Improvement Bonds Approved by City Council in Ashland

Ashland-The Ashland city council passed an ordinance authorizing issuance of city improvement bonds totaling \$35,854.47 last night.

The bond money will be used to cover costs of last year's curbing and paving program. The bonds, issued under the Bancroft act, carry a 6 per cent interest rate and will mature in 10 years.

Another ordinance approved calls for certification of delinquent city assessments to the county assessor's office for collection. City Attorney Harry Skerry said the city has approximately \$10,000 in delinquent assessments.

A bid of \$2,250 was submitted by Jim Busch Ford sales for a city owned lot bordering First st. and near C st. At the March 21 council meeting, it was agreed that the city warehouse on the corner of First and C sts. should be sold. The lot was included in the package. The auto company's bid was referred to the realty committee.

Reviews Legal Aspects - Skerry reviewed legal aspects of the city's rights in state highway throughways. Skerry said that after a thoroughgoing has been established, no city streets may intersect the highway without the approval of the state highway commission.

If the commission and city cannot reach mutual agreement on access streets, the location may be determined by the city. However, if no agreement is reached, and the city does not take action within 60 days, the commission can name the access routes.

Chet Squires, city recreation committee member, presented a proposed 1961 recreation program budget. Squires said the committee is asking for \$3,180, a \$180 increase over last year's figure.

Viewer's Guide Is Published by SOC

Ashland - A Telecourse Viewer's Guide has been published to supplement the experimental half-hour television course, History of the Pacific Northwest, which is conducted each Wednesday on KBES-TV, Medford, at 4 p.m. The guide was compiled by Dr. Frank D. Haines Jr., of the Southern Oregon college social science division, who also instructs the course. The guide was published jointly by the general extension division and Southern Oregon college.

Extra copies of the 40,000-word publication are available at \$1 each in the general extension division office at Southern Oregon college for students and teachers who may find it invaluable as an outline and reference in classroom work.

Dr. Haines reported that more than 350 inquiries had been received by Charles Ivie, director of the Southern Oregon branch of the general extension division, and by television station personnel, concerning the course and the guide.
