Applegate PTA Discusses Formation of Rural Protection District

Applegate - Mrs. LeRoy Ofenbacher was elected president of the Applegate PTA at their recent meeting in the school cafeteria. Other officers elected were Mrs. E. J. Henderson, vice president; Mrs. Clay Brion, secretary, and Mrs. Jerry Burrell, treasurer. Final plans for the annual fund raising event April 22 were announced as follows: A chicken - noodle supper will be served, with members of all school children asked to bring a salad and dessert; the price of the dinner will be by donation, and serving will start at

6:30 p.m.; the movie "The Kettles in the Ozarks" will be shown starting at 8:30 p.m.; popcorn, coffee and donuts will be available. County Commission Ed Taylor and insurance broker Dick House met with the group to explain necessary procedure in setting up a fire protection district. Taylor's advice was to get an attorney to get the district properly started and petitions properly worded. Twenty-five per cent or 200 signatures of land owners would be needed on the petitions and all the property must be contiguous. After the petitions were received and checked, a hearing by the county court would be needed before the measure would be placed on the ballot. A majority of votes would be needed to pass.

The district would need a secretary - treasurer and board of directors, similar to the school district. Definite boundaries would be needed if different from the school district. While the fire fighting equipment might not necessarily arrive in time to save the main building that was on fire, it would be of great help in saving surrounding buildings.

Could Save Lives
House pointed out that the fire equipment could be instrumental in saving lives, should someone be caught in a burning building. He also said that the saving in insurance rates would not necessarily be sufficient to pay the cost of the fire district assessments.

PTA members said that a piece of equipment, such as a pressure tank mounted on an old pickup truck could be purchased and housed in a central location. The purchase could be financed by donations, or through some community fund raising. This piece of equipment would then be available to all in the area should the need arise, and would undoubtedly arrive at the scene of a fire faster than the forest service equipment now does. It was felt by several that this could be done much cheaper and certainly much faster than the necessary procedure required for formal organization of a fire protection district.

New Prospect Library Has Active First Month

Prospect - The Prospect branch library checked out 1,017 books in the first month of operation. New borrowers registered totaled 215 for both adults and children. Requests for books not in the library were 55.

In March, the library opened with 1,600 books. Many more were added during the month. The opening of the library fulfilled a long-awaited need for the people of Prospect and surrounding country. Before this time the closest library was located 22 miles away in Shady Cove. Prospect citizens furnished a building and fixed it attractively with new materials. A new desk was donated by a Prospect family. The materials available include a collection of pamphlets and a file, encyclopedias for reference work, as well as a number of magazines.

In 1920 when a new branch was opened only about 300

books were sent out compared to 1,500 sent to Prospect in 1961.

Branches Grow
In the past year branch libraries have grown greatly in circulation, requests and registration. People in the towns are realizing more and more that the library is there to help and serve them. They are using them as a reference source as well as for pleasure reading.

There is more informative reading going on, too. For instance, knowledge of countries, people, and horticulture are just a few of the many subjects asked for time and time again. Some of these go in seasonal cycles or are influenced by daily news events. Books not available in Jackson county are ordered from the state library.

April 16-22 will be National Library week and the theme is "For a richer fuller life wake up and READ." Every library will observe the theme either by having a display of books or an open house. Other branch libraries are at Butte Falls, Central Point, Eagle Point, Gold Hill, Jacksonville, Phoenix, Prospect, Shady Cove, Table Rock store and Talent. The branches receive new books weekly.

Gold Hill Court Has 175 Cases in March
Gold Hill-Judge Norman R. Matteson reported that 175 cases were handled in Gold Hill justice court in March. Nature of the cases were traffic, liquor and game violations, assault and battery, and weighmaster violations.

Two Bodies Found South of Tigard

Tigard, Ore. - (UPI) - Authorities today sought the identity of a woman whose body and that of a man were found in a panel truck south of here on Highway 99 early Sunday.

State police said the two were apparent victims of accidental carbon monoxide poisoning. The man was identified from papers in his wallet as Clifford Wallace Neeley, 40, Vancouver, Wash.

State police said the panel truck left the road and went in the ditch while apparently trying to turn around. They said the couple apparently had fallen asleep with the motor running to try to keep the heater going while waiting for help.

A passing motorist reported the accident and turned off the truck's ignition.

Clackamas Man Saved From River
Gladstone - (UPI) - A Clackamas man was carried several hundred yards downstream Sunday when a boat capsized in the Clackamas river about one mile east of here.

Two other men were able to reach shore unaided. Fred Wenzel battled the current for several hundred yards before he was pulled from the river by Henry and Sydney Bryant who were fishing nearby.

Rudy Jasman and Bob Sadler swam to shore after the boat tipped over.

Siskiyou Delegation Attends Forest Fund Meeting at Capitol

Happy Camp - A large group of interested persons from Siskiyou county attended a legislative committee meeting at the state capitol in Sacramento April 6.

Senate bill 1000 was discussed. The bill calls for placing forest reserve funds into a miscellaneous fund to be distributed to state schools on an average daily attendance basis. Assemblywoman Pauline Davis contended that if the forest funds were placed in the miscellaneous fund, harbor and oil funds from southern California should also be put into the fund.

Studied Further
The committee agreed to recommend that the forest reserve fund be studied more thoroughly. Members said they recommended the matter be delayed until the next legislature convenes.

Attending the committee meeting from Happy Camp were Herbert Sonneborn, elementary school principal, and James Foote, high school principal. Others attending were Mrs. Lloyd Westby, PTA president; Mrs. Arnold Davis, elementary school board member, and Iris Keuhl, Mrs. Boyd Maline, PTA district president from Weed, accompanied the Happy Camp delegation.
