Editor's Note: The Family Council is a group of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Roxanne M.-I'd like to nurse my baby.

Joyce T.-None of us have, and our babies are perfect.

Roxanne M.-I expect my first baby in a few months. My sisters and the family want me to arrange for obstetrical care by the doctor they've all been using for years. But he doesn't believe in breast-feeding and advises the girls not to bother.

One of my friends used another obstetrician who at least tried to cooperate. The nursing got started, anyway, but the first month after the baby's birth, bottles had to be introduced. I'd like to sign up with this physician, but the family is urging me to stick with the one they swear by.

I've been reading up on pregnancy and so has my husband. We're impressed with the concept of nursing as a continuation of the bond between mother and baby. The idea intrigues me and I'd like to try it.

Joyce T.-Maybe in the old days nursing was manageable. But Roxanne knows that even our own mother advises against it now, especially with all the topnotch formulas and babyfoods.

Our family obstetrician must have a good reason for advising us to forget about breast-feeding our babies. Mine is three months old and doing beautifully on bottles and vitamins. Roxanne admits that her friend gave nursing a fair try and had to stop it almost at the start.

I think my sister just wants to be different, and to do so she's taking a chance with a doctor we don't know, risking her infant's early nutrition. There are less serious ways to be "different."

Why doesn't she... and stop trying to fight a losing battle?

The Council: More power to Roxanne. She's to be commended for her curiosity about the complete experience of child-bearing which, according to Nature's design, includes lactation for the purpose of nourishing the infant from outside the mother's body.

Yes, it's old-fashioned, it's hard, it's confining, it's risky. But, it's there and, asks Roxanne, why not learn what it's like?

Actually, there aren't many like doctor number two any more, because the technique of breast-feeding is difficult to master. The key person here is-guess who-the infant. But the mechanics of proper positioning of mother and child and the disharmony between a baby's and a hospital's "schedule," have contributed to the use of "just-as-good" concoctions made from cow's milk. But breast-feeding, if possible, offers the baby its own "custom-made" nutrition. And, in addition, it offers the mother a not-to-be-missed sensation of closeness and essentiality.

Nevada Governor Raps Ike's Regime

Salem-AP-Gov. Grant Sawyer of Nevada attacked the Eisenhower administration as "weak and ineffective" Saturday night.

Sawyer told the annual State Young Democrats convention banquet the American public had lost the will to move ahead under former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

'HOT THUMB' TECHNIQUE

Atomic Radiation Found To Have Various Reactions on Plant Life

Washington-AP-For several years, scientists at the Brookhaven National Laboratory have been studying the effects of atomic radiation on various forms of plant life.

This has led to the development of what I shall describe, with no particular pride of authorship, as the "hot thumb" technique of gardening.

What the scientists do is

plant flowers, vegetables and other flora in a 10-acre field that is in a sense, fertilized by gamma rays from Cobalt-60.

Then they go back to the laboratory, hang up their trowels and pruning shears, and wait to see what happens. Persons who have seen the radiation garden described it as a fantastic sight. Under the rays from the radioisotope many familiar household plants assume grotesque sizes and shapes.

Doesn't Merit Boast

This, however, is nothing much to brag about. Some of the things I grow in my gar-

den look rather weird, and I don't have the advantages of Cobalt-60.

On the other hand, the scientists also have found that certain plants respond favorably to the radiation treatment. They have produced new and better varieties of such things as oats, beans, peanuts and carnations.

Seymour Shapiro of Brookhaven's biology department described some of these achievements at a recent hearing of the Joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee.

I have been reading the hearing transcript and I got the impression that some of the committee members regarded the experiments, wondrous though they may be, as a mixed blessing.

Take, for example, the new variety of peanuts produced by the "hot thumb" gardeners. Shapiro told the committee it could increase the yield of the peanut crop.

Express Misgivings

"That is one of the problems we have with peanuts," Rep. Melvin Price (D-Ill.) commented. "There have been too many of them."

Rep. Craig Hosmer (R-Calif.) expressed similar misgivings. He asked Shapiro how much it would cost the taxpayers "to buy up the additional surplus" under the farm price support program.

The scientists replied, in effect, that problems of that sort were a bit out of his line of work.

Later on, Shapiro undertook to describe, with the aid of lantern slides, the glories of a new variety of carnation that has emerged from the radiation experiments. Hosmer was not impressed by it either.

"I have a good deal of trouble reconciling the expenditure of public funds for producing nice flowers," he grumbled.

The only part of Shapiro's testimony that I would quarrel with was his statement that radiation garden had grown "probably the most distasteful strawberry ever produced by man."

As a former strawberry raiser myself, I challenge that claim.

Morse Sees Renewal Of McCarthyism

Chicago-AP-Sen. Wayne Morse told the Midwest Jewish Council Sunday night that he sees a renewal of McCarthyism in the United States in such organizations as the John Birch Society.

Morse made his comments before 2,000 persons at a meeting marking the 18th anniversary of the 1943 uprising of Poland's Warsaw Jews against Nazi Germany.

The Oregon Democrat described Adolf Eichmann, former SS leader about to go on trial in Israel, as "the infamous symbol of all that was evil in Nazi Germany."

Morse said extermination of Jews by the Nazis is an example of what may happen when "the respect of individuals is submerged to the will of masses in any civilization."

SOC Enrollment May Reach 1,200

Ashland - Enrollment at Southern Oregon college for the spring term is expected to reach 1,200 students, according to Mrs. Mabel Winston.

A total of 1,190 students - 680 men and 510 women - had registered for the term as of Friday afternoon, she said.

"With 1,190 students now signed up for classes, and with the number of incomplete registrations, it appears that there will be 1,200 on campus this term," Mrs. Winston said.
