## Six Home Extension Units Plan Lessons on Low Calorie Meals

All Jackson County Home Extension Units will have a lesson on calorie conscious meals during April. Mrs. Leona C. Sheehan, county home economics agent, gave the lesson to project leaders last week.

This lesson gives information on the nutritional value of foods and the planning of low calorie meals. Proper weight control is covered and the calorie count of many of the common foods in everyday menus will be pointed out.

People sometimes have the idea that many reducing diets are not very appetizing, but this is not necessarily so, according to the leaders. With some thought and menu planning, attractive, tasty meals can be served during weight reduction.

"One of the greatest problems with people in weight control is maintaining the proper weight once it has been reached. Many times an individual is successful in

losing weight, only to gain it back after he goes off the original reduction diet," Mrs. Sheehan stated. Included in this lesson are some methods on how to remain at the proper weight.
