Johnson Elected NAB Director

Ray Johnson, KMED radio station's general manager, has been elected to the National Association of Broadcasters' board of directors.

He will represent the broadcasting industry of Oregon, Washington and Alaska. The NAB board consists of 24 members, 17 of whom represent the 17 districts of the United States. Johnson said one of the functions of the National Association of Broadcasters is to promote self regulation among broadcasters for the public interest and to build broadcasting as an industry on a national basis.

Johnson's two-year term as director starts May 10. Johnson has been a member of the Oregon Broadcasters' board of directors for many years having been treasurer, vice president, and last year, president. In the latter position, Johnson has served as OAB legislative chairman and holdover director.

UN Director To Attend Dinner Here

Paul Edwards, resident director of the United Nations in the Philippines, Formosa, South Korea and the city of Hong Kong, plans to attend the 11th annual Roosevelt Memorial dinner at McLoughlin Junior High school at 6:30 p.m., Saturday, April 15, according to Harper Edwards, his brother and chairman of the Jackson County Democratic Central committee.

Edwards was visiting his relatives here last year at the time of the Roosevelt Memorial dinner when Helen Gahan Douglas spoke.

The UN director met then Ted Kennedy, brother of President John F. Kennedy, and Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, U. S. senator.

A second brother, Harold O. (Hal) Edwards, Tensed, Idaho, past president of the Wheat Growers association of Idaho and treasurer of the Eleven Western States Wheat Growers association, also plans to attend the banquet.

Edwards was active in the Farmers for Kennedy campaign last year and was a guest speaker here at a luncheon and round table discussion prior to the fall election.

18,000 See Cancer Film in Oregon

Portland-More than 18,000 women saw the American Cancer Society's film on uterine cancer, "Time and Two Women," during March, according to the society's Oregon division headquarters in Portland.

In four-week series of mass showings, the Oregon division took the film into every county in the state as part of the society's continuing attack on uterine cancer, second most common cancer in women, which now takes some 15,000 lives annually.

There were 148 separate showings in the four weeks in school buildings, theaters, church basements, grange halls and lodge rooms. Average attendance was about 126 women.

Highest county attendance was in Multnomah county with 2,157 women reported at 33 showings. Lane, with 1,818, was second for county attendance and Marion was third.

Included in the state-wide totals were 800 women in Jackson county where showings were held at Ashland, Medford and Rogue River.

Treasury Bond Sales Decrease

Sales of United States Treasury department Series E and H Savings bonds in Jackson county in March totalled \$85,518, according to Friday's report. The total here a year ago was \$110,808.

Sales through March 31 totalled \$208,551 compared to \$324,286 for the same period a year ago.

Owners of the oldest E bonds, who had been granted a second extension privilege will receive 3 1/2 per cent interest each year, compounded semi-annually, it was explained. The new 10-year extension with its higher interest rate will apply to all Series E bonds bought during May, 1941 to May, 1940.

105 Permits Are Issued in Month

A total of 105 building permits with a total value of \$376,883 were issued by Medford Building Inspector O. R. McNeel last month.

This compares to 179 permits and a total valuation of \$368,701 in March, 1960; 189 and valuation of \$830,737 in March, 1959, and 69 with valuation of \$406,958 in March, 1958.

Ten permits were issued for single family homes with a total valuation of \$148,500 last month; 15 permits for remodeling and repairing single family homes for a \$15,980 valuation; two permits for new garages, \$14,063; and one permit for remodeling and repairing a private garage, \$2,050.

A permit was issued for one new church with a valuation of \$40,000. Seven permits were issued for business remodeling and repair, \$97,105, and one permit for remodeling and repairing an institution.

One permit was issued for moving a building, no valuation given; one permit was issued for a minor new building, \$10. Six permits were issued for demolishing six buildings with no valuation given.

Thirteen permits were issued for signs, \$9,750; 22 electrical permits, \$2,825; eight plumbing permits, \$1,300; two special permits, no valuation given; one swimming pool permit, \$5,000; 11 permits for fences, \$1,075; and three permits for patio and other structures, \$1,285.
