Accidents Claim 10 Lives in Oregon

By United Press International — Oregon's 1961 accident death toll was increased by at least five during the week end. Two of the victims were small children.

Dead are Ted Martin, 3, Portland; Steven Carr Wilkie, 6, Killamook; Mrs. Catharine Coy, 49, Milwaukie; Jennie Lou Carothers, 18, Cave Junction; and Richard Joseph Myers, 23, a sailor from Portland.

The Martin boy died of apparent asphyxiation after crawling into a small campfire in his parent's garage. He was pronounced dead after attempts to revive him failed.

Several members of the First Congregational church at Milwaukie joined in the search for the boy after he was reported missing.

California Bakes As Mercury Soars

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Southern Californians baked today as the mercury shot up to the 90s in many inland areas, and soared to the 100s in hottest desert areas.

By noon, downtown Los Angeles simmered in 94-degree heat, breaking the all-time high for this date of 90 set only last year. Normal is 70.

Burbank in San Fernando valley reported 93.

Death Valley was the nation's hot spot Sunday with a 102 high and Palm Springs was next with 100.

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Highway 101 Work To Cut Travel Time

Salem — (UPI) — The State Highway department said today that when rebuilding of U. S. Highway 101 is completed, it will take the average motorist only seven hours to travel the route from Astoria to the California border.

Following World War II, the driving time was at least 11 hours.

The department said the 399 miles of the Coast highway in 1945 have been trimmed to 364 with construction underway or contracts being let this season.

The department said that more than 185 miles, nearly half the distance from border to border, will have to be rebuilt to modern standards by next year — and this completion will provide the seven hours' driving time.

Wanted Youth Arrested By California Police

Medford police were notified that a youth wanted here on a check charge has been arrested by Seaside, Calif., police and is presently being held in the Monterey county jail.

Police said Francis Victor Harvey, 18, formerly of Medford, was arrested on a Jackson county district court warrant charging obtaining property by false pretenses with bail set at \$1,500. Harvey allegedly cashed a \$20 check at a local supermarket early last month, and the check proved fictitious. Extradition proceedings have been started in California to get Harvey back to Medford, police said.

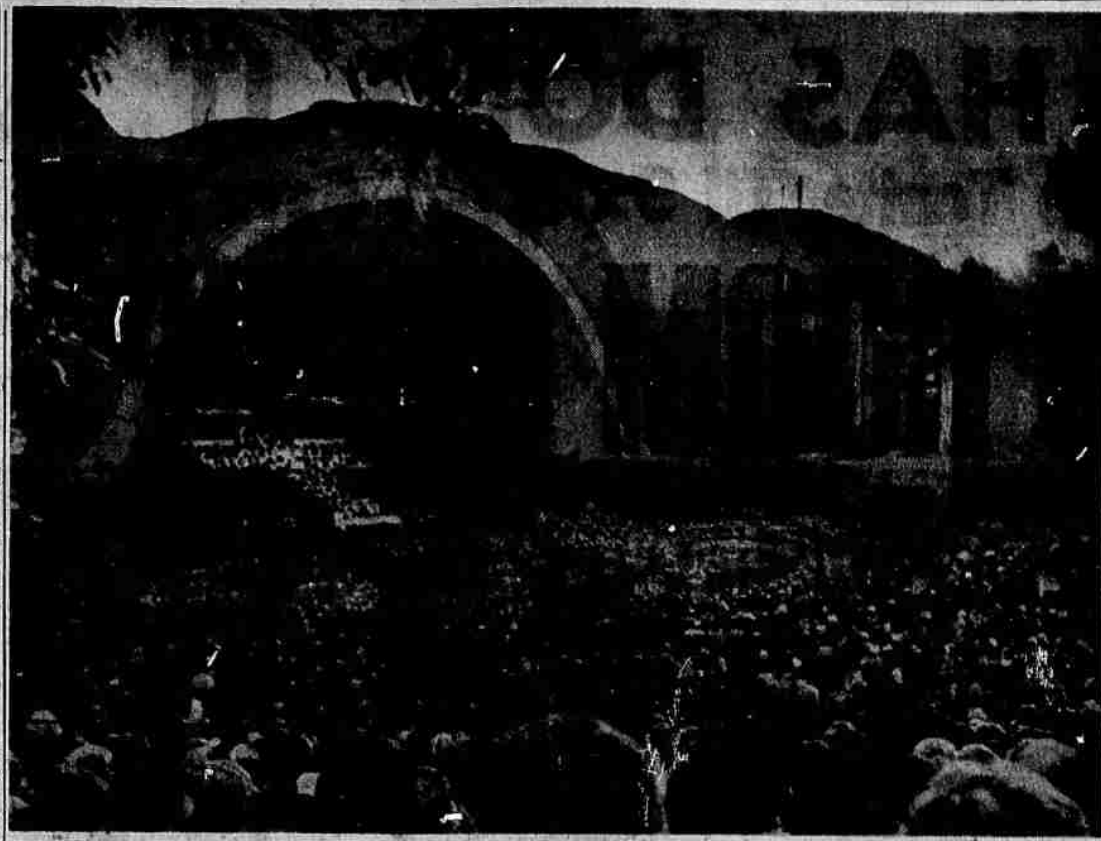

Millions of American Christians Observe Resurrection of Christ At Easter Rites

By United Press International — Easter services drew millions of American Christians to the nation's churches and traditional shrines and reached countless others over coast-to-coast broadcasts.

Generally clear and cold weather, marked here and there by week end snow, greeted worshippers at sunrise services. An estimated 20,000 persons filled the Hollywood Bowl at dawn and 30,

000 attended sunrise services in the nation's capital. More than 6,000 persons braved a four-inch snowfall and freezing temperatures to attend early services at the Cathedral in the Pines at Ridge, N.H., where crews worked four hours during the night clearing roads and parking lots at the nondenominational memorial to America's war dead.

At Bar Harbor, Maine, sunrise services were held indoors when snow and sleet forced cancellation of services atop Mount Cadillac. Easter celebrants used skiers' chair lifts to reach services in three to four inches of snow on 4,393-foot Mt. Mansfield at Stowe, Vt.

Young pacifists pleaded for disarmament in parades in New York during services in the city's packed churches.

Violence and greed also marked celebrations of the resurrection of Christ. Five gunmen held up 25 persons and fled with \$150 from an Easter prayer meeting in Chicago. At Denver, a Roman Catholic priest shot and killed a burglar he found stealing the Easter collection.

On the West Coast, services began in pre-dawn gloom at the Hollywood Bowl and lasted until the sun rose beyond hills surrounding the natural amphitheater. The services, opening with a trumpet call beneath a cross on a nearby hill, were broadcast nationally. Choral music was provided by 100 cadets from the Air Force Academy and a 200-voice youth choir.

About 6,000 persons attended the 50th sunrise service on Mt. Rubidoux at Riverside, Calif., and 5,000 celebrants worshipped in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena.

Legislature in Washington Adjourns

Olympia, Wash. — (UPI) — The Washington Legislature adjourned during the week end after regular and special sessions that lasted 82 days.

Committee Hears New Proposals on Legislative Pay

Salem — (UPI) — The legislature, trying to understand the psychology of the voters on legislative pay, heard new proposals to achieve this aim today.

The voters have consistently rejected proposed increases for legislators. Each legislative gets \$50 a month, among the lowest in the nation.

Appearing before the House committee on state and federal affairs, Sen. Vernon Cook (D-Troutdale) proposed another ballot measure in 1962 that would repeal the constitutional restrictions on legislative pay and allow the legislature to set its own salary, with restrictions.

Would Triple Salaries

Cook's proposal would be in the form of amendments to two House joint resolutions, Nos. 7 and 8. Number 7 triple legislative salaries and number 8 would repeal the constitutional limitation.

The twist that Cook suggests is that if the voters empower the legislature to raise its own salary, that a specification be included that this could be no more than \$100 a month.

The 1963 legislature, however, could set the salary of the 1965 session, 1965 could hike salaries for 1967, and so on. The theory is that if the people objected to a pay increase proposed by a legislature, they could vote out of office the members who made the proposal.

Might Bring Criticism

The League of Women Voters and the AFL-CIO approved taking the limitations out of the state constitution. "This is the only way we'll ever get a pay raise," Cook said.

Rep. George Layman (R-Newberg) said he was concerned this might "open up criticism we've never had before." Cook said he is not concerned about that.

Rep. Beulah Hand (D-Milwaukie) favored the measure. She said the "easiest" way to get one is to repeal the constitution segment which requires the voters to approve any raises.

Mrs. Hand said the educated voter will know exactly what it is and the "uneducated voter loves to repeal things."
