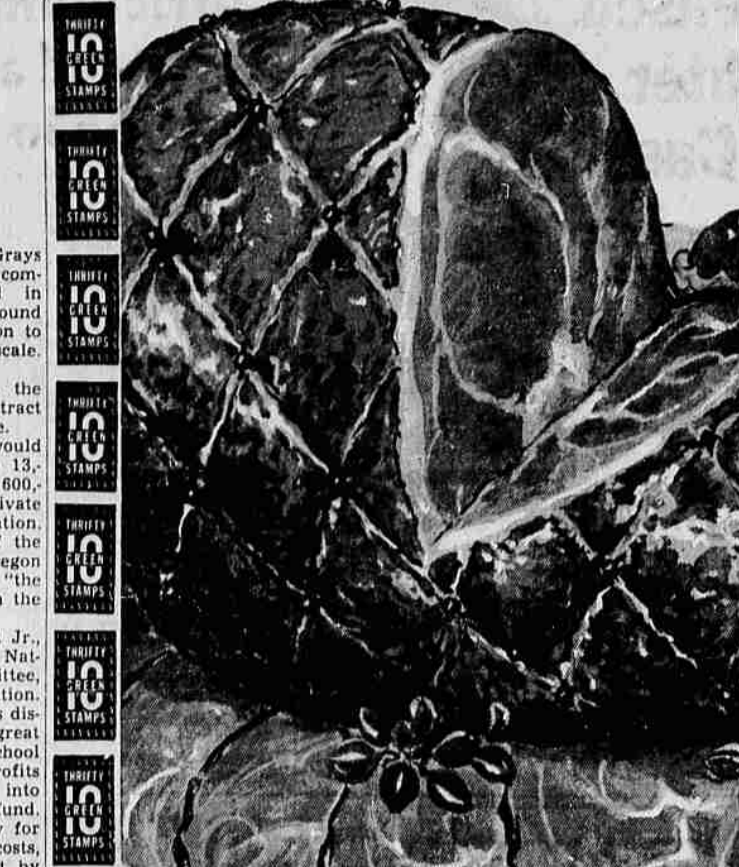


### Capitol Memo Rich Oil Deposits May Be Waiting in Depths of Oregon

Salem — UPI — The state geology director says rich, black pockets of oil may be waiting in the depths of Oregon's coast.

"There is a good possibility," according to Hollis Dole of Portland, "that there is no reason why oil shouldn't be found here." Oil is found in marine sediments in fair to good quantities in Oregon — at least a third of Oregon was ocean bottom.

**SECURITY SHROUDS  
Troop Movements  
In Honolulu**

Honolulu — (AP) — U.S. military movements sparked by the Laos crisis are masked by a smokescreen of official silence.

There was no doubt that some 6,000 men of the 1st Marine Brigade at Kaneohe Marine Air Station had left Hawaiian islands on board two transports in a state of fighting readiness when the carrier Kearsarge was sent from Pearl Harbor, and the ship-up in westbound traffic in Air Force bombers through the islands was heavier and impossible to hide every citizen.

Fewer on leave  
There appeared to be fewer men in uniform on leave on Honolulu streets last week, but what did they mean?

Every man in uniform who might know the answers was forbidden by a Pentagon "no comment" edict from telling. The order was so flat and clear that information allegedly coming from any military source of importance was automatically suspect.

Reports Vary  
One report had the Marines steaming under forced draft for Asia, another had them hiding their time between Hawaii and California awaiting orders, and another had them heading for Camp Pendleton near San Diego, for routine maneuvers.

The same confusion surrounded the Kearsarge, which was variously held for California, or for Asia, or maneuvering around the islands on antinuclear warfare practice.

### Tranquilizer Fails To Up Milk Production

New York — (Science Service) — The tranquilizer chlorpromazine has been found in grain rations to dairy cattle for 24 weeks without increasing milk production.

One of the most common beliefs of dairymen is that the lactating dairy cow responds to environmental conditions by alterations in milk production.

Conflicting reports from dairy scientists have shown variations in the effect of tranquilizers on weight gain and milk yield of beef cows and lambs.

### Tests Given at PHS Part of Guidance, Counseling Program

Phoenix — As part of the Phoenix High school guidance and counseling program two national tests were administered to 140 students at the high school recently.

All Juniors took the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test. The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational development and is taken annually by more than 400,000 high school Juniors throughout the nation.

The students were tested in English usage, math usage, social studies reading, natural science reading and word usage. The test is scored by the publishers, the Science Research Associates, and scores are returned to the school to be distributed to students and to be used as a tool in counseling.

Useful Purposes  
The test scores serve many useful educational purposes, according to Superintendent Ernest R. James. Identifying those students who have the most need for assistance is a prerequisite for effective and meaningful counseling. The tests can be of great value in helping parents and teachers understand the educational progress of their children in that the tests offer an objective basis of comparison from his on the part of the teacher, student and the parent, he noted.

Through the scores, school counselors, students and parents are able to identify those subjects where the student has his greatest strength and his greatest weakness. To his understanding what their MNSQT score means, an individual form is provided for each student and are distributed. Conferences are set up to assist counselors and parents interpret the results to the students.

### Carriage Lincoln Used Is Rotting In New Jersey

Trenton, N. J. 28 — On the second floor of the monkey house in Trenton's Cavalier Park, a carriage, which Abraham Lincoln once rode is rotting.

Lincoln was accompanied on that ride by a determined farmer, and therein lies a Lincoln tale.

Lincoln left New York Feb. 11, 1861, in a private railroad car, heading for his inauguration in Washington, March 4.

He whistled through the country, giving the people a chance to see their president-elect. On Feb. 21, he arrived at the Trenton station of the old Camden and Amboy Railroad.

A four-horse, two-seater carriage with polished wood frame and black leather upholstery awaited him. So did carriage owner James B. Bucklewey, a prosperous farmer in nearby Jamesburg.

Lincoln moved through a crowd of well-wishers and climbed into the carriage. Bucklewey started to climb into the carriage too. Guards pushed him away.

James B. replied that if his coach was good enough for Lincoln to ride in, then he was good enough to fit beside Lincoln, which he did, according to his granddaughter, Mrs. Katherine H. Hoover, 85, of Lambertville, N. J.

The rest of Lincoln's visit to Trenton went according to plan.

He was driven to a local hotel, addressed an enthusiastic crowd from the balcony, went on to the State House and delivered a short talk in which he recalled the nation's Revolutionary War history had on him as a child.

I recollect thinking then, even though I was, that there must have been something more than common that those men struggled for," Lincoln said.

"I am exceedingly anxious that that which they struggled for . . . this union, the Constitution and the liberties of the people, shall be perpetuated . . ." he told the State Senate.

The speech is recorded in "The Living Lincoln," by Paul M. Angle and Earl S. Mearns.

A few months later, the nation was engaged in civil war.

The carriage stayed in the Bucklewey family for years. Later, it was given to the city.

The fringe over the windows is bedraggled now. The upholstery is ripped, and the black leather top is cracked. Wheels and rigging have been untouched for years.

City officials say it would cost \$200 to replace the fringe. The woodwork and leather might be overhauled by city workers on "rainy day" time, they said, but there still would be no place to display the carriage.

Plans were underway a few years ago to convert the second floor of the monkey house into a museum, but there was never enough money.

The city says this project would cost \$2,500. Contributions appear to be the only answer.

### New Tricks Bringing Radio More Attention

New York — The American public has stopped fussing over its new puppy, television, and the old dog, network radio, is sitting up and paying attention with a batch of new tricks, according to Arthur H. Hayes, president of CBS Radio.

Hayes won considerable acclaim last year on what he said was a wild gamble. The network quickly decided to cancel a morning top show, "The Morning Show," to carry Bob Hope's "The Bob Hope Show."
