

Vice President Charms Population in Senegal

Dakar, Senegal - (UPI) - Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, here as President Kennedy's personal representative to help Senegal celebrate the first anniversary of its independence, today charmed the Senegalese with his southern manner and warm Texas drawl.

Johnson clearly had the edge in popularity over the Soviet delegate chief, Ivan Senin.

Whereas Senin had to be introduced as a deputy chairman of the Council of Ministers of the Ukrainian People's Republic of the U.S.S.R., and head of the Soviet Budget

commission, Johnson needed no introduction.

Most Senegalese—from the educated to the African masses of this country—had heard much of the "No. 3 man of America" and cheered him wildly on his arrival Sunday night.

"Having walked this road of independence ourselves, Americans feel a special kinship with you," Johnson said shortly after he stepped off an Air Force jet transport. "We hope for very friendly, mutually beneficial relations with Senegal and with all new African nations."

"We admire . . . independence, not as an end in itself, but as a means to improving the lot and enlarging the opportunities for all people . . . The people of the United States congratulate you."

Can Count on America

Johnson was welcomed by Prime Minister Mamadou Dia and members of the Senegalese government.

Dia said Senegal knew it could "count on the American people and their government." He said that Johnson's presence in Dakar was formal proof of U.S. interest in "Africa, the Africans and African problems."

"Here, you are in a friendly country, among friends," he told Johnson.

Legislature Set To Tackle Big Industry Bills

Salem - (UPI) - The legislature entered its 13th week today ready for the final act on a set of bills that may well hold the biggest single accomplishment and the most intricate free-for-all campaign issue to emerge from the 1961 session.

These are the win-industry-for-Oregon bills. Although a late-starter, the Democratic-controlled legislature has been running nose-to-nose with Gov. Mark Hatfield behind these measures.

Bills already signed

Bills to bring Boeing Airplane Co. to Boardman and International Paper Co. to Gardiner already have been enacted and signed into law.

This week, unless a small cove of critics crying for preservation of the wilderness can win a delay, the legislature will pass on a third set of bills - to bring any oil company that can afford it to search for riches under the state's 600,000 acres of ocean.

The overwhelming support for these bills stands out in view of the fact that the legislature, hoping to go home in three weeks, still hesitates on how to dispose of the remaining surplus of legislation that is clogging committees as badly now as it did more than a month ago.

Much of this - including three-way workmen's compensation, tax reform, and any extensive government reorganization - offends most of the legislature regardless of party. Chances are a good part of it will rot away unless some fast trades and compromises can be reached in closing weeks.

Timber Compromise Seen

Reapportionment, anti-pollution bills, and the go-ahead for an Astoria-Megler bridge are likely, while a fair chance still is given for a timber tax compromise, some increased basic school support, elderly tax relief, commerce code, a mental health clinic start and help for community colleges.

In this light, the industry bills appear increasingly likely to have the heaviest and most lasting impact of anything this legislature will produce, with the credit rebounding to whichever party can wrest it away, via pure support or an added touch of criticism.

Pure support has been popular so far, but the various tacks the three sets of industry bills could take as a campaign issue probably will be illustrated - again - this week in oil bill debate and action.

Hatfield admittedly started the industry ball rolling last year by getting deep into negotiations with Boeing for Boardman and with Shell Oil Co. for the tidelands before the legislature met.

Except for a few, however, Democratic and Republican legislators alike were quick to jump on this bandwagon and even nudge a little for the driver's spot.

If all these measures turn out to be a good thing for Oregon, there should be a snappy fight among Hatfield, Democrats who control the legislature, and GOP minority colleagues, to claim the praise.

If they turn out to be unfortunate, there should be an equally lively effort to heap the blame on the opposition.

Dave Beck's Embezzlement Conviction Will Be Reviewed by Supreme Court

Washington - (UPI) - The Supreme Court agreed today to review the embezzlement conviction of former teamster boss Dave Beck on charges of pocketing \$1,900 from the sale of a union-owned Cadillac.

The court will hear arguments in the case some time during the term starting next October. A written opinion will follow.

The Washington State Supreme Court affirmed Beck's conviction last June by a 4-4 vote.

The former president of the

International Brotherhood of Teamsters is now free on bond in this case, as well as in one involving federal income tax conviction that also is being appealed.

In the embezzlement case, Beck drew not more than 15 years in the Washington State penitentiary. The fixing of a minimum term by the Board of Prison Terms and Paroles was delayed pending disposition of the appeal.

The petition to the U. S. Supreme Court said the grand jury which indicted Beck for

embezzlement was not impartial and that his case was prejudiced by radio and newspaper publicity.

Beck drew five years in jail and a \$50,000 fine following the income tax conviction in Tacoma Feb. 27, 1959. He was charged with attempting to evade \$240,000 in taxes. That case is on appeal in the 9th U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

In addition, the Supreme Court ruled Feb. 20 that the Justice Department can prosecute Beck and five employers on charges that they illegally

Electronics Lead Gainers in Early Morning Market

New York - (UPI) - "Flash prices" dominated this morning with gainers having an upside led by electronics and low-priced special situations.

Chrysler picked up more than a point to give the industrial average a small lead with American Telephone falling to open due to a reported accumulation of buy orders.

Chance bought, merging with Ling-Temco electronics opened at 80 1/2 up 7 points while Ling-Temco added 1 1/2. Atlas Powder soared around 7. Hewlett-Packard gained

more than 4 in the electronics where Zenith tacked on around 2, Magnavox and International Telephone around a point.

Down around a point or more were Hovco, Heinz, Martin, Lockheed, Polaroid, Mack Trucks, United Whelan and Beech-Nut.

Utility issues were mostly higher, rally easier on a loss of more than a point in Nickle Plate.

Ashland Man Seeks Damages for Injury

Wayne Hooper, 178 A st., Ashland, is seeking \$50,000 in general damages and \$1,500 in special damages from Bagley Canning company, Ashland, as a result of an accident in the plant on Oct. 11, 1960.

According to a complaint filed by Gerald J. Scannell Jr., Ashland lawyer, Hooper was required to label and stack fruit in the cannery warehouse. The fruit was stacked 15 cases high. It was necessary to throw the cases to reach the top of the stack, the complaint explained.

While throwing the cases to the man on the stack, Hooper fell and severely injured himself. Each case weighed 46 to 47 pound, it was noted.

The complaint charges that the Bagley Canning company was reckless, careless and negligent. Hospital and medical expenses amounted to \$1,500.78, it stated.

Portland Carpet Workers on Strike

Portland - (UPI) - Members of Local 1236 of the Linoleum, Carpet, Tile and Plastic Applicators union were on strike in the Portland-Vancouver area today.

Gene More, business agent of the union, said about 225 men were affected in this area. The union also has about 28 members in the Salem area who he said were not on strike.

Contract talks broke down Saturday. More said pickets would be placed on some jobs.

Corvallis Scene Of Derailment

Corvallis - (UPI) - Nine cars of a 41-car Southern Pacific freight train were derailed near here today. No one was injured.

Railroad officials said a broken rail was the cause of the accident.

The derailment tied up the Albany-Corvallis section of the line and officials said the tracks were expected to be cleared by 9 p.m.

The derailed cars were in the middle of the train en route from Albany to Toledo.

Campaign Urged To Save State Beaches

Tigard - (UPI) - A Democratic party spokesman urged a letter-writing campaign today to prevent "exploitation of the beaches" of Oregon.

Blaine Whipple, democratic executive secretary, told the Tigard Jane Jefferson club to urge passage of SB 483, which would require the land board to hold hearings before granting any beach easements.

"Only if this bill is passed can we guarantee the preservation of Oregon's unique, irreplaceable scenic beach sites," he said.

Army To Bolster Units in Pacific

Washington - (UPI) - The Army reported today it planned to double its trouble-shooting special forces and beef up Pacific Army units with the 5,000 additional men provided in President Kennedy's supplemental defense budget.

A spokesman said the Army's share of the 13,000 additional men-at-arms called for in the budget proposal would be allocated to these units.

Bob Hope, Lodge Get Amvets Awards

Washington - (UPI) - Comedian Bob Hope and former U. N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge were among five winners of special achievements awards announced Sunday by Amvets.

Former Gov. Leroy Collins of Florida, former Civil Defense Director Leo A. Hoegh and Dwight D. Gulliford Jr., president of the Paraplegics Manufacturing Co., also will receive the awards at an Amvets lunch next Saturday.

Gasoline Price Plunge Continues

Portland - (UPI) - Gasoline prices continued at a low level here today as the current price war spread over other parts of the state.

Many stations were selling regular at 22.9 cents per gallon with some down to 21.9. Premium sold at around 26.9 cents.

Virgil Rukke, president of the Oregon Gasoline Dealers association, said the price spiral downward will have to be reversed by the middle of the month if independent dealers were to remain in business.

He said the price battle has spread to other Western Oregon cities, including Roseburg, Eugene and Salem.
