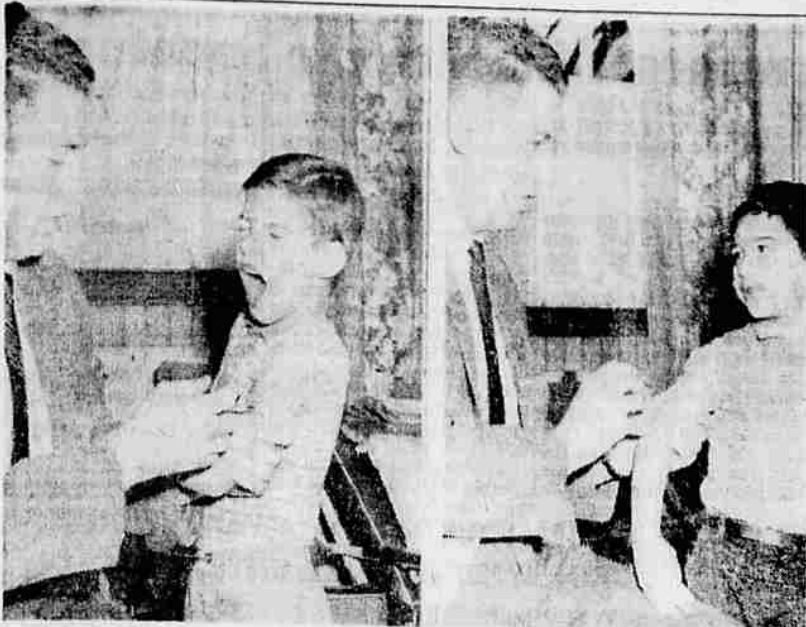

Redstone Arsenal Putting Cash in Huntsville Tills

Huntsville, Ala. — (UPI) — The nation's space program at George C. Marshall Space Flight Center and Redstone Arsenal here has put a jingle into the pockets of local residents that almost is as loud as a static test firing of the mighty Saturn rocket.

The space efforts under Dr. Werner V. von Braun have been highly successful, but even the satellites orbiting the earth don't match the gains made in cash registers as far as local residents are concerned.

When the nation's space scientists were moved here in 1950 this north Alabama city had a population of about 16,000. It has grown to more than 72,000 in the last decade. The per capita income here in 1950 was about \$800, but, thanks mainly to the emphasis on space exploration, it jumped to \$1,457 by last year. The city limits were extended from less than five square miles in 1950 to the present more than 50 square miles.

Sales Jump
Retail sales have jumped from \$43.8 million to \$112 million during the last decade. Vehicle registration jumped from 15,000 to 45,646 and telephones increased from 8,807 to 43,691 as residents became more prosperous.

The city's growth is reflected in the number of building permits — 435 in 1950 and 2,290 in 1959 — and postal receipts which jumped from \$250,097 in 1950 to \$809,727 in 1959.

Wages in the county before the missile boom totaled \$15.5 million in 1950. Ten years later they reached \$75,810,470 for a 387 per cent increase.

The city proudly boasts that it is the "Rocket City" of the nation and residents know full well that the prosperity rests in the nearby rocket and missile facilities of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Army.

Any cut back in space efforts would slow the spread of money throughout the city and greater Huntsville area. The expansion of Redstone Arsenal as the space capital has touched off a building boom that has seen housing projects spring up in all directions.

There are other manufacturing plants in Madison county, a total of 68 in 1958, but their total employment amounts to less than 6,000, slightly more than the number of employees at the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center alone.

'April Showers' Not Really Showery

Corvallis — "April showers" are famous but they add up to only about one-half the "wetness" of March and one-third the January rains (and snows), according to a new Oregon State college weather summary.

The publication points to 25-year averages as a sign that April traditionally brings a major drop in precipitation. Prepared by Wheeler Calhoun of the OSC crops department, the summary charts Corvallis weather of the last quarter century—a report fairly representative of the Willamette valley. "Extremes" are traced back to 1889.

Normal April showers bring about 2.10 inches of precipitation each year, compared to 4.06 for March, 5.10 in February, and 6.42 for January, the wettest month of the year.

Wettest April on record at OSC was in 1937 when 7.99 inches of rain fell. In contrast, April, 1939, had a mere .22 "trace" of rain. The long-time average shows .02 inches of snow in April.

SUGAR CONSUMPTION

New York — (UPI) — Cuba faces stiff global competition for sugar markets as output of the commodity rises. Trade sources say the world's 1961 crop is expected to exceed consumption. Output is forecast at 56 million tons, an increase of about 6 million tons from last year.

ODD BITS OF INFORMATION

Washington House Guests Receive Unusual Tour of Capital Grounds

Washington — (UPI) — When Spring arrives, can house guests be far behind?

I don't know why I keep asking that question because the answer is always the same.

Here it is barely a week past the vernal equinox and already we are getting letters from friends and relatives asking if we still have that old Army cot in the attic.

There is something about the springtime that seems to make our nature-loving friends and relatives long for the great outdoors.

Each year when the bud is

on the tree again and the bird is on the wing, they start laying plans to come here for a stroll through the corridors of the U.S. Capitol.

Pause That Refreshes
There is nothing, apparently, that they enjoy more than to pause beside a porcelain fountain and sip fluorinated water while drinking in the marble beauty of Chief Ayah-ke-bah-ko-ahay's statue.

Since I am usually designated by my wife to lead the sightseeing parties—"Get them out of the house for a while," she whispers—I have logged enough hours to qualify as a master guide.

I pride myself on being able to bore our guests with odd bits of historical information that the average guide overlooks. This tends to discourage any return trips.

Not many people know, for instance, that when air-conditioning was first installed in the Capitol, workmen had to fill the pipes with anti-freeze during the winter. Therefore, I always include that in my spiel.

Then I direct my visitors up a steep flight of circular stairs to the Senate library. There's nothing to see up there but when they get back down they are out of breath.

More Odd Bits

This enables me to tell them, without being interrupted, that one of the volumes in the library contains a copy of the only picture ever printed in the Congressional Record.

The picture was included in the issue of Oct. 6, 1906, at the behest of former Sen. Benjamin Ryan Tillman of South

Carolina. It is a full length profile of a cow.

After that, I take my guests to the Capitol basement and show them the crypt that Congress set aside for George Washington to be buried in. This is one of the places where Washington wasn't buried.

If they want to see Washington's tomb, I inform them, they will have to drive down to his home at Mount Vernon. I am always glad to give directions.

I also suggest that while they are visiting Mount Vernon, they might like to make a copy of Martha Washington's recipe for "grate cake." The recipe came in handy when you have house guests. It begins like this: "Take 40 eggs . . . work four pounds of butter."

Eichmann Trial To Be Covered By 480 Accredited Newsmen

Jerusalem, Israel — (UPI) — Adolf Eichmann goes on trial for the attempted destruction of modern Jewry in a new stone building just a mile from the wall where Orthodox Jews will mourn the destruction of

Solomon's Temple 600 years before Christ.

The state is taking extraordinary precautions that none of the half-million of its citizens who still carry personal grief from the barbarities of nazism will deprive it of the chance to hang Eichmann with due process of law.

A 15-foot wire fence has been put up around the recently completed six-story building and everyone entering the compound, except the judges and opposing counsel, will be searched daily for weapons. Floodlights will light the area by night for the guards in pillboxes and on surrounding rooftops.

The building is Jerusalem's new Community Center, facing the western hills of the ancient city near the handsome new campus of the Hebrew University. The trial will be its first use.

Court will sit on the stage of the main auditorium. Orchestra seats are reserved for the press — 480 newsmen from 35 countries have been accredited. About 250 gallery seats will be available for spectators, including members of the government, foreign diplomats, legal observers and a few members of the public, who will be admitted by ticket only.

Soundproof Booths

Four soundproof booths have been set up in the balcony for translators who will provide simultaneous translations of the proceedings in Hebrew, German, French and English. All will be piped to outlets through the building for the use of newsmen and for recording. Persons who must be on the move in the compound may follow the proceedings on walkie-talkies, available for a \$40 deposit.

The fence has been extended across the street to enclose a police officers' club which will be used as a restaurant during the trial, eliminating the necessity for lunch-hour friskings. All traffic has been shut off from the block and residents of other buildings will be checked in and out along a narrow walk to their homes.

Two hundred police men and women have been brought to Jerusalem from other parts of the country for duty at the trial site, to prevent depletion of the local police strength.

Eichmann will be housed in the building during the trial and seated in a bullet-proof box on the court room stage during trial sessions. The box is about eight feet high and 4½ by 6½ feet wide, of specially reinforced plastic with a top section of bullet-proof glass. Two guards will occupy it with Eichmann, and if he chooses to testify, he will do so by microphone from the box.

Directly below the court room, in which is planned as a gymnasium for the Community Center, is the working press office. A special post office branch, a telecommunications center and photographic laboratory with radio transmission facilities have been set up in corners and adjoining rooms. There are 200 tables for newsmen, four soundproof broadcast booths and 20 soundproof telephone booths for overseas calls.

Private Offices

On two balconies overlooking the press room are private offices for the Israeli news agencies ITIM and six international news services — United Press International, Associated Press, the Russian Tass, British Reuters, Agence France Presse and the German DPA.

There is no television in Israel. An American firm, Capital Cities Broadcasting Corp. of New York, was given exclusive rights to make videotape records of the proceedings. There has been

protest at this agreement and arrangements for possible pooling or distribution of tape are not completed.

Newsmen accredited to cover the trial include, in addition to the international agencies, representatives of 27 national agencies or newspaper groups, 170 dailies, 38 weeklies, 34 radio and TV stations and 48 other periodicals. They come from as far away as Australia, Indonesia and Mozambique as well as most of western and Communist Europe.

Bill Abolishes Hydroelectric Group

Salem — (UPI) — The House Wednesday passed and sent to the governor a bill to abolish the three-member state hydroelectric commission.

SB390 transfers all of the commission's duties to the state engineer, who serves as a member of the agency.

Gov. Mark Hatfield has proposed abolition of the commission in his reorganization program but the legislature has not yet acted on this. If the legislature sanctions Hatfield's version, the separate bill to do away with the commission will not be effective. The separate bill was introduced by the Ways and Means committee.

NEWS AWARDS

Atlantic City, N. J. — (UPI) — The annual Headliners club awards will be presented here April 7 and 8, it has been announced. The competition honors men in magazine, radio, and television work as well as in newspapering.
